a warm and generous interest in the undertaking. The
yer, first 55,000. contribution was made by him. very first \$5,000. contribution was made by him. He was one of the men with whom those charged with seeking subscriptions counselled, and from whom they received helpful suggestions.

When the time arrived for choosing a Board of Trustees for the University his name was one of the first agreed upon. His standing in the business community, his liberal apprint and profound interest in the work of higher educations the standing of the standing the standing of tion all pointed him out as one of the men to whom the care of the new University should be entrusted.

As a trustee his devotion to this great public enterprise has been sincere, generous and ever increasing-te gave to it the library property and Walker Hall at Mergan Park, and afterward the Walker Huseum on the University Quadrangles, and many minor contributions. The total of his gifts to the University exceeds 150,000. But large as have been Mr. Valker's gifts of money and property his contributions of time, thought, attention, counsel and effort have been of still greater value. He has given to the accounts and finances the long continued and most useful attention of an expert.

continued and most useful attention of an expert. For several years he was chairman of the Committee on Buildings & Grounds.

effort to secure funds he has given the President most valuable advice and active assistance, securing gifts from his friends by personal solicitation or adding his own contributions.

He carried the University constantly in his heart. It would be difficult to overstate his interest in its welfare. It was his own declaration that he never laid his head on his pillow at night without earnestly invoking the blessing of God on the University of Chicago.

In Mr. Walker's death the University has lost an invaluable friend and benefactor. The Board of Trustees has lost one of its most zealous, faithful and useful members. His memory will long be cherished by his fellow trustees as a genial and faithful fellow worker, and by all the friends of the University as one who gave the institution most liberal benefactions and most unselfish and useful service. "

In token of their respect and affection the trustees will attend the funeral in a body.

At a meeting of the Committee on Press Extension, held April 22nd, the following report was made on economies instituted in the University Press. made on economies instituted in the University Press.
"The work which was formerly carried on in connection with the book known as our 'accounts payable ledger' has been done away with entirely. The detailed accounting in connection with exchanges has also been done away with, and one step in our system of checking bills has been eliminated. Our subscription business has been simplified materially and brought to what is practically a cash basis. For the present outside operations in connection with publishing and advertising in the west have been discontinued. The work in the retail department has been reorganized as that a cashier and clerk-are practically eliminated. The savings brought about by been reorganized so that a cashier and clerk are practically eliminated. The savings brought about by these changes amount to 35560. per year. The relief from responsibility in connection with the purchasing of and accounting for laboratory supplies will bring about a saving of approximately 31500.

The following report from the Business Hanager was submitted and ordered read to the Board of Trustees: "Feb. 13,1905.

Gentlemen: --In the matter of the retail department now being In the matter of the retail department now being conducted by the Press, after going over other plans which might be adopted in lieu of the one in effect it seems clear that so far as the plan is concerned there is no better than that of having this conducted as at present by the University through the Press Department. If this were turned over to an outside party the University would be relieved, of course, of direct responsibility and of some care in the matter, but on the other hand a profit would have to be paid either by the students or by the University to secure this essential service. In the second place, books and materials are required which are not usually carried and great inconvenience would result net usually carried and great inconvenience would result in securing these if the agency were a private one as they would not be carried in stock and could only be had after considerable delay and extra cost. In the third place, the University ought to control the books, literature and materials offered for sale at the University bookstore. This manner of control seems to be the most practicable of any suggested. A cooperative system of purchase on the part of the students has been considered but there is less cohesion among the student body in the University than in schools which have but three terms in which the clear three terms in which the clear three terms in which the class for each year is a body quite compact and where the students of the several yearly classes by acting together can easily and naturally organize. It would, therefore, seen impracticable to have a bookstore operated on the cooperative plan by the students. The present plan gives the students practically the advantages that would have he cooperative plan. This has been they would have by a cooperative plan. This has been verified by investigations by the students themselves.

The Director of the Press has so far reorganized the work of the Press that the same is now upon an exceedingly economical basis, the cashier's work having been consolidated with that of another department; Mr. Ryerson at \$25. per week, Mr. Adms at \$12. per week and an office boy at \$8. per week comprise those in charge of the ratail store. retail store.

retail store.

The matter of the prices charged to students has been under consideration by a committee from the junior colleges. This committee, after investigating the matter, were entirely satisfied with the prices.

The average profits on the sales of this department are about 10%. The advantage, however, from the conduct of the Press is not all expressed in this phase of it. The advantage to the libraries of the University is still greater from the fact that the Press gets the discount accorded dealers, namely 20 to 40%. The third advantage is convenience of the store for students in having the store right at head and not requiring them to having the store right at head and not requiring them. having the store right at hand and not requiring them to go outside of the campus, and in purchasing from other

We conclude that while the store might be run by outside parties and probably would be for the profit outside parties and probably would be for the profit which the Press makes, the organization of the Press is such that such a change would result in considerable loss to the University, the students and the Press.

Constitution Amended.

The following amendments to the constitution of the University Press were recommended to the Board:
Article IV, Section 1, second paragraph, specifies that
"any unusual expense involved in a special subscription
campaign shall be subject to authorization from the Committee on Expenditures."

Article III, Section 3, specifies that "an apportionment of the appropriation of each journal shall be made at the beginning of each year", and designates the method, etc.

In these two articles we have a division of responsitivity, and it is recommended that responsibility of expense in connection with subscription campaigns be placed upon the editors of the journals and the Director of the Press, as in the case of other the second paragraph of Article IV, Section 1, be eliminated, and that Article III, Section 3, be amended to include the words "promotion expenses" after the word "reprints."

College President Harper submitted the following report on plans for a reorganization of the College work so as to secure the advantages of the smaller colleges as well as those ization. of the larger, as requested to do at the meeting of

To the Trustees of the University of Chicago,

I. For several years the question has been considered whether it is possible in a large institution to organize the facilities which would secure to some extent at least, the advantages of a smaller institution of learning. This question has been discussed informally and formally in committees and in faculties, as well as in the Board of Trustees of the University, but no definite decision had been reached, and in fact no definite formulation of the plan had been attempted. The discussion of this question has not been restricted to the University of Chicago. In certain other large institutions the same question has been raised. But nowhere have any very definite steps been taken towards a realization of the object proposed. This statement is prepared in response to the following resolution recently adopted by your body:-

"In view of the close relationship existing between the future policy in respect to college work of the University and the plans for architectural development, and in view also of the opportunity open to the University for such as organization instiwork as will secure the advantages of the smaller institutions as well as those of the larger, the President is requested to present at his early convenience the general plans for such reorganization."

II. The advantages of the small college commonly recognized are perhaps, on the one hand, for students

1) The possibility of closer association with a limited number of other students in the same class;

2) a democratic social life in which the social qualities of each man become known to his fellows: 3) a more intimate relationship with a few instructors in the class room as well as on the outside.

The advantages on the other hand, for instructors, are
1) Cooperation with a smaller number of colleagues in the work

of administration and in social life;
2) an opportunity to know personally and to aid effectively a limited number of students.

The superiorities of the large university include, among other things, for the student

1) A wide choice of courses and instructors: 2) access to well equipped laboratories and large libraries; 3) the varied stimulus of a large college community.

The superiorities for instructors ordinarily include:

1) Superior facilities for work;

2) larger opportunity to investigate; stimulus from a more specialized and active corps

The problem is to combine these two types in one institution, or to secure as largely as possible the advantages of the smaller institution without losing to any considerable extent those of the larger institution.

III. At the beginning it is worth while to mention certain

TII. At the beginning it is worth while to mention certain characteristics which any proposed scheme must exhibit to be of Practicable value. Among these I may suggest the following: 1)0mly the fundamental principles of such a scheme may be presented with any degree of assurance. While it is possible to outline the general structure of the plan, details must be left for the most part to the experience which may be gained 2) Tlexibility above all else must prevail in a scheme would be manifestly unwise to present the minutay of such a comprehension of the general plan.

comprehension of the general plan.

3) Great care must be exercised to diminish the possibili-ties of unnecessary expenditure. It is assumed that the

proposed organization shall not be more expensive than the old as at present conducted. This, of course, does not mean that the same amount of money now being used will be sufficient throughout the future. As students increase the domands will be greater whatever may be the plan of organization. The history of education for fifty years furnishes sufficient evidence of this fact. evidence of this fact.

evidence of this fact.

4) No plan can be presented which will not suggest difficulties, and many of these difficulties may at first sight seem to be insuperable. If, however, the fundamental principles on which the plan is constructed are correct, it may safely be assumed from the beginning that in the progress of the work difficulties, at least those of an ordinary character, will find solution.

IV. The following may, perhaps, be offered as general

principles underlying the scheme:

1) The registration of students in a particular college should not exceed a number (say 160-175) which will meet the demands of the problem.

demands of the profiles.

2) The colleges organized should be distinctive in their character, each representing a phase of college work, for example, one laying stress on the classical curriculum, another upon the scientific curriculum, another upon that of commercial and industrial life, still another upon modern literature.

The requirements for admission and the requirements of study should be of the same standard in all of the colleges, and to secure this all legislation relating to the educational work of the colleges should be enacted by the faculty of the Junior Colleges representing the Junior College work as a

4) Hembership in the college should be possible after the student has completed the work of the Junior College and at all events until he has taken his bachelor's degree.

5) The students of each college should ultimately form a

residential community with an assignment to each college of a building for class room and office, and likewise buildings for dormitories. The latter should include special suites

for groups of students whose homes are in the city.

5) The administration of each college should be under the immediate charge of a separate dean and a faculty made up of instructors the larger part of whose work is devoted

to the students of that particular college.

7) Unity of administration in the various colleges may be secured by the appointment of a dean who shall have

be secured by the appointment of a dean who shall have general supervision of all such colleges.

8) Entrance to one college rather than to another should be a matter of choice on the part of the student, determined to some extent by the personnel of the faculty, and to some extent by the subjects especially emphasized in the curriculum of the college. The acceptance of a student by a particular college should be a matter of choice by the faculty of that college, and such acceptance would mean the assummtion of a college, and such acceptance would mean the assumption of a

certain responsibility for the student and his work.

9) Under ordinary circumstances every instructor in a college should be allowed to offer a certain number of

courses in the university at large.

10) Under ordinary circumstances the student should be required to take at least one-half of all his course of study during the period of the Junior College work under the faculty of the college in which he is registered, the remainder

of the work being done in university classes under the super-vision of the faculty. Provision should be made for the possible transfer of students of one college to another.

possible transfer of students of one college to another.

11) The several deams, as in the case of other administrative officers, should be appointed by the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the President.

12) The membership of each faculty should be large enough to provide representatives for each of the departments especially represented in the college, and each faculty should have some power of initiative in themselves in order to insure congeniality.

13) Classes should be made up so far as practicable within a particular college, but provision should be made for the acceptance by one college of students of another college in particular cases when recommended by the faculty.

V. It is recommended that the Trustees of the University authorize the President, in consultation with the deans and officers of instruction concerned, to reorganize the work of the Junior Colleges in accordance with the policy outlined above, the reorganization to take effect October first, 1905 and that when the reorganization has been effected the work of the colleges > be conducted in accordance with the regular procedure provided for in the statutes of the University After consideration the recommendation was adopted.

Professors To the Board of Trustees of the-University of Chicago, Gentlemen: --

At the meeting of the Board held June 27th there was referred to me, with power to act, a communication from the Business Kanager relating to a request made by Professor Alexander Smith for the privilege of erecting a residence on the grounds of the Yerkes Observatory. At first inclined to consider the matter favorably owing to the considerations set forth in the report of the Business Manager, I have finally reached the conclusion

that it would be unwise to grant the privilege requested. naturally into two portions: the plateau, on which stands the Observatory, and the shore property. The former portion should be reserved for buildings connected with the Observatory and for the residences of members of its staff. This would leave only the shore property for such use as that proposed by Professor Smith. While the University has at present no plans with reference to the disposition of this property, it is quite within the range of possibilities that it may some day be required in its entirety for some purpose connected with the University work, for instance the University may find it advisable to establish thereon a Summer School under the direction of the University Extension Department or some comprehensive plan may be devised for its use in the manner suggested by Professor Smith.

In the mean time it would in my opinion be unwise to permit the piecemeal occupancy of the property for such substantial improvements as the house which Professor Smith proposes to build. The University would in such ease be compelled to safeguard the future disposition of the property by building restrictions and provisions for vacation which would rightly be considered onerous and any attempt to enforce them would surely create a situation disagreeable for all Parties concerned.

From the standpoint of members of the faculty desiring to erect houses of considerable cost, it seems wiser that they should purchase lets in the vicinity of the University of th this would add only a relatively small amount to their in vestment and would give it a permanent value which it come to the contract of the co not have if made upon such insecure tenure as the University could grant.

I have never had the honor to address you before, and I want no money and no answer. I write because I feel impelled to express to you the enthusias tic admiration which I feel as a student of education for President Harper, whom I do not think the country quite justly appreciates. I think no one in the whole field of education has shown such genius for organization; has himself grown more rapidly in office, has given to college and university work so many new and good lideas has hear so unsulfied, shown such powers good ideas, has been so unselfish, shown such powers of sustained and effective work, has so admirably combined the enthusiasm of a scholar and that of an administrator. Even his annual Register is full of stimulating new ideas. Eastern college presidents were a little disposed to look askance upon him at first but their attitude has greatly changed, although even yet I do not think they appreciate him at his full worth. He will go down in the history of education as a man who marks a great and salutary epoch.

Please pardon these ejaculations, which I am imperied to expand into details. Of course you know him better than I, but this view-point is at a different angle. He would probably be shocked to know I thought of writing you. While I know him it is not intimately, and our personal relations, I suppose, may not be quite cordial, because he took away a number of our professors at the start, but my appreciation of his character and his work is almost unbounded, and while you may never have heard of me, I want you to know that from the point of view of another institution, he looms up as a great figure in his

To the Members of the Board of Trustees,

On two occasions, namely, February 23rd,1904 and February 13th,1905, a special committee of the Board has proposed that I should take a special vacation of six months in view of the strenuous character of the months in view of the stremuous character of the services which I had performed in behalf of the University's interests. I am writing to report to the Board that the time has come when upon the whole it seems best to accept this most generous invitation of the trustees, and with their permission I should be glad to enter upon such a vacation January 1st. 1906.

While no explicit statement is made in reference to While no explicit statement is made in reference to the salary which is to be paid me during this period, the general proposition submitted by me to the trustees and on the basis of which their proposition is returned together with the exigencies of the case make it necessary that I ask for payment of full salary during this period. This may be a request altogether unreasonable on my part, but I do not see how under all the circumstances I can arrange matters in a different manner, and it has been the form of all expression to which nevermi members of the Board have given utterance manner, and it has been the load that ellipsession to which several members of the Board have given utterance on different occasions. If my recollection serves me aright such action on the part of trustees of other universities is not altogether unknown.

I shall not be at a distance from the city and shall therefore be within reasonable touch with the affairs of the University, and it will give me the greatest possible pleasure to come in contact with

A letter from Pres. Ryerson to Messrs. Rockefeller Jr. & Gates relating to the Law School deficits was submitted

The Auditor was requested to report to the Board any Deficits deficits that are likely to be permanent losses.

The following report was submitted and consideration of it was deferred until the March meeting of the Board:

Board of Trustees Gentlemen: --

Men's

From the investigation I have made of the operation of the Men's Commons up to this time and the experiments and economies inaugurated by Miss Yeomans for the purpose of diminishing the deficit, it seems clear that the operation of the Commons in the large room cannot at present be conducted without a deficit. It seems clear that the present plan of service A la carte, is preferable to the one of regular charges for meals, and yet, as the result of the experience up to this time, it seems certain in all except the summer quarter the deficit is likely to be from \$200. to \$900. Per month. After a careful canvass of the situation with Miss Yeomans and Miss Shaw it seems advisable for the purpose of preventing further increase of the deficit to discontinue the use of the main dining room delicit to discontinue the use of the main dining room for the regular service, and confine it, except during the summer quarter, to the Cafe! For that purpose it will be necessary to remove, at least temporarily, the east 44 feet of the counter, that is from a point about 4 feet east of the counter, for that portion of the room. The introduction of the tables makes it practically impossible to get your to sit at the counters the tables impossible to get men to sit at the counters, the tables being preferred, but, by leaving the counters, the tather being preferred, but, by leaving the remaining portion, all that can be induced to occupy them can be accommoda-

In making this recommendation we have not lost sight of the desirability of having the large room maintained when it can be done without substantial loss, nor of the fact that entertainments will be desirable occasionally in the large room and that this change will increase the cost of them, but it would seem that such entertainments ought not to be given unless the cost, including

this extra amount, can be provided.
In this connection I should like to recommend a slight change in the office in the Commons Building, which seems to be imperatively necessary, namely-the cutting off of the north portion of the closet east of the office for a ladies' toilet, cutting a door in the northeast corner of the office into it. This provision seems absolutely necessary as the Commons de being

So long as there were any funds in the School of Education account the deficits were paid therefrom, since that time they have been paid from the General Account of the University.

2. The University College.

The University College owes the Railway Courses about \$1300. for balance unexpended last year. This will aggregate a total loss on June 30,1906 (estimated) of \$5139.25. If the Railway Courses be charged with a proportion of rent of rooms in Fine Arts Bldg. which were leased for them but are not being used by them the deficit will be diminished by a like amount.

The University Press.

The following was submitted from the Committee appointed to prepare a statement on the subject and ordered spread upon the minutes, - the Committee being Messrs. Bartlett, Barton & Hamilton.

By the death of Marshall Field, the earthly career of a man of genius was closed. The life of Mr. Field furnished the most perfect example of great commercial and financial ability, coupled with unswerving purpose and integrity, this country has ever seen. In the city of his choice, Kr. Field was the chief exponent of the methods which are the outgrowth of the higher education of a man of affairs in those principles and rules that should govern the business world. He

and rules that should govern the business world. He became not only a man of fortune, but the veritable head of the University of Business in Chicago.

His career, marked by perfect honor and unequalled success, is made the rettern for young man. success, is made the pattern for young men of this and

success, is made the part of the succeeding generations.

Mr. Field was a friend and benefactor of the University of Chicago. He was one of the original incorporators. He assisted in its foundation by donating land,

and has since made liberal subscriptions to its funds. He was also an honorary member of the Congregation.

The Board of Trustees, in behalf of the University, express their deep sorrow at the loss to the community and the country of a worthy and high-minded citizen, and desire to convey to the members of Mr. Field's family sincere sympathy in their great bereavement.

The following report and recommendations were submitted by Acting President Judson, and after consideration approved.

During the autumn it was decided that the June Anniversary Convocation should be devoted to the colebration of the Fifteenth Anniversary of the Present University and the Fiftieth of the old. At the request of President Harper a committee of the Board was appointed to consider the matter, and at the same time a faculty committee was appointed to draft a plan. This plan contemplating festivities on a considerable scale was duly drafted and submitted to the President. He was greatly pleased with it and sent it back to have the plans advanced. Knowing the situation, the committee, of which I was chairman, laid the matter aside. After the President's death the question then arose as to whether any part of the original plan should be carried out. On the whole it has seemed to those who have considered the matter in the faculties that it would be wise to have matter in the lactifies that to would be wise the occasion commemorated, for these reasons: (1) It was very much the desire of Dr. Karper that the anniversaries in question should not be allowed to pass unnoticed. (2) The coming together of the Fifteenth anniversary of the one institution and the Fiftieth of the other of course gave a unique occasion. (3) It is quite desirable that as was originally intended the alumni should be brought together and the occasion as an alumni gathering should be emphasized. (4) It seems proper that the occasion also should be used to commencement rate the great work of Dr. Harper in the first period of the University history.

The original plans have been revised and all of the the original plans have been revised and all of the special festivities have been eliminated. The present plan contemplates a very dignified programme devoted to the purposes above named.

No expense of any moment beyond that which would

ordinarily be incurred is necessary.

In the matter of expense there is one question. Five years ago the University Akumni list was published Catalogue. at a considerable cost. It has been estimated that this can be done in a modest way at a cost not to exceed 3700. Of course if it is done at all the work must be taken up immediately. It is recommended that the preparation of the alumni list be authorized and that the 3700. For the prupose be appropriated from the Contingent Fund.

Biological Acting President Judson submitted the following Departments of the ments. University.

To the President of the University of Chicago. Dear Sira: --

It is the desire of the Biological Departments of the University to call the attention of the administration to certain important considerations in reference to the present condition and future development of these departments.

It is assumed that the purpose is to emphasize the biological work of the University on the side of research biological work of the University on the sade of research rather than on the side of undergraduate instruction. This purpose seems wise because of the presence of numerous strong institutions in our immediate territory well equipped for undergraduate instruction; and because of equipped for undergraduate instruction; and because of the absence of any strong development of research work at these institutions. It must not be inferred that we are suggesting any lack of attention to undergraduate instruction; but that to develop it in the presence of strong competition at the expense of research facilities, in which there is feeble competition, would seem unwise-it is urged that under the present conditions, high standards as a center of research not only cannot be attained, but also that such prestige in his regard as has been secured is being lost and for the following reasons:

reasons:

1. The loss of such conspicuous members of the biological staff as Professor Donaldson, Berker, and Davenport, without any compensation in the way of new men of established reputation, is a public confession of a serious reduction in the opportunities for research. In addition to this the loss of associates and assistants has thrown heavy work of instruction upon those who remain, consuming much of the time and energy that might better be given to research.

2. The most important modern movement in biological research demands an abundant supply of animals and plants under control for experimentation, for which there are no familities here, even of the most meager kind. To several departments provision for expeditions is absolutely necessary; and heretofore in most cases this has been Ly necessary; and heretefore in most cases this has been cared for in the most heager way, either at private expense or by outside grants, neither method redounding to the credit of the University. In these regards we are far behind neighboring institutions, and very far behind the general facilities for such research in this country. Our biolegical establishment for research is now antiquated and will not permit the biological departments to continue to share properly in the general departments to continue to share properly in the general brogress of the subject. The inevitable effect of this upon our pressige is evident. Included in this lack of facilities is the notable lack of space, which in many cases compels both instruction and research to be carried on under most unfavorable and even trying conditions.

3. The lack of sufficient laboratory assistance to free investigators from an overwhelming burden of drudgery. This is resulting in a serious reduction of the productivity of the staff. A conspicuous illustration of this is seen in the crippling of the research work in several departments by inadequate provision for the medical work, diverting time and equipment and

the medical work, diverting time and equipment and crowding out research students.

In view of these facts, it is maintained that the biological departments have reached a most serious crisis in their history. If it is the policy to continue them in their present condition, we wish to make it plain that it will probably be attended by a loss of research students and by a distinct decline in the reputation of the University as an important center of biological research. University as an important center of biological research.

Therefore, we would ask: . That the biological departments be invited to state the immediate needs for preserving their reputation

2. We would join in urging at this time the most pressing common need of the biological departments, namely, a biological farm, which is absolutely necessary for the prosecution of research in the most important biological problems of the day. We believe that it would be the second of the day. would be wise to take the first step in this direction immediately by purchasing about forty acres of land, which can now be had at a reasonable figure but will apply the state of the state soon be very costly. Development and equipment could await opportunity if once the land were secured. A full memorial on this subject will be presented shortly.
