- c) In the case of a large department a secretary shall ordinarily be appointed by the President from the department to aid in the work of administration . For this work he shall receive appropriate compensation.
- d. The chairman shall preside at all meetings of the department. He shall be the executive officer of the department and be charged with the power and duty of carrying out the regulations adopted by the department. He shall be the official representative of the department in all official communications with the President and with other officers and boards of the University, and also in all departmental communications with students.

Section 3. Exceptions.

The method of departmental organization and management provided for in Section 2 above shall be applied to departments having permanent heads at the time this legislation is enacted, when the headship of such department shall become vacant, provided, however, that other forms may in exceptional cases be temporarily adopted.

You will observe from Statement #5 that there is an increase in budget net earnings of \$1202.34. This however, is only an apparent increase because in this year's receipts is included the instalment of \$2000. from Mr. Rockefeller for the School of Education whereas the instalment for last year was not paid whereas the instanment for last year was not plant at this time. There are also variations in the educate of receipts of the High School and the Elementary School fees as compared with last year because of the change from the quarterly to the semester basis. After making adjustments for these variations there is a decrease in net receipts of about \$6848.

The Commons accounts show an increase in net of \$1484.58 which is due to the splendid showing of \$1484-05 which is due to the spiended showing made by the Women's Commons. The Men's Commons is running behind at the rate of about \$500. a month and has a deficit on January 31 of \$2004.94. The School of Education lunch room has a deficit on January 31 of \$949.26. This is due to the fact that special equipment costing \$1363. has been put in the Lunch Room. The deficit on its account will gradually be extinguished before the end of the year at the present rate of increase in net.

H.a. Rust

The Trustees of the University of Chicago have learned with profound sorrow of the death of the friend and former associate Henry A. Rust. We recall, that, a trustee of the Old University; he was also intersted from the beginning in the establishment of the new one. He aided most generously in the securing of the initial fund for the founding of the University. He was a member of the first Board of Trustees and present at its first meeting, July 9, 1890. He was made Vice-President of the Board in December 1891 and continued in that office until 1894 when he was made Comptroller and Business manager. In this position he served the University with great fidelity and ability for nearly nine years. In February 1903 having passed the age of seventy he laid down the burdens of the office in which he had rendered such conspicuous service. He was invited by the Board to accept the position of Superintendent of Construction, but, declining this appointment, he was, in 1905, again elected a trustee and in 1906 once more served for some months as Vice-President. In 1907 he resigned as trustee and finally severed his official connection with the University, the trustees accepting his resignation with extreme reluctance.

Major Rust had a honorable record in the Civil War, which he continued as a business man in Chicago for nearly half a century. He was always interested in the cause of higher education and was for many years a trustee of the Old University of Chicago, - The Hahneman Medical College, The Frances Shimer Academy, as well as of our own University. He was a trustee of the Hahneman Hospital, and during a great part of his life one of the most useful and honored member 4 of the Memorial Baptist Church. He was a strong man, of positive character, earnest convictions, upright character, liberal spirit and spotless reputation.

The Trustees extend to his children their deepest sympathy.

In the death of Edward Goodman the Trustees of the University of Chicago realize that a life long friend of higher education has passed away. They recall that for forty-nine years he was connected as Treasurer and Trustee with the Baptist Theological Union and the Theological Seminary, now the Divinity School of the University.

Vman

Mr. Goodman was a member of the first Board of Trustees of the University and was present at the first meeting of the Board held July 9, 1890. He continued to serve as a Trustee for nineteen hears, until July 1909, when the infirmities of age led him to suggest that a younger man be elected in his place. The University had no warmer friend or more faithful Trustee than Mr. Goodman. He served efficiently as chairman of the Standing Committee on the University Press for many years. His continued attendance of the meetings of the Trustees even after his health became impaired was most gratifying to his associates.

He was a man of such devout, spiritual character that he was commonly depended on to offer the prayer at the opening of the meetings of the Trustees.

Mr. Goodman played a great part in the life of his denomination, not only in Chicago but throughout the country. His connection with the denominational paper, continuing through more than fifty years, first as agent, afterward as part owner and editor, gave him a position and an influence of far reaching power. In his death the Baptist denomination has lost one of its most useful men and the world is poorer for

"By reference to the Comparative Statement you will note that there is an increase in net receipts on the Budget of \$36611-32. However, after making adjustments to allow for the variation in date of receipt of income as compared with het year the note. with last year the net receipts are about equal to what with last lear the het receipts are about equal they were last year. There is a net increase in the Commons account of \$314.66. This is due entirely to the good showing of the Women's Commons, the Men's Commons showing a decrease as compared with last year of \$2715.46 and the Lunch Room a decrease of \$2124.60. Much of the Lunch Room decrease, however, is due to additional equipment purchased.

The debit to the University Press on the books of the University is \$145544.35 or \$5544.35 in excess of the capital allowed. I have withheld the payment of bills during the month of May until receipts are received sufficient to cover the overdraft. The receipts to date in May are about \$2400. In excess of those last year.

I also submit herewith statement showing the estimated receipts and expenditures from Budget account to June 30, 1911, based on the actual figures for the first ten months and estimated for the last two months. The statement 28 am betimeted with the original estimates show a not increase in receipts of \$20600. and a net increase in expenditures of \$16287. resulting in an estimated surplus of \$4313. This Syndicate is formed for the purpose of consodiating the surface and elevated reilways of the City. If the plan should succeed, it is supposed that 16,000,000 of 65 cumulative preferred stock will sell at a premium and that the 25,000,000 of common stock will show an actual value of 80% one stare of preferred stock carries with it a bonus of 80% of common. 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III. THE BINDING OF BOOKS

18. Binding orders for books in Departmental Libraries, including volumes of periodicals, are prepared by the Departmental Library concerned, and are submitted with the book to the Binding Department; other binding orders are prepared by the Binding Department. Suggestions for binding may originate with any officer of the Libraries or of the department concerned.

24. Any person making use of the Libraries may be called upon to register his name, residence, and occupation.

THE CIRCULATION OF BOOKS: GENERAL RULES

26. No book, map, manuscript, periodical, pamphlet, print, or other article is taken from any Library, by any person, unless record of withdrawal is made at the time. Any person drawing a book from the Libraries or having it charmed the content of the co it charged against him for use in the Library is responsible for it until it has been returned to the attendant and due record of such return has been made.

27. General encyclopedias, dictionaries, and such other books as the Libraries deem necessary to withdraw from outside circulation are used in the Library only. Certain reserved and reference books may be drawn for

28. Unbound numbers of periodicals are used in the Library only, but 20. Unbound numbers of periodicals are used in the Library only, out-other numbers than the last may be drawn for over-night use. Exceptions to this rule are made by departmental rules subject to the approval of the Board of Libraries. Bound volumes and duplicate copies of periodicals are subject to the general rules for bound books.

THE CIRCULATION OF BOOKS IN THE UNIVERSITY

29. Subject to the rules respecting circulation and the general regulations of the Libraries, members of the University (including Trustees, administrative officers, members of the Faculties, and registered students) and employees of the Leville of the Faculties, and registered students) and employees of the Leville of the Faculties of the University have the privilege of drawing books from the General Library and the Library of the School of Education for use outside of the Libraries.

30. No person not a member of the Faculties may withdraw from the 39. No person not a member of the Faculties may winother from the circulating libraries more than three volumes at a time, nor may the total number drawn and not returned at any time exceed three. This limitation does not apply to books drawn on Faculty order. In exceptional cases a student example in research may be allowed to exceed this number at the discrete exception. cretion of the officer in charge.

31. Books drawn from the General Library may be retained two weeks, and may be once renewed for the same period. This rule does not apply to books reserved for over-night circulation.

THE CIRCULATION OF BOOKS AMONG PERSONS NOT MEMBERS OF THE UNIVERSITY

40. On recommendation of a member of the University, and payment to the Registrar of a library fee of \$2.50 a quarter, residents of Chicago, non-resident or visiting scholars, alumni, non-resident and former students of the University acquire the privilege of drawing books from the General Library and the Library of the School of Education, subject to the rules applicable to students of the University. Such persons are granted the privilege of using the Departmental Libraries by authority of the Director, or, in respect to a given library, by the Adviser of that library.

41. To scholars visiting Chicago complimentary cards, good for four weeks, are issued at the discretion of the Director.

42. The School of Education Library issues to teachers in the public schools of Chicago complimentary cards, giving the privilege of drawing books under the general rules of circulation.

43. The University Libraries loan books to other libraries so far as the 43. the University Libraries loan books to other mutates of the demand of the University community makes this possible. Application must be made in writing addressed to the Director and signed by the Librarian, or other like officer, of the Library requesting the loan.

44. Persons not connected with the University occasionally desiring the privileges of drawing books from the Libraries may

a) make application through a local library, said library assuming full liability for any loss resulting from any loan;
b) apply through an officer of the University, said officer assuming full

liability for any loss; or c) accompany the application with a deposit of twice the value of the book

or books desired 45. Books are loaned to other libraries and to persons not resident at the University on the following conditions:

a) Such loans must be authorized by the department or Library concerned through the Adviser or someone appointed by him.

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RETURN AND RECALL OF BOOKS

46. For reasons deemed sufficient by the Library Adviser of the Library to which the book belongs or by the Director, any book may be recalled at any time, and in such cases must be returned at once on receipt of notice.

47. The Library sends a notice in every case where a book is kept more than four days beyond the limit specified in these rules. At the request of the officer in charge, a notice is sent requiring immediate return of a book which it is deemed necessary to recall. These notices are issued for the General Library by the officer in charge of circulation; for the School of Education by its Librarian; for the Law School by its Librarian; for other Departmental Libraries by the Law School by its Librarian; for other Departmental Libraries by the Library Inspector. Extreme cases arising in any Library are reported to the Library Inspector for further action.

48. Any book lost or not returned within a reasonable time after notice has been sent, is either replaced within thirty days by the person in whose name the book has been drawn, or said person pays into the hands of the Director twice the present value of the book, as estimated by the Director.

V. LIBRARY HOURS AND PERIODS OF SERVICE

49. The following are the regulations respecting the period of service of

a) A week's work consists of 40 to 42 hours according to circumstances. Exceptions are made by special contract.

b) A member of the staff who has rendered forty-eight weeks of service is

entitled to four weeks of vacation on full pay.
c) After six months of service vacation will be credited pro rata. No vacation credit is given for less than six months' service, and vacation taken by a person leaving the service of the Libraries after less than six

months is treated as absence without pay. d) Members of the staff serving half-time or more, namely: 20 or more hours a week, receive vacation under this rule pro rata.

54. On non-reserved books drawn for over night the fine is 15 cents per day or fraction thereof.

55. For the removal of a book from any Library without making proper record of withdrawal, the fine is twenty-five cents for the first and fifty cents for each subsequent violation of the rule.

56. Students refusing or neglecting to pay fines due

a) do not receive credit for their courses until the fine is paid; b) do not receive honorable dismissal from the University;

c) forfeit the privilege of using the Libraries until the fine is paid.

57. No violation of the regulations of the Libraries will be excused on the plea of ignorance.

58. Any person violating these regulations may be denied the privilege of using any or all of the Libraries of the University either permanently or for a limited period of time, by a vote of the Board of Libraries with the approval of the President.

VII. PUBLICATION OF RULES

59. These rules are printed and a copy is sent to each member of the Faculty. A copy is placed in a conspicuous position in every Library of the University. Printed cards containing the rules in regard to the conditions under which books may be withdrawn from the Libraries are on distribution

60. Each member of the library staff is provided with a copy of these rules and is held responsible for acquaintance with them and conformity to

61. These rules may be amended by the Board of Libraries, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees in matters involving finance or general policy. In the intervals between the meetings of the Board of Libraries the Director may order necessary modifications of the rules.

Revision of Rules of University Press Acting President Burton submitted recommendations for the revision of Article 5 of Section 4 of the Rules of the University Press, recommended by the Director of the Press, as follows-

Sub-section 1 stipulates that charges for books and supplies should be billed at the cost of the goods

Also add a new sub-section to read as follows:

(3) Charges for services rendered in the purchase of books for the University Libraries shall be for a specific amount to be fixed annually by arrangement entered into by the Director of the Press and the Director of the Libraries and approved by the Committee on Expenditures.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Press and Extension with power.

Book Appropriations and Library Adm.

The recommendation of the Director of the Libraries that of such portion of the amount appropriated for the purchase of books as may be actually spent for books within the current year 10% be set aside for the expenses of purchase, and for this purpose be transferred from Book appropriation to the appropriation for Library Administration was approved.

George F. Dick Nethod of purchasing

The resignation of George F. Dick, Instructor in Pathology, was accepted to take effect September 30,1911,

Acting President Burton submitted the following recommendations which were referred to the Committee on Press and Extension for reports

The Director of the Libraries, having both before and since his appointment, given considerable time to the study of the question of the best method of purchasing books for the libraries, in particular having with the Director of the Press studied the situation both in the book markets of Europe and from the point of view of the internal arrangements of our own University, reached two convictions: first, that it was inexpedient to dissolve the relation hitherto existing between the Libraries and

the relation hitherto existing between the Libraries and the Press in the matter of the purchase of books, and second, that the arrangement between the Press and the Libraries could be very much simplified, with resulting economy and increase in efficiency. During the last year the Director of the Press and the Director of the Libraries have been engaged in an effort to bring about the necessary changes. As a result much duplication of records has been eliminated, the clerical work practically concentrated in the Library itself, foreign shipments increased in frequency, and in general the whole process of purchase simplified. As a consequence complaints of the purchasing department, which were formerly very frequent, have practically altogether ceased. As a further result, the Director of the Press and the Director of the Libraries concur in the wish that the clerical force formerly maintained by the Press, largely for the purpose of buying books for the Libraries, be transferred to the Libraries, and that the compensation of 10% of the amount of purchases hitherto paid to the Press be materially reduced in amount and changed from a percentage to a gross sum, to be fixed annually. The amount provisionally agreed upon between the Director of the Press and the Director of the Libraries for the current year is \$945., divided into three items, shipping \$200., rent, \$95. salary and general expenses, \$650. In concurring with the recommendation of the Director of the Press that the rule upon this point be revised, the Director of the Libraries desires to the Director of the Press has cooperated in bringing about these changes and of the very valuable and efficient assistance rendered to the Director of the Libraries

The carrying through of the above recommendation, as already indicated, will involve for the libraries. the payment to the Press of a certain sum for its services and certain expenses for clerical service previously paid by the Press. It is manifestly desirable that as soon as possible these expenses now incurred by budget and that the log deduction from book appropriations makes not adequate provision for these expenses. The log these reverses the recommendation of the present year, however, Director, therefore, is constrained to request that the log this provision for these expenses. The examination of the building incidental to this developed the further fact that the twin girders, instead of being tightly girded together so as to get the full combined strength, the shrinking of the wood and other causes, had so loosened the nuts that in many cases they ware sprung apart. I directed Wells Brothers Company to proceed with the installation of the basement posts and the tightening of the bolts on a basis of the Posts and the tightening of the bolts on a basis of the actual cost plus 10%. The cost as nearly as can be estimated for the entire work will be in the neighborhood of \$1300. to \$2000.
