

IN MEMORY OF DAVID GILBERT HAMILTON David Gilbert Hamilton a member of this board from June 27, 1893, died at his home in Chicago. February 16, 1915. He was born in Chicago, January 10, 1842. Having received his preparatory training, he entered Asbury University, now known as De Pauw University, at Greencastle, Indiana, from which he received his degree in 1865. He then took up the study of law in the law department of the old University of Chicago, and upon graduation from the law school, commenced the practice of his profession in Chicago. In his law practice Mr. Hamilton confined himself largely to examination of real estate titles and the management and settlement of estates and trusts. For this field of professional work his careful preparation in the law and his exact business methods fitted him admirably. His judgment and advice in matters pertaining to investments were highly valued by a large clientage. For some years he was actively engaged in the management and operation of street railway properties in Chicago and St. Louis. In 1885, he became interested in and a director and vice-president of , the Chicago City Railway Company. In 1899, he was chosen president of that company. While connected with the above company, he was also engaged in unifying, rebuilding and developing the engaged in unity of St. Louis. Mr. Hamilton was for street railways of St. Louis. many years resident director of the Union Mutual Life Insurance Company of Maine, a director of the Title & Trust Company of Chicago and a member of the board of trustees of De Pauw University.

In all these relations and positions of trust,

he was painstaking and conscientious in the discharge
of his duties and responsibilities. We place on reord our deep sense of loss, and extend our sympathy
to his family in their great bereavement.

Auditor's Report with the usual custom at this period of the year, I submit herewith a report showing the probable outcome of the budget receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1915, a report based on actual receipts and expenditures for the first nine months and on estimates for the last three months of the year.

It will be observed that the net surplus, It will be observed that the net surplus, as now estimated, is placed at \$58,321, of which amount \$25,000 has already been carried to enount \$25,000 has already been carried to ceneral Reserve, the net increase in receipts over the original estimate being \$126,232. Of this amount \$66,194 is increase in fees from

students. The net increase in expenditures after absorbing the Contingent Fund is \$67,911. In my report to the Board in November, I estimated that the surplus at the close of the year would be \$50,114; it is now estimated at \$58,321, an increase of \$8,207.

There have been increased receipts and expenditures over the report of November, and the net result is a gain as noted above, notwithstanding both the default on the part of the Western Pacific Railway in the payment of the interest on its first mortgage bonds due March 1, thus on its first mortgage bonds due March 1, thus reducing the income this year \$14,291, and, also reducing the income year.

As stated in my report in Movember the large increase in receipts from students over the original estimates, and the additional cost of scientific supplies due to the war necessitates expenditures in excess of the appropriation as will be noted from the report. There has been also a large demandfor the commutation of extra vacation credit at the customary discount of onethird, the cost of which is included in the expenditures. The increased expenditures for the maintenance of the buildings and grounds are in a large measure due to the new buildingswhich have been erected and have come into use during this year. The cost of heating them during construction and preparing them for occupancy, together with the cost of maintenance since occupancy have materially increased the budget expenditures. At the November meeting the Board authorized

At the November meeting the brake authorities the expenditures in excess of appropriations, so far as they could then be estimated, and I would far as they could then be estimated, and I would suggest that the present report be substituted for the one in November; and I further recommend that authority be given to the Committee on Expenditures to allow expenditures in excess of the appropriations as may be necessary to the amount shown in the accompanying report, and that authority be given to the Auditor to audit them, the same to be compensated for by the savings on other accounts and by the increased income over accounts and by the increased income over accounts and by the increased income over accounts.

Medical Colleges.

Third: The University of Chicago and Rush Medical College agree to unite with Northwestern University, Loyola University and the University of Illinois in an effort to make the requirement, after the year 1920. of one year as a hospital interne in the medical course a mandatory requirement in the eligibility of a candidate for medical license to practice in Illinois.

Tourth: The University of Chicago and Rush Redical College agree to unite with Northwestern University, Loyola University, and the University of Illinois in a concerted attempt to secure legislation which will authorize the State Board of Health to make a standard of license to practice in Illinois. which shall conform with the standards adopted by the above named universities.

It is understood by the University of Chicago and by Rush hedical College that no effort shall be made by the associated universities to induce the state legislature to appropriate any money for medical education other than that furnished by the University of Illinois.

Fifth: The University of Chicago and Rush Medical College recognize the great need of graduate medical teaching in Chicago and elsewhere in America. The standard of the graduate teaching should be similar and equal to that adopted in undergraduate medical work. Total mileage of the road aggregates 1,275 miles. Prior issues aggregate about \$10,000,000. Bonds subject to this issue aggregate \$50,146,000. Up to this time no committee has been appointed looking wholly or chiefly to the protection of this issue though a general committee is being arranged for to look after the interests of security holders including the interests of stockholders of which latter there is \$18,287,800.

I am in communication with other holders of bonds of this issue in the endeavor to secure the appointment of a represenative committee who would look after this particular interest. The i.mediate occasion for such action is in the fact that a proceeding has been instituted under the receivership by the holders of equipment notes endeavoring to have those equipment notes made a prior lien to the issue of bonds in which we are interested, on the plea that the equipment is essential to the operation of the road.
