1606-1/07<sup>o</sup>, January 15.

(Address) To ye right W<sup>r</sup>: Sr Robert Drury Knight at his house a Hausted in Suffolke or else wheare yeauue theese w<sub>t</sub> speede

(Letter) Sir according vnto pmise I haue pvided for you one man  
to be a groome of yr stable; one who is a very honest man  
a very sufficient fellow to discharge ye place but ye hewthe  
is by reason of some very earnest businesse of his owme  
he cannott by any meanes comme by ye space of thes  
14 dayes at ye expiration of wc time he will nott faile butt  
come vnto you, I haue bespoken you an other butt he is  
nott yett comen to London neyther wilbe vntill ye middle  
of ye ^ terme, I am desirous to furnish you w<sub>t</sub> honest  
men and such as shalbe able to serue yr turne wherfore you  
stay  
weare better ^ a littell ye longer. As for yr horse I thinke  
if you euery morning & euning caused his ^eeper to walke  
him abroade to ayre him by ye space of an houre & when hee  
brought him in to giue him a warme mash y<sub>t</sub> he would doe  
well yenough. I pray you Sr if you bee already pvided  
send me word by wrighting dyrecting yr letters to me into Shoce  
Lane to ye house of one Addam Sewell a womans Taylour  
he dwelleth right once against ye signe of ye Hand in Hand, at  
whose house I Lie but if I heere nott from you in ye  
meane time then I will send them vnto you. A thus w<sub>t</sub>  
my humble duty remembred to yr selfe & my good Lady I rest  
remayning euer

Sir according unto promise I have shewed for you one man  
to be a groome of my stable; one who is a very honest man

14 dayes at my expiracion of my time he will not fail butt  
comme unto you. I have bespoken you an other butt he is  
not yett comen to London mynke swill <sup>the</sup> middle  
of ~~the~~<sup>this</sup> terme, I am desirous to furnish you with honest  
men and such as shalbe able to serue mynke whiche you  
wante better <sup>stay</sup> a littell mynke longer. As for my horse I thinke  
if you every morning & evening cause his keeper to walke  
him abroad to mynke him by my space of an houre & when he  
brought him in to give him a warme marsh & he woulde doe  
well enough. If pray you say if you bee already shewed  
Send me word by mynging dyceting my letters to me into Shoo  
lanc to my house of one Adam Sewell a womans Taylour  
he dwelleth right ouer against my signe of the Hand in Hand, at  
whosse house I lie but if he were mott from you in my  
meane time then I will send them onto you. A thus w<sup>t</sup>  
my humble duty remembred to my selfe & my good lady & rest  
remoyning case.
