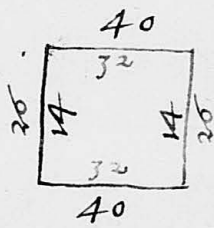

battaille cannot have the ranks furnished yet be sure that they be  
furnished from the middle of the battaille forward and therefore  
lack in or to men in any ranks beyond the middle battaille it makes  
no great matter. No less as the head is stronger. After this  
or sure like for may the whole piece of the battaille be able to make  
where the entire of the center of it is one piece. And put it once in  
order and then appoint the captain's to their order. And so will be  
continually.
