to the value of lxxij by the year so that all the
landes appoynted by us to the amount to the summe
of lxxij p^{ar}tyes by you as by the draught of
the indenture w^{ch} we returned to yo^r lordshippes
dothe appear w^{ch} indenture and the
covenantes therein as if it now shoulde we do
allowe of And we have yo^r lordshippes is contented
to graunt to w^{ch} paysh respect donat midshere
tome a year so that you have good bondes and
assurancie that if the marriage betweene them
dothe not take by that day by either of their
refusall or by death or otherwise that they shoulde
be payed wth markes and so thereby to be
dischargyd and yet at libertie to take w^{ch} they
we are contented to be bound by recognisance for
the payment of the said w^{ch} markes in the
summe of lxxij p^{ar}tyes that you will
mitigate that great and grev^{ous} summe of a
w^{ch} markes w^{ch} we referre to yo^r goodnes.
And also that w^{ch} w^{ch} paysh shoulde be of
full age and puttinge in like good and sufficient
bondes unto yo^r lordshippes for the same then
our said bondes may be cancelled. In doinge
whereof we most humble desire yo^r lordshippes
to signifye us what allowance you will be
contented to make of p^{ar}tyes w^{ch} and
