On behalf of the Committee on Expenditures I beg to submit herewith a report showing the estimated outcome of the budget receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, based on actual results for the first ten months and estimates for the last two months of the year.

It is probably only necessary to mention one or two of the more important reasons for the heavy increases in both receipts and expenditures as compared with the original estimates. These estimates were made in December, 1915. Since that date there have been heavy increases in the student attendance necessitating additional expense for instruction. Furthermore, the general economic conditions have tended to increased income from stocks and on the other hand, by reason of increased prices of commodities, to cause heavy additions to operating expenses.

It will be noted that the net surplus as now estimated is \$245,150, the net increase in receipts

The estimated increase in fees from students for the fiscal year is now placed at \$146,202, whereas, in the report submitted to the Board at its February meeting, the estimated increase from students was \$130,992. Advances in price of coal and materials, extensive repairs required for the Cowan Building incident to its re-rental, and special assessments for paving Kenwood Avenue and Sixty-first Street are responsible for reductions in the estimates of income from the office and apartment buildings operated by the University, amounting, approximately, to \$19,326. Since the estimate of income has been made on a conservative basis, it is quite possible that this reduction of \$19,326 will be found to be somewhat less at the end of the year.

On account of the larger number of students it has been necessary to increase the estimate of expenditures somewhat above the amount mentioned in the report of February 15. Furthermore, owing to advances in price of materials, the operating expenses of the University, up to date, have been heavier than anticipated. The needs for building repairs and for furniture seemed to culminate this year, accordingly reducing the balances of the appropriations for the remainder of the fiscal year to such an extent that increases ever and above revised estimates adopted at the meeting of the Board on February 13 are necessary to carry on the work of the University on its present scale of operations.

The estimates of the increases in expenditures over the original figures are for the following purposes:

In the report which was presented to the Board February 13, 1917, it was estimated that the increase for instruction would be \$44,500. Since that date

It has been necessary, also, to add about \$4,000 to previous estimates for instruction to provide for the increase in attendance in the Spring Quarter (in the report presented to the Board February 13 no account of the possibility of increase in tuition for the Spring Quarter was taken into consideration. Especial attention is directed to the fact that during the Winter it was impossible to secure coal at the price contracted for at the beginning of the year, \$2.39 per ton. It has been necessary to purchase coal on the open market at current prices, sometimes paying more than double the contract price mentioned. On account of this condition and because the fuel available was often inferior in quality to the coal contracted for, a greater tonnage has been consumed. It was only with the most persistent efforts that the University was kept supplied with coal, and, at one time during the cold weather, the supply on hand did not exceed six hours' consumption. On the basis of the present estimates it appears to be necessary to provide for an expenditure for coal amounting to \$58,030, for the fiscal year, as compared with the original estimate of \$41,530, an increase of \$16,500.

There have been, also, unusual expenses on account of epidemics of scarlet fever, measles, etc., to meet which emergency there have been medical examinations for all students, hospital bills, and other expenses aggregating several hundred dollars.

It is requested that authority be given to the Committee on Expenditures to allow expenditures in excess of the appropriations as may be necessary to the amount shown in the accompanying report, and that authority be given to the Auditor to audit them, the same to be compensated for by savings on other accounts and by the increased income over original estimates.

status of medical affairs:

At the last meeting of the Board pledges were reported amounting to \$5,164,000, besides the pledge of Dr. Norman Bridge for the reconstruction of the Senn Hall, amounting to \$30,000. This gift probably would be accepted by the eastern boards, but it would be desirable that it should be kept separate from the entire fund. Since the April meeting there have been the following gifts: Mr. F. A. Hardy, \$10,000; Mr. J. G. Shedd, \$25,000; Mr. Fred Haskell, \$25,000; Mr. David B. Jones, \$50,000; totaling \$110,000. This brings up the entire contributions to \$5,274,000, not including Dr. Bridge's \$30,000. There is definite reason to expect further gifts, which will not merely complete the fund of \$5,300,000, but will pass beyond it. Re Medical Schools, University of Chicago: 1. There are to be two distinct schools, the medical school for teaching and research on the Midway -hereafter called simply the Medical School -- of the general character and scope of the Johns Hopkins Medi-cal School, and a Postgraduate School or Polyclinic for practitioners, on the West Side. Each school is to have its separate faculty, dean, and budget. There may be an Administrative Committee or Board, consisting, for example, of the President and the two deans, as the Board of Trustees may determine, for action on general questions relating to medical teaching and research.

2. The clinical as well as the laboratory departments of the Medical School will be organized on the full-time basis. On the clinical side this will at the outset apply to medicine, surgery, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology. Part-time men may be utilized in the dispensary, and in the specialties, as required.

3. The Polyclinic, or Postgraduate School, will have a full-time laboratory staff, and, as opportunity arises, full-time clinical assistants. The main clinical staff will be part-time. The present staff of the Presbyterian Hospital will be reorganized by the University when the Polyclinic is started.

4. For admission to the Medical School, a Bachelor's degree, with special requirement of physics, chemistry, biology, German, and French, will be requisite. Allowance may be made by the University in case of students who have pursued any of the fundamental medical sciences as part of the work leading to the Bachelor's degree.

5. The Polyclinic shall be open to holders of the M.D. degree.

In connection with the pending war with Germany we have been considering measures to safe-guard the securities belonging to our various philanthropic boards. In this connection Mr. Nyers suggests that the securities, as yet undelivered, which form a part of Mr. Rockefeller's Ten million dolkar gift to the University of Chicago in 1910, be now delivered to the University under an agreement by which they will account and pay to the General Education Board the income on the payments not due, the same as if the securities had not been delivered. His idea is that the securities will probably be safer away from the seaboard, and that the responsibilities of guarding them could be placed upon the University.

by its deed of August 24th, A.D. 1891, and Whereas, said deed was made upon the express condition that said premises should, for the period or term of one hundred years from the date thereof, be used exclusively by the University for educational purposes as a site of a College or University, and upon the further express condition that the University should, at no time, alienate or mortgage the premises for any debt or other purpose without the consent of the Society, and upon the further express condition that the requirements as set forth in the Charter of the University that the President and two-thirds of the Board of Trustees of the University shall be members of regular Baptist Churches shall be at all times complied with, and that in the event of the breach of any of these conditions the title to the said premises should revert to the Society; and

Whereas, the enexpected present magnitude of the University and its increasing importance in the educational world make these conditions in the title to what is now but a small part of the campus unbecoming to the dignity of the institution; Therefore

Resolved, that for the purpose of clearing title to make absolute in the University the title to that portion of the ground occupied by the University to which those conditions attach, the Executive Board of American Baptist Education Society be requested to execute to the University of Chicago a quit claim deed of Blocks Two (2), Three (3) and Seven (7) in Marshall Field's Addition to Chicago in the east half of the northwest quarter of Section Fourteen (14), Township Thirty-eight (38) north, Range Fourteen (14) east of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois, waiving and releasing all of the conditions contained in the deed of said property from the American Baptist Education Society to The University of Chicago dated August 24, 1891, filed for record in the Recorder's Office of Cook County, Illinois on September 22, 1891 and recorded in Book 3235 of Records at page 595, and to waive and release all rights of reversion reserved by or to the American Baptist Education Society under said last mentioned deed.

Resolved, that it is the sense of the Board of Trustees of the University of Chicago that no change in the provisions of the Charter of the University requiring the President and two-thirds of the Board of Trustees shall be members of regular Baptist churches should be made without consultation with the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Education Society and full opportunity for discussion.

It was moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted, and, a vote having been taken, the motion was declared adopted.

At the April meeting of the Board, an appropriation of \$4,850 was made from General Reserve for the Department of Anatomy, to be used in special medical research under the direction of Dr. Preston Kyes. It now developes that an additional appropriation is required to remodel and equip the building at the southwest corner of Fifty-seventh Street and Ellis Avenue, to be used as a laboratory by Dr. Kyes.

It was moved and seconded that \$2,000 be transferred from General Reserve to the Budget and be appropriated for equipment, furniture and repairs for the above mentioned purpose, and, a vote having been taken, the motion was declared adopted.

An official transcript of the action of the Board of Trustees at the meeting of May 15, 1917, was laid before the General Education Board at its meeting in New York, Thursday, May 24, 1917, together with certified copies of the letters of gift toward the medical fund. This was accompanied by a verbal report on the entire situation. I am herewith submitting the following certified transcript from the action of the General Education Board in accordance therewith. I beg to submit also a later communication from the Secretary of the General Education Board in the same connection.

"President Judson reported that the University of Chicago had raised the supplemental sum for the endowment of its Medical School as required by the resolution of the Board adopted at its meeting held October 26, 1916. Counsel having examined pledges, the following minute and resolutions were adopted:

"This Board, at a meeting held October 26, leving adopted a resolution of which the following is a copy:

"Resolved Further, that the Executive Committee be authorized to arrange with the Executive Committee of the Rockefeller Foundation for the transfer of its subscription of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) towards the same object and under the same conditions."

In the matter of the guaranty by the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad Company of the interest on the bonds of the Western Pacific Railway, the United States District Court of New York has found in favor of the bondholders, sustaining the contract of guaranty against the Denver and Rio Grande. A decree was directed for the amount of the installments of interest (each being 31,250,000) falling due March 1 and September 1, 1915 and March 1, 1916, less in each case the amount of earnings made by the cld company or by its receivers applicable in regular course to the payment of interest and for the capitalized sum of \$32,272,274.45, together with interest upon the whole. The total amount of the judgment on this basis will, it is understood, be something like \$36,000,000.

The total amount of bonds held by the University was \$786,000, \$524,000 being still in the hands of the General Education Board as part of the final gift. These bonds are now represented by 4,585 shares of preferred stock of \$100 each and 6,877½ shares of common stock of \$100 each in the Western Pacific Railroad Corporation.

The women's dormitories of the University accommodate 270 of the 1,476 of the women students in attendance at the present time. The fraternities help out as to the housing of the men. For obvious reasons the need is greater for the women than for the men. Miss Barton, the head of the Housing Bureau, has the work of outside students well in hand. Her inspection of houses and apartments occupied by students covers about fifteen hundred. In order to supplement dormitory provision with something as nearly approaching it as possible she has, after investigating the methods adopted in other institutions for a like purpose, suggested that the three flat building at 5845 Drexel Avenue, owned by the University, be turned over to be used by the young women of the University upon a co-operative plan.

Fundamentally, this plan implies that, in order to save money on board and room, and in order to secure the social and economic advantages obtainable through a self-selected group of students who undertake a portion of the housework, the rooms be rented to them by the University upon a commercial basis. The plan implies a subsidy to the extent of furnishing of the rooms and the upkeep of such furniture. The saving in outlay to the student amounts to from \$75 to \$100 per year in cash which is more than the girl could earn by unskilled labor outside by giving an hour a day. These plans are in successful operation in the Universities of Minnesota and Wisconsin. In addition to the economies and independence involved in the plan, it must be emphasized that there are opportunities for real friendships to develop and happy group life is evolved, both of which aspects present a favorable contrast to the isolation of the off-campus rooming house. Training in household efficiency is a by-product of such co-operative house-

The apartment building mentioned would make room for a total of some twenty girls; the rental would amount to \$96 a month at the rate of \$6 each. The net return of this building at present is \$433. The taxes are about \$150 per year. If used for the foregoing purpose it would be exempt from taxation.

A contract was let to the firm of A. H. Andrews & Company for construction of certain cases of drawers Museum for Walker Museum for the price of \$4,500. The work was sublet by Andrews & Company to a manufacturing concern in St. Louis. Drawers were completed but were found to be not interchangeable with the drawers Co. in the old cases. This interchangeability is an essential feature since drawers throughout the building for teaching and seminary work are interchangeable with cases in the lecture and similar rooms.

There is a dispute as to the responsibility of the mistake. The probabilities are that we could recover from Andrews & Company if we should go forward and build new drawers and charge the cost to them, but this would occasion considerable delay, expense, annoyance and waste of time.

It has been found that the drawers could be changed at a cost of \$2,000. I have suggested to Andrews & Company that we would be willing, if the work could be completed promptly, to pay one-third of this additional cost. This suggestion was adopted by them and, upon the advice of the President of the Board and in order to save time as the need for the drawers is pressing, I issued an order for the amount

of \$666.66 upon this basis.

The Andrews Company's bid originally was some \$1,500 below the lowest other bidder so that we are still considerably below the cost if we had employed any other contractor.

President Harry P. Judson, University of Chicago.

I think you will be interested in knowing of the various types of service which the students of University High School have been rendering this spring. Perhaps the most significant is the contribution of slightly over \$2200 to the American Ambulance Field Service in France. The idea originated in the student council organized in the Senior class, and the organization and execution of the plan was carried out wholly by them. The contributions ranged from ten cents to fifty dollars, and more than three hundred of our four hundred students shared in the gift. \$600 of this amount is to be set aside for the support of Rowland Campbell, a graduate of the High School of last June, who is now with the Ambulance Service in France.

The group of twenty-four boys who went to the farms in Indiana with Mr. Filbey have returned in good physical condition and spirit feeling that they have made personal contributions to meet the country's needs. About \$200 will remain from their wages after all expenses are paid. This, under the terms of their contracts will be turned over to the school to be used for purposes of war relief.

This is in confirmation of my verbal agree- Rawson ment made with Dr. Billings last December to give The Laboratory University of Chicago \$300,000. for the construction and equipment of a laboratory building to be known as the Rawson Laboratory (of medicine and surgery), location to be satisfactory to the Board of Trustees of the Presbyterian Hospital, to be used for teaching and investigation in medical science. It is understood that the University will assume the unexpired term of the 99-year agreement entered into between the Rush Medical College and the Presbyterian Hospital of Chicago, or provide in some other manner for the carrying out of the provisions thereof, and that during the continuance of the relation between the University and the Presbyterian Hospital, the aforesaid Rawson Laboratory will be used in connection with said Hospital.

I will make payment of the above amount in five installments, viz: \$60,000. during the year 1917 and \$60,000. during each and every year thereafter until the said sum of \$300,000. shall have been fully

I reserve, however, the privilege of cancelling the above obligation by conveying to the University during the year 1917, the property located at the northwest corner of Sherman and Van Buren Streets in this city, having a frontage of one hundred feet on Van Buren Street and a depth of seventyfive feet on Sherman Street, heretofore mentioned to you, the value of which I am told by Mr. Heckman you have judged to be the equal of \$300,000. or more, subject to the taxes for the year 1917 and any installments of special assessments not yet due.

While not making this paragraph a condition of the gift, I would very much appreciate it if you would employ as architect for this laboratory, Mr. Benjamin H. Marshall of the architectural and engineering firm of Marshall & Fox, whom I regard very highly as an architect. His work in Chicago and elsewhere is so well known that I feel sure all the Trustees are familiar with it.

WHEREAS, up to and including January 1, 1917, seven installments of one-tenth of the original amount were delivered to the University, and the three remaining installments of said securities of the approximate value of One million dollars (\$1,000,000.) each are deliverable on January 1st of 1918, 1919 and 1920 respectively; and

As I will be absent from the city next Tuesday, I wish you would present this letter for action at the meeting of the Board of Trustees Tuesday, July

At a meeting of the Committee on Press and Extension, held June 21, 1917, the question of replacing some of our binding equipment and purchasing some additional equipment was referred to a committee consisting of Mr. Ryerson, Mr. Heckman and myself for action. After carefully canvassing the matter and getting the report of the superintendent of my own bindery upon the matter, the sub-committee decided to recommend for purchase bindery machinery amounting to \$6,979. The reserve for depreciation of the machinery account of the Press now amounts to something over \$9,000, so that this purchase would not increase the original investment in plant. In the judgment of myself and the superintendent of my bindery, these machines are necessary to enable the Press to produce its binding with any reasonable expedition and the installation will also materially reduce the cost of production. As the price of this material is constantly advancing, we have placed these orders, subject to the approval of the Board.
