it will never be good for you nor for me
it would be notified (if it be not done already) for
the Land is to be Leased, and therefore those that are
to deal with it are to come and serve in what
part they will take it, And what they will give
for drable what for pasture what for meadowe
it would be entered into writing, And that
writing, because it is a matter of weight
would be brought unto me by your self And
for the better doing of this you are to talke
unto you if you think so good either Robert
or George must marry in the Sandhinge
of their thinge you are to reserve an acre
about what at you maye to be sold at
Redgrave at the thinge most necessary to you
I am most diligent you are in this matter
the better for us both you do not forget I am sure
my remembrance And so fare you well from
Bourneham this 26. of July 1571.
