I am at this tyme bouldened to trowble yow, and more desyeruvs to heere from yow, for that I have sent yow thre or fower Lr̃s and never as yet Red any answer, Wherein I greatly wonder at yo^r descovrtisie shewed to me, as in Refrayning from wrighting, but if their be any thing that I have mesvsed my self towards yow I woulde gladly in any Respect, or desoffended yow in any poynt, I woulde gladly wth yo^r Reconfermacion avoyed, and be very sorrofull for the desgratfulnes of me towards yow, but as for that I reffer it to yo^r descrescion fvrther more I am determyned and also perswaded of dyvers of my frendes to speacke wth M^r Borrowe for the agrement of the howes at Lyme howes, in the w^{ch} I would gladly have yo^r Covnsell, for now I am come to yeeres, and partely as yow doe knowe the howes & the Land comes in to my handes tel suche tyme as my brothers comes to yeres, and then to tacke suche agrement as Right and Lawe will give vs, sence my comynge over I have Learned at Stopney and in other places that Borrow is a marveyllus suttell man, and seekes wayes he can devyes to defeact vs of that small Livinge that we have / Notwithstandinge wth yo^r good conseling of me, and yo^r favorable Lr̃s to hym, we shall in suche wayes vse the Matter that it shalbe to my great proffet, and also to yo^r good contentacion and welawkinge of, Thus bid I yow hartely farwel, comyttinge yow to the tvycyon of almightie god from London Le 28 Iuly 1575
