## PREFACE

The section "Gifts, From" has been omitted, but gifts continue to be listed under the name of the donor. The phrase formerly used "Gift for support of the University" is shortened to "Gift".

If the gift was for a specific purpose that purpose is listed in the index. The volumes before 1950 included a separate list of names of all individuals mentioned. This list has been discontinued as the names are all included in the index. Mc and Mac are listed together as though spelled Mac, as is the custom in large libraries. Many cross references are included to aid the reader in finding the material wanted.

Pages listing gifts are under name of subject as: Biological Sciences, gifts for; Cancer research, gifts; Divinity School, gifts for; etc.

Under the name of a Trustee are listed all the committees on which the man served during the year.





The minutes of the last regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, held November 12, 1953, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Budget held on December 7, 1953, December 21, 1953, and January 4, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Investment Committee held November 19, 1953, were presented for approval. Upon the request of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees such minutes were amended by inserting the word "not" immediately preceding the word "buy" in the seventh line from the bottom of page six of said minutes, and the minutes as amended were approved.

The Chairman referred to the luncheon meeting of the Board that had been held that date at the Mid-Day Club at which Mitford M. Mathews, Editor, Dictionary Department of the University Press and Professorial Lecturer in the Department of Linguistics had discussed interesting aspects of a work published by the University Press in 1951 of which he was editor, entitled: "A Dictionary of Americanisms on Historical Principles." The Chairman also stated that the wives of the Trustees met on the campus at the same time as the luncheon meeting, heard the Chancellor discuss University matters of interest, and made a tour of the campus.

Mr. Swift, Chairman of the Committee on Government Contracts, presented the following report on behalf of the Committee, and commented thereon:

REPORT
COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS
January 14, 1954

The Committee met at the Mid-Day Club on January 7, its only session since the report to the Board at its June meetings. All members were present except Dr. Wilson. However, the situation has been reviewed with him and he approves this report. The Chairman of the Board, the Chancellor, and Messrs. Harrison, Harrell, Filbey, and Kirkpatrick attended. The officers reviewed various aspects of our contracts with the Government now in progress.

The Comptroller presented a summary comparison of contract expenditures and overhead allowances over a period of five years.

The total government contract expenditures for 1952-53 were \$30,176,514, a decrease of approximately \$600,000 from the year before. Of the above figure, Argonne National Laboratory was slightly over \$22,000,000, which left approximately \$8,000,000 expenditures in other projects. The year reflected a decrease of approximately \$3,500,000 in Argonne National Laboratory and an increase of approximately \$2,900,000 in other government contracts. Of the total expenditure, Physical Sciences Division expended 62 per cent, Biological Sciences 29 per cent, Social Sciences 4 per cent, and other divisions 5 per cent. The number of contracts increased from 212 on October 1, 1952, to 228 on July 1, 1953.

Overhead allowances under government contracts during 1952-53 were \$1,655,307, a reduction of approximately \$177,000, or 9.6 per cent, from the previous year. Although Air Force contracts overhead increased \$200,000, the substantial cut in Argonne National Laboratories in 1951 could not be compensated for. While our expenses have appreciably increased as a result of government contracts (over \$100,000 per year in the Comptroller's Division alone) the Committee feels the overhead is fully adequate to cover expenses.

As indicated by Dr. Wilson last spring, it is believed that the tendency toward a broader spread of government support of basic research over a wider area of academic interests is a healthy one. The Committee

Dean of Faculties stated that, although there is continuing concern in the Faculty over the possible effect of dependence upon the Government for support of research, academic worries about possible ill effects have steadily lessened as experience with government sponsorship has accumulated. He assured the Committee that this is due to the persistent and growing recognition by the government agencies of the value of and need for basic research, - to recognition of the necessity of supporting the research ideas of the investigator, - and not an indication of a shift of academic interest to practical or applied problems.

Mr. Harrell stated that it is not possible at this time to make an accurate forecast as to the amount of government contract support for the next academic year. He indicated, however, there is no evidence to date that the current economy moves in the Federal Government are having any deleterious effect upon the support of basic research, or even upon such special off-campus operations as are being operated by the University. His present estimate is that support in the next fiscal year will be at substantially the same level as in the current year.

Government contracts bear some of the salary load that would otherwise have to be borne by the Regular Budget. At the end of this last fiscal year there were 380 faculty members on indefinite tenure whose salaries totalled \$3,600,000. Of these, 47 with salaries of \$580,000 had all or part of their salaries in the amount of \$280,000 (48 per cent) borne by government contracts. It would be serious if this item and the present overhead allowance had to be taken into the budget suddenly in a year or two, but the contracts are well spaced over several years and we do not expect such a situation.

The Committee believes that the current situation in reference to government contract support is a satisfactory one and that there is not cause for concern at this time about prospects for next year. It would, of course, be serious if the government contract work were to cease in any one year, but this appears to the Committee as very unlikely. When it begins to taper off the result may be somewhat serious because of restoring to the University budget salaries now charged to government contracts and because of the further fact that at that time it will be difficult and, therefore, highly improbable, to reduce overhead by the full amount that it has been increased over the years.

Although we are all conscious of these facts, the administrative officers and the members of the Committee feel that continuation of government contracts is advisable for the University, - so long as we maintain the standards heretofore employed.

Mr. Swift stated that Dr. Wilson in commenting upon the report pointed out that there may be considerable advantage in having these government contracts which help us keep our staff intact without undue financial hardship pending the time when our enrolment increases. Mr. Swift also referred to a report given to his Committee by the Vice-President in Charge of Business Affairs relative to the use being made of the Cyclotron at the University, which indicated that over the past calendar year the machine had been in operation a total of 6,735 hours, or approximately 18 1/2 hours per day.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Swift for his interesting report, and the report was received and ordered placed on file.

Mr. Gaylord Donnelley, Vice-Chairman of the Nominations Committee, stated that he intended to present a report on behalf of the Committee at an executive session of the Board to be held immediately following the adjournment of the regular meeting.

Mr. Axelson, Chairman of the Special Committee on the Trustees Dinner to the Faculty, presented the following report on behalf of the Committee:

The Thirty-fourth Annual Dinner of the Board of Trustees for Members of the Faculties at the South Shore Country Club last evening had a total attendance of 837, which was about 50 more than on any previous occasion. This included 22 active and 9 honorary members of the Board. As in other years there were many expressions of appreciation by faculty members.

Mr. Ryerson presided in his usual effective manner. The Board is indebted to Mr. Percy for a splendid address on its behalf. Mr. Granger E. Westberg gave the invocation and Professor Louis Gottachalk

The Chairman expressed the appreciation of the Board for the very successful affair which the Committee had arranged, and the report was received and ordered placed on file.

The Vice-President and Dean of Faculties stated that he had on the day preceding received a report on the results of an examination taken in October by the first group of students completing the pre-induction program established, originally in four universities, under a grant from the Fund for the Advancement of Education; that the report was confidential (not for circulation outside the University) and that he believed the Board members would find the results interesting and gratifying. The examination, given to students who had completed two years of work in general studies, was the General Education Index of the Graduate Record Examination.

It was pointed out that the program of early admission scholarships was designed to determine whether general education programs of collegiate rigor and content could be mastered by younger students at least three-fifths of whom had not completed high school. These scholarships were originally established at Chicago, Columbia, Wisconsin, and Yale. Although the scholarships were subsequently extended to twelve schools the examination referred to was taken by students who had completed the program at the original four schools. A total of 164 students took the examination, 41 at Chicago, 43 at Columbia, 39 at Wisconsin, and 41 at Yale.

It was stated that the staff at Chicago were not particularly interested in the announced objective of the Fund (to discover whether younger students could master the subject matter) since it had more than ten years of experience with such students. It was, however, interested in the opportunity to compare performance of its students with that of students in collegiate programs developed elsewhere. Although staff experience at Chicago was greater, its program having been constructed several years earlier, and with younger students in mind, the faculty and officers Were glad to have the opportunity for a comparative measure of success between the Chicago program and programs of "collegiate rigor and content" developed at other schools. In this connection it was stated that the Chicago group was the youngest of the four and had received the shortest high school training before entering college.

The General Education Index consists of eight tests: general mathematics, physical science, biological science, social studies, literature, arts, effectiveness of expression and vocabulary. The Chicago students placed first in seven of these tests, second in one. In overall mean score Chicago was first, Wisconsin second, Yale third and Columbia fourth. Mean

The Chairman thanked Mr. Harrison for his interesting report, and the report was received and ordered placed on file.

The Secretary of the University reported that gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$236,939.82 were received by the University in November, 1953, as compared with gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$229,898.95 received in November, 1952; and that gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$410,700.35 were received by the University in December, 1953, as compared with gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$361,298.38 received in December, 1952. He mentioned a number of gifts of special interest included in the November and December, 1953, totals.

He stated that at mid-year the cumulative total of gifts, grants, and pledges is approximately \$500,000

below that of last year, and that this is accounted for almost entirely by the decrease in Foundation giving. He pointed out that this decrease in Foundation support occurred in the following areas: the Law School, which received \$400,000 from the Ford Foundation last year, is some \$395,000 behind last year's total; Social Sciences, which also received some substantial grants from the Ford Foundation last year, has fallen off approximately \$170,000; and the School of Social Service Administration which received a grant of \$55.000 last year from the Field Foundation is behind by that amount. He stated, however, that sundry grants received from Foundations this year, including the grant of \$100,000 from the Field Foundation for planning work on the conservation of the community, helped to offset the other substantial reductions in Foundation grants. He stated that gifts from corporations are up approximately \$200,000 over last year, due primarily to the Institute program; gifts to the Industrial Relations Center (School of Business) are approximately \$140,000 over those of last year; individual gifts are approximately \$258,000 below those of last year; and gifts from groups are approximately \$6,000 above those of last year.

The Secretary of the University presented the following recommendation:

It is recommended that the following contributions and grants made or pledged since the last meeting of the Board be accepted (Gifts, grants, and pledged money reported to the Board at this meeting aggregate \$236,939.82 in the November, 1953, Docket and \$410,700.35 in the December, 1953, Docket):

It was voted that the recommendation as presented be approved.

The Comptroller presented report entitled, "Summary - New Appointments and Changes in Appointments whose salaries exceed \$6,000 per annum made and accepted during the period October 1, 1953, through December 31, 1953", copies of which were before the Trustees at the meeting, and commented thereon.

(Copy of the foregoing report is attached to the official copy of the minutes of this meeting.)

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

The Chairman stated that he was turning the meeting over to the Chancellor who would discuss University matters and possibly bring up questions concerning University policy for general discussion.

The Chancellor thanked the Trustees on behalf of the faculty and administration for the Dinner given by the Trustees to the Faculty on the preceding evening. He stated that the annual dinner is a great morale builder, and is thoroughly enjoyed by the faculty.

The Chancellor stated that in April of this year he will have been Chancellor of the University three years, and that he and Mr. Ryerson thought this might be a good time to take a close look at the University and to review questions of University policy with the Trustees. The Chancellor thereupon discussed matters relating to the University at some length. The following is a summary of his remarks:

The University of Chicago, judged by almost any standard of measurement, is a great institution; it has some 90 buildings located on a campus of approximately 100 acres; it has endowment funds with a book value as of September 30, 1953, of some \$76,000,000 and a market value of some \$106,000,000; we have some 6,500 employees on the payroll of whom some 1,200 are academic people.

We own and operate an observatory at Williams Bay, Wisconsin, and have the most distinguished Department of Astronomy in the Mid-West if not in the United States. We staff McDonald Observatory, located at Fort Davis Texas, which is owned by The University of Texas. Most of our work there is done during the winter months when astronomical

observations cannot be carried on advantageously at Yerkes. The Oriental Institute of the University has a large establishment in Egypt and is carrying on extensive excavating activity from that headquarters. We have an exchange arrangement, involving both faculty and students, with the Sorbonne and the University of Frankfurt. As some measure of the quality of our faculty we have on our staff (including persons having emeritus status) 31 of the 44 members of the National Academy of Science located in Illinois; Northwestern University has 2 and the University of Illinois has 7. Harvard has more members of the Academy than any other University, with the University of California second, and only slightly ahead of The University of Chicago, which is third.

Our various Schools, Divisions, and Departments are uneven in terms of quality. We are strong in the Physical and Biological Sciences. We have one of the greatest medical schools in the United States, although its youth prevents it from receiving full public recognition as such; our Physical Sciences Division is as outstanding in its achievements as our Biological Sciences Division; we lead in nuclear physics in the United States and our Institutes are doing significant research; our Mathematics Department is the best in the United States; our Chemistry Department is strong although we recently lost one of our key men, Frank H. Westheimer, to Harvard University; we have a faculty of 27 in Chemistry, 24 of whom are on tenure, and the loss of one man will not adversely affect the Department.

The Division of the Humanities is undernourished and underprivileged although this is an area of tremendous importance. We are not too strong in this area although we are probably as strong as any other University in this country with the possible exception of Yale. We do not have distinguished men in philosophy or literature, but neither does any other University at this time. The Languages have a great past at the University, but our present position is little better than mediocre. We are not strong in this area but, as in philosophy and literature, we are probably as strong as any other University. There are no outstanding men in this country whom we can secure to strengthen us in this area, and our hope lies in our younger men. We do have a strong, active and dynamic group of young men in the Humanities which we hope will re-establish our former pre-eminence and revolutionize the thinking in this field.

The Division of the Social Sciences is very spotty at this time. We have one of the best Departments of Education and one of the worst Departments of Sociology in the United States. The decline of the Department of Sociology is particularly disheartening because we were the pioneer in this field and for many years had probably the greatest Department of Sociology in the country. Practically every great sociologist in the United States is a graduate of that Department. The Division of the Social Sciences has lost many of its outstanding men through death or resignation. We are trying desperately to rebuild the Division. Dean Tyler recently resigned and our first step is to secure a new Dean who will bring renewed life to the Division. As pointed out above, we are especially strong in the Biological and Physical Sciences, and we are as strong as any other university in the Humanities. Our next big effort will be to build up the Social Sciences.

It is difficult to give a summary of the College at the present time. A number of changes have occurred in the College in the past year. Dean Ward has resigned from the Deanship of the College, and at next Monday's meeting of the Budget Committee the Chancellor proposes to recommend Robert E. Streeter for the Deanship. Mr. Streeter has been Associate Dean in the College and is a bright and able man.

The School of Business should be doing better than it is. It is possibly too early yet to determine whether the newly appointed Dean will be able to do the job of rebuilding the School that we expected him to do. The School is also hampered by lack of funds. A determined effort must be made in this area.

The Federation of Theological Schools at the University during the past year entered into new Articles of Agreement and financial arrangements which form the basis for a more efficient operation. However, there is at present a lack of any effective relationship between the federation and the churches; also too little consideration has been given to training men for the ministry. Every effort is being made to secure a new Dean who can give new guidance and inspiration to the Federation of Theological Schools. It is thought that under effective leadership the federated group will make the strong impact that it should upon American protestantism. It is thought also that we need to have theological education brought more nearly within the contexture of the University.

In discussing the Schools at the University he stated that Dean Levi is doing a superb job in building up the Law School. The School of Social Service Administration is doing an adequate but not an inspired job. It is desirable that more research be carried on in this area. The Dean of the School retires in the near future and the most careful consideration will be given to filling the Deanship. The Graduate Library School is also doing an adequate but not an inspired job. We began work in graduate library training, and out of our development other good library schools, such as the one at Columbia, arose. We have a \$2,000,000 endowment for our Library School, the income from which defrays the expenses of the School.

University College has a good staff and is maintaining a satisfactory enrolment. It is hoped that we can get more participation in the work of the College from members of our faculty. The Chancellor is not clear that University College knows what adult education is, but the College probably knows as much about it as anyone else.

Turning from the question of our academic performance to other problems of the University, the Chancellor stated that we are devoting a lot of time to public relations and expressed the opinion that our public relations are improving. He stated that Mr. Percy's remarks in this regard at the Trustees Dinner to the Faculty were helpful. In discussing the budget he stated that as far as endowment is concerned we could close the University, liquidate all obligations and have money left over. In the operation of a University however the salary payments made to people on tenure and fixed charges of that nature represent but a small part of the total budget. He pointed out that the University in the past 15 years has expanded to such an extent that we have depleted our reserves and have been incurring annual deficits. If we can get our financial house in order in one way or another, our expansion program will turn out to have been the wisest move we could have made. He referred to a similar situation that occurred earlier in University history when a gift from Mr. Rockefeller stabilized the University's financial position. One of our first jobs is to get the budget in balance. We believe it is in balance for the fiscal year 1953-54, but it is an uneasy balance. We have achieved this balanced budget mainly by making drastic reductions in academic and administrative budgets. In order to balance the budget next year it will be necessary

to take another \$500,000 out of the budget. We are now reaching the point where we cannot make any further cuts in the academic budgets and maintain the University at its present level. Some departments have demonstrated that they cannot make the 3.6 per cent cut requested in the 1954-55 budget. He pointed out that when a University begins to crumble the best men go first and the process of deterioration is a rapid one. We have been able to date to maintain the loyalty and morale of our faculty.

In discussing the enrolment problem the Chancellor stated that because of the cost of educating a graduate student a university cannot exist as a graduate institution alone but must have undergraduate students. We have approximately 4,300 students on the quadrangles now as compared with 10,000 in the post-war period. We can handle this latter number with our present staff. Of the 4,300 students we do have, some 1,100 are in the College and some 3,200 are in the Divisions and Schools. Our proportion of graduate to undergraduate students creates a serious budget situation. We are energetically attacking the undergraduate enrolment problem and think that we are making headway.

Progress is being made in our efforts to improve the community. The South East Chicago Commission has played an active role in this activity. The Land Clearance Commission is also showing an interest in our area, and we feel genuinely optimistic about the outlook for the future.

The Chairman thanked the Chancellor for his excellent report on the University and stated that the presentation should be helpful to the Trustees in their determination of future University policies.

In the general discussion that followed the Chancellor's remarks, the suggestion was made that in view of the critical situation that exists with respect to undergraduate enrolment, the matter be referred to the Committee on Student Interests, or if that Committee is unable or unwilling to handle the matter, to a special committee of the Board, to determine what should be done about undergraduate enrolment and report back.

Mr. Sherer, Chairman of the Committee on Student Interests, stated that while University enrolment had been discussed from time to time by the Committee, the Committee's principal activity is related to students now at the University, He undertook however to call an

early meeting of the Committee and submit the question as to whether the Committee should undertake this new activity.

At the request of the Chairman the officers withdrew from the meeting and the Trustees went into executive session to receive the report of the Nominations Committee; the Chairman stating that the meeting would stand adjourned upon the termination of the executive session.

# The University of Chicago MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

February 11, 1954

Pursuant to notice, the regular February meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Board Room, 38 South Dearborn Street, Chicago, on Thursday, February 11, 1954, at 2 P.M.

There were present: Mr. Ryerson, in the chair, Messrs. Aldis, Axelson, Bell, Gaylord Donnelley, Field, Jr., Kimpton, H. A. Moore, Murray, Nuveen, Paepcke, Percy, Prince, Ranney, Sherer, Smith, G. H. Stern, Sulzberger, Swift, Tenney, and Zimmermann, also, Messrs. Filbey, J. P. Hall, Harrell, Harrison, Kirkpatrick, H. H. Moore, and Watkins.

Prayer was offered by Mr. Nuveen.

The minutes of the last regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, held on January 14, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Budget held on January 18, and February 1, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The Chairman referred to the Luncheon meeting of the Board that had been held that date at the Mid-Day Club at which Willard F. Libby, Professor in the Department of Chemistry and Institute of Nuclear Studies, had talked to the Trustees on the subject, "Cosmic Ray Tritium and the Earth's Waters."

Mr. Smith, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, reported that at the January 14, 1954, meeting of the Board, Harold A. Moore, Senior Vice-President of Chicago Title and Trust Company, had been elected a Trustee of the University in Class 3, the term of which expires with the annual meeting of the Board in June, 1955, subject to the approval of the Trustees not present at the meeting. He stated that the approval of the other Trustees had been secured, and that Mr. Moore had been informed of his election to the Board and had agreed to serve as Trustee. He stated that Mr. Moore intended to be present at the meeting.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Smith for his report and stated that the report would be spread of record in the minutes of the meeting.

The Chairman reminded the Trustees that under the By-Laws of the University, the designation of "alternate" members of a committee is merely a device to facilitate the securing of a quorum and that an alternate member is free to attend meetings and participate therein the same as a regular member. He also reported that Mr. Blair, Chairman of the Investment Committee, had appointed Mr. Moore as a member of the Sub-Committee on Real Estate of the Investment Committee.

Mr. Axelson, Chairman of the Committee on the Trustees Annual Dinner to the Faculties, reported that the expense of the Dinner held at the South Shore Country Club on January 13, 1954, had been \$6,486.53.

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

The Chairman stated that as he had previously indicated, he intends insofar as possible, to have business matters handled by the Budget Committee and leave the Board free at its meetings to consider questions of University policy. He stated that the order of business at this meeting would be varied somewhat in order to permit the Comptroller's Mid-Year Report on the current budget to precede the report of the Chancellor.

Harold A. Moore, the newly elected Trustee, entered the meeting and the Chairman welcomed him to the privileges and responsibilities of membership on the Board. In his welcoming remarks the Chairman pointed out that Mr. Moore received the Ph.B. degree from the University in 1915 and was awarded an alumni citation in 1952.

The Comptroller presented report entitled: "Revised Budget 1953-54", which he stated was submitted to the Board by the Budget Committee with the recommendation that it be approved.

In commenting upon the report the Comptroller pointed out that the income estimates for the current fiscal year contain four non-recurring items of income, namely (1) an item of approximately \$130,000 representing payment of University claim against Atomic Energy Commission for non-academic retirement plan; (2) approximately \$100,000 from Encyclopaedia Britannica due to a change in the fiscal year of that company which resulted in the University receiving 15 months income during its current fiscal year; (3) an excess of approximately \$135,000 in patient fees which cannot be relied upon for next fiscal year, and (4) some \$170,000 of additional endowment income which cannot be relied upon for next year due to the possibility of large scale sale of equity investments.

Following discussion,

It was voted that the Revised Budget for 1953-54 as presented by the Comptroller, be approved.

The Chancellor stated that he is very pleased with the report presented by the Comptroller. He pointed out that this is the first time in recent years that it has not been necessary to add substantial sums to the budget at the time of the mid-year revision. He pointed out also that ordinarily at the end of the fiscal year, savings in appropriations of from \$400,000 to \$600,000 are realized, and that therefore there is every reasonable expectation that we will finish the current fiscal year with a balanced budget.

He stated that at the January meeting of the Board he had attempted to give a picture of the past and present status of the University in the academic world, and that he intends at this time to discuss its fiscal position. He pointed out that when he became Chancellor some three years ago it seemed clear that there were two tremendous jobs to be done. The budget was out of balance by some \$1,200,000, and had been out of balance each year since 1938 except for the war years of 1942 and 1943. Our reserves had been depleted, and endowment funds and funds functioning as endowment had been spent. Our first job was to get our economic house in order and we have taken a long step in

that direction. The second job that required attention was our public relations situation. We were not liked by the city or by the nation. Every effort has been made to improve our relations with the public and we have met with considerable success. He indicated that there are still a number of weak spots, such as our relations with schools, and enrolment, and we are working energetically on these problems. He stated also that every university is, or should be, a controversial place, and that it would be improper for a great university to gain too much popularity with the general public.

The Chancellor pointed out that we have achieved a balanced budget by tightening up in terms of salaries, staff and activities, and that we actually end up in serious danger of becoming a second rate institution. He cited the following illustrations, which he stated were selected almost at random, to show the effect of budget cuts upon our academic performance:

The University Library is the research tool of the Humanities and the Social Sciences. He indicated in this connection that the library of a university has a direct relationship to the research stature of the institution. He stated that the approximate amounts expended by certain universities in 1952-53 for the acquisition of books were as follows: Harvard, \$598,000; Yale, \$447,000; Illinois, \$425,000; Minnesote, \$286,000; Michigan, \$272,000; and Kansas, \$266,000. We are 16th on the list with an expenditure of some \$204,000. Our librarian actually received only \$182,269 of this amount and was requested to secure the balance from other sources. We have budgeted the sum of \$113,676 for book acquisitions in the 1954-55 budget. In the matter of salaries paid in connection with staffing of libraries we are 9th on the list at this time. We have made reductions in library salaries by reducing the time the library is kept open and by otherwise reducing service. He stated that Harvard has some 5,600,000 volumes in its library, Yale has some 4,100,000 volumes, and we are fifth with some 1,800,000 volumes. Northwestern has approximately 1,000,000 volumes. He pointed out that the present position of our library among other university libraries is not what it should be, and that we are continuing to lose ground.

The Department of Physics - In this Department our salary scales are no longer competitive with other schools in the midwest. We have been able

so far to hold our loyal and distinguished group of physicists, but will not be able to hold them indefinitely with our continued annual cuts in the budget.

Institute for Nuclear Studies - The same situation exists in this area of the University. A number of outstanding scientists in the Institute have advised the Chancellor that they are beginning to violate commitments with members of their staffs and cannot continue on the present basis. They point out that the 1952-53 budget of the Institute was \$321,000, the proposed 1954-55 budget is \$281,000, and should be at least \$351,000, or \$70,000 more than is available. The Chancellor has reviewed the budget with these people and believes that they will accept the proposed budget for the next fiscal year.

The Chancellor stated that the foregoing illustrations indicate the type of thing that had to be done to get the budget in balance. He pointed out that this situation cannot continue and unless the trend is reversed in the near future our best men will go and we will become a second rate institution. He stated also that the continued cutting of the budget and the necessity for turning down meritorious academic requests which require expenditures, has a subtle psychological effect upon the administrative officers of the University, and there is serious danger that such officers in time will become incapable of doing anything affirmative and creative.

He stated that in view of the non-recurring items of income received in this fiscal year, it will be necessary to take another \$400,000 or \$500,000 out of next year's budget. We are making fairly good progress in this tightening process, but do not know whether we will succeed or not. Question also arises as to whether if we do take another \$500,000 out of the budget we will have the same institution we now have. He stated that as he sees the fiscal picture it is imperative that the University make an all-out effort to raise additional funds. There is to be a conference at Lakeside early in March at which objectives and plans for an all-out campaign will be discussed.

The Chairman thanked the Chancellor for his timely review of the University's fiscal position, and stated that the Chancellor had talked to him and others relative to the matter and all are in accord that the resources of the University must be increased if we are to maintain our position of leadership. He stated

that it is the job of the administrative officers to develop a program in the near future showing anticipated University requirements for the next 5 or 10 years, and that thereafter the officers and the Board will consider the question of raising the necessary funds for the carrying out of the program. He pointed out that the plans to date are nebulous and informal, but that active consideration is being given to a fund raising campaign and that the proposed campaign should become well defined at the Lakeside and other conferences now being planned. He invited the comment of the Trustees in the matter.

There was general discussion of student enrolment and other matters relating to the University's financial satuation.

At the suggestion of the Chairman, the Chancellor reported that he had been invited by the National Association of School Administrators to address them on the evening of February 15th at Atlantic City where they are having their national convention. The association has some 17,000 members. The subject of the Chancellor's address will be, "Research in Education." The other speaker on the program is Mr. Sligh, past president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The Secretary of the University reported that gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$344,659.78 had been received by the University during the month of January, 1954, as compared with gifts, grants, and pledges of \$352,623.05 received during the month of January, 1953. He stated that the cumulative total of gifts, grants, and pledges received through January, 1954, was \$2,167,450.54, as compared with a cumulative total of \$2,730,691.47 received through January, 1953. He mentioned certain gifts of special interest referred to in the January, 1954, total, including a gift of \$50,000 from the Nathan Goldblatt Society for Cancer Research, for animal laboratories, and a grant of \$28,000 from the Fund for the Advancement of Education, for the support of the Early Admission to College program. He reported that a drive is under way for the establishment of a scholarship program at the Orthogenic School and that approximately \$13,000 has been contributed to date.

It was voted that the recommendation as presented be approved.

The Secretary of the University reported further concerning the letter and questionnaire that the University had received from the Special Committee of the House of Representatives (of which Carroll Reece is Chairman) appointed under House Resolution 217 to investigate tax exempt foundations, reference to which was made at the February 1 meeting of the Budget Committee. He stated that since the first letter was received, somewhat similar letters and questionnaires have been received by the University Press and various campus publications. We are attempting to coordinate action with respect to these inquiries in the Secretary's Office. We have acknowledged receipt of the ledters and our reports should go forward in about two weeks. He pointed out that the Cox Committee which previously conducted an investigation of tax exempt foundations secured its information relative to the pattern of foundation giving from the foundations. Although this information is available to the Reece Committee, that Committee is now requesting the recipients of grants to make reports. Our attorneys in Washington have advised us in a preliminary way that they believe the Committee is without legal authority to request the information. We have requested these attornevs to keep in touch with the situation and advise us of developments. It is thought that the universities will not take any collective action to resist furnishing the informa-

On the recommendation of the Chairman,

It was voted to instruct the Treasurer to vote the preferred stock of Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc., in person or by proxy at the annual meeting of said corporation in April, 1954, or at any adjournment thereof, for the election of Messrs. Paepcke, Sherer, and Stuart, as the three directors to which the preferred stock is entitled under the By-Laws of the corporation.

a. Student fees. Original budget enticipated an increase in Quadrangles enrollment in summer quarter 1953 and no decrease in regular three quarters in 1953-54. Summer quarter resulted in 5.2% increase in students but \$80,000 decrease from budget estimate. Autumn quarter showed 8.3% decrease in student and winter quarter (at and of third week) 7.6% decrease.

Divinity School decrease (\$21,800) is offset by additional appropriation of Baptist Theological Union income, as is the estimated decrease of \$40,000 in fees to be received from Chicago Theological Seminary. The latter results from the new Federated budget arrangement, and is additionally offset by a reduction of \$22,500 in Divinity School salaries transferred to C.T.S.

- b. Endowment income. Original budget allowed safety factor of \$220,000 in C.I.M. income to provide for the contingency of possible large-scale disposal of equities and the re-investment in lower-yielding fixed return securities under the operation of the Investment Diversification Schedule. Treasurer estimates that \$170,000 of this amount may be released for the remainder of the fiscal year and, also, that an additional \$155,000 of C.I.M. and separately-invested endowment income may be expected. (Note: Regular Budget portion of C.I.M. income is approximately 78%; remainder is for restricted purposes)
- c. Patient fees. The increase of \$684,000 in fees is partly offset below by increase of \$549,061 in hospital expenses. Various hospital fees and charge were increased as of January 15, 1954.

Earnings on General Accounts Merger are estimated at an additional \$25,000, and income from Encyclopaedia Britannica is increased by \$100,000 on the basis of recent estimates submitted by EB officers. A large part of the latter gain is due to the change in EB fiscal year resulting in the University's receiving fifteen months' income during the current fiscal year.

Pursuant to notice, the regular April meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Board Room, 38 South Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, on Thursday, April 8, 1954, at 2 P.M.

There were present: Mr. Tenney, in the chair, Messrs. Aldis, Axelson, Benton, Brown, Cone, Gaylord Donnelley, Field, Jr., Goodman, Jarvis, Kimpton, McNair, Paepcke, Ranney, Smith, Gardner H. Stern, Sulzberger, and R. E. Wilson, also, Messrs. Filbey, J. P. Hall, Harrell, Harrison, Kirkpatrick, H. H. Moore, Svoboda, and Watkins.

Prayer was offered by Mr. Goodman.

Mr. Tenney stated that he was acting as Chairman of the meeting in view of the absence of Mr. Ryerson from the city.

The minutes of the last regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, held on February 11, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on Budget held on February 15, March 1, and March 15, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The minutes of the meeting of the Investment Committee, held on February 15, 1954, copies of the minutes having been previously sent to all members of the Board, were approved.

The Chancellor referred to the Luncheon meeting of the Board that had been held that date at the Mid-Day Club at which Morton Grodzins, Dean of the Division of the Social Sciences, had talked to the Trustees on the subject, "The Future of Social Sciences at The University of Chicago", and stated that he thought the Trustees who had heard Mr. Grodzins talk would understand why he was appointed Dean. Mr. Kimpton spoke of Mr. Grodzins' energy and ability and expressed the opinion that if any one could restore the Division to its former position of pre-eminence, Mr. Grodzins could.

The Chancellor stated that he had a luncheon meeting in New York City the day previously with John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and that he was delighted with the real interest in the University that had been expressed by Mr. Rockefeller at this meeting. Mr. Kimpton stated that they discussed, among other things, the matter of the possible relocation on the University campus of the mational headquarters of the National Council of the

Rockefeller, John D., Jr.

Churches of Christ in the United States of America, concerning which a report was made at the March 1 meeting of the Budget Committee.

The Chancellor referred to the special May meeting of the Board that had been called by Mr. Ryerson for the purpose of considering the future course of the University, and expressed the hope that all active and Honorary Trustees of the University would be present at the meeting.

The Chancellor stated that the Vice-President in Charge of Business Affairs would present a major policy question concerning the area, and that the Comptroller would present the proposed 1954-55 Budget of the University.

The Vice-President in Charge of Business Affairs stated that he desired to present for the consideration of the Board a proposal for the replenishment of the Property Improvement Suspense Fund, which had been considered by the Area Committee at meeting held March 2, 1954, and by the Budget Committee at meeting held April 5, 1954, and that the proposal comes to the Board with the recommendation of the Budget Committee. He stated that there was before the Trustees at the meeting a report concerning the matter that had been presented by A. C. Svoboda, Assistant Treasurer, at the meeting of the Budget Committee above referred to, together with copy of action taken at that meeting. He stated that he had requested Mr. Svoboda to make a similar presentation at this meeting.

Mr. Svoboda gave a comprehensive review of the program for the redevelopment of the area that is being sponsored by the South East Chicago Commission, the Land Clearance Commission, the Chicago Plan Commission and other governmental agencies. He stated that the active participation of Chancellor Kimpton in the program had resulted in renewed enthusiasm and new hope in the entire area. He pointed out that although significant progress is being made in getting the redevelopment program under way, there is for the time being at least a continuing requirement that the University continue its program of neighborhood conservation. He stated that the Property Improvement Suspense Fund is depleted and reported concerning the proposal for the replenishment of the Fund. He indicated that the income received from the nonacademic properties involved in the contemplated mortgaging program would carry the loan.

[Inasmuch as the minutes of the meeting of the Budget Committee held April 5, 1954, record in detail the presentation on this matter made by Mr. Svoboda at that meeting, the presentation made by Mr. Svoboda at this meeting is not recorded in detail in these minutes.]

The Vice-President in Charge of Business Affairs thanked Mr. Svoboda for his presentation and read the action taken by the Budget Committee at its April 5 meeting with respect to this matter, which was as follows:

"It was voted that the Budget Committee

- "(a) recommend to the Board that the University borrow a sum not in excess of \$700,000 for the replenishment of the Property Improvement Suspense Fund through the mortgaging of some or all of the University's non-academic properties referred to in the foregoing report, it being understood that this proposal is not offered as a final solution of the area problem but is made for the purpose of permitting the University to continue its present policy of neighborhood protection, and
- "(b) that if the Board approves of the recommendation set forth under (a) above that it (1) authorize the Budget Committee (following further study) to determine the method to be followed in borrowing the funds at another meeting of the Committee to which Trustees not members of the Committee would be invited to attend, and (2) to proceed with the borrowing arrangements under the plan adopted at such meeting."

On the recommendation of the Vice-President in Charge of Business Affairs, and following discussion,

It was voted that the foregoing recommendations of the Budget Committee be approved.

The Secretary of the University reported that gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$120,065.75 had been received by the University during the month of February, 1954, as compared with gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$590,903.34 received during the month of February, 1953. He pointed out that the difference between the two amounts is accounted for by certain substantial Foundation grants for periods of two or more years, received in February, 1953, which were not repeated in 1954. He reported that gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$423,126.00 had been received by the University during the month of March, 1954, as compared with gifts, grants, and pledges in the sum of \$446,182.13 received during the month of March, 1953. He stated that the cumulative total of gifts, grants, and pledges received through March, 1954, is \$2,709,942.29 as compared with a cumulative total of \$3,767,777.64 received through March, 1953. He mentioned certain gifts of special interest that had been received since the last meeting of the Board.

The Secretary of the University presented the following recommendation:

It is recommended that the following contributions and grants made or pledged since the last meeting of the Board be accepted (gifts, grants, and pledged money reported to the Board at this meeting aggregate \$120,065.75 in the February, 1954, Docket, and \$423,126.00 in the March, 1954, Docket):

It was voted that the recommendation as presented be approved.

The Comptroller, on behalf of the Chancellor, presented the Budget Letter transmitting the 1954-55 Consolidated Operating Budget in the amount of \$58,983,773.00, including recommendations of actions to be taken. He discussed various aspects of the proposed University Regular Budget in the amount of \$20,487,282.00. He stated that the Budget Committee has considered the proposed Budget, and that the Budget presented at this meeting, with the specific actions as to financing and operation suggested in the Budget Letter come to the Board with the recommendation of the Committee. He stated that an abridged copy of the 1954-55 Budget (which excludes salaries and departmental details) had been sent to all members of the Board, and that a copy of the complete Budget would be sent to Trustees requesting same.

The following is the Budget Letter as presented:

The proposed consolidated operating budget of The University of Chicago for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1955, aggregating \$58,983,773 is submitted herewith. The three components of the consolidated budget are:

Expenditures of Restricted Expendable Funds are controlled by the amounts of specific gifts, grants endowment income or contract provisions; these estimates are shown on the yellow sheets included in the budget. Auxiliary Enterprises estimates are listed on page 5 of the budget; their net income which is absorbed into the Regular Budget is detailed on page 8.

Budget Letter

This letter deals only with the Regular Budget.

## THE REGULAR BUDGET

During the last three years the budget has been brought into balance. Underwritings were \$1,203,268 for 1950-51, \$718,130 for 1951-52, and \$326,673 for 1952-53. For the current year, 1953-54, if all income estimates are completely accurate and if all appropriations are spent to the last dollar, an underwriting of \$215,936 will be necessary to balance the budget. But it is confidently expected that an improvement of one to two per cent, \$200,000 to \$400,000 will result - primarily from unspent appropriations - and thereby bring the current year's budget into balance.

The budget balancing has been achieved by heavy-handed cutting of expenditures in the face of some serious blows income-wise. Starting with the 1950-51 level of operations which required an actual underwriting of \$1,203,268, the next three years saw student fees drop \$650,000, research institute gifts decrease \$200,000, Argonne Laboratory overhead allowance reduced by \$450,000 - all of these figures being on an annual basis. In addition, the budget has absorbed the cost, \$165,000 annually, of the new Employees Retirement Income Plan inaugurated January 1, 1953. Fortunately, there have been some offsetting increase levels in income from endowment investments, Encyclopaedia Britannica royalties, and Air Force overhead allowances.

The current year's budget balancing, however, is an uneasy one, as is shown by the proposed underwriting for next year, 1954-55, of \$639,868 - an increase of \$423,932 over the current year's figure of \$215,936. This sizable increase occurs even after \$240,000 was pruned from the current budget. (The total pruning was \$310,000 but \$70,000 was restored to the Dean of Students for promotional work in connection with the new undergraduate programs and to the Dean of the Social Sciences Division for strengthening certain areas.) In other words, if the pruning of \$240,000 had not been made, the difference in underwriting between the two years would have been \$664,000. This difference can be accounted for among major items as follows:

The 1954-55 underwriting of \$639,868 is before the anticipating of year-end improvement from unspent appropriations. If such improvement materializes at \$200,000 to \$400,000, the operating deficit would lie of course between \$250,000 and \$450,000.

Our present reserve position includes \$545,215 in Unrestricted Suspense and \$418,472 in Unappropriated Surplus. After providing for the 1954-55 underwriting of \$639,868, our reserves will be \$323,819. Again, this figure does not include any year-end improvement resulting from unspent appropriations for 1953-54 or 1954-55.

Comparison of next year's budget with last year's actual operations and with this year's original budget is valuable and desirable, and can be made from the data submitted in this budget report. All of the schedules, however, show the variations from this year's <u>revised</u> budget in order not to present too many confusing figures and since the latter is the current operating basis.

The proposed budget is a mixture of rather substantial increases and decreases in both income and expense items. Overall, the increase in underwritings of \$423,932 (from present \$215,936 to proposed \$639,868) is made up of income increases of \$225,411 and expense increases of \$649,343.

A summary of the proposed budget compared with this year's revised budget is as follows:

It is believed that the Regular Budget is a realistic one, that income estimates have not been placed at too optimistic levels, that all known expenditures are included except as noted below. A contingency fund of \$100,000 is proposed; this is \$50,000 more than was provided in the current year's original budget but the same amount as formerly provided. The budget is a tight one. No allowance has been included for general wage increases to Union employees and other non-academic employees and no provision has been made for plant decorating or alterations other than in the hospitals and clinics, except as departments may make funds available to the Buildings and Grounds Department for such specific purposes.

You will recall that in connection with the financing of the construction of the Charles Gilman Smith - West Wing Hospitals as well as alterations to other medical areas, the Trustees approved the financing of an amount in excess of \$1,000,000 from certain funds functioning as endowment over a twenty-year period, in lieu of borrowing from an insurance company.

So far, about one-half of the amount has been spent. The Dean of the Biological Sciences Division is anxious that this indebtedness be repaid as rapidly as possible. No provision for amortization and interest, however, has been included in the budget submitted. In accordance with the Dean's request and as an added incentive to his professional staff, it is proposed that the excess of patient fees received over and above the amount budgeted for the year be credited as amortization and interest payments on the indebtedness.

A final item which represents a policy new to this budget lies in the fact that the Secretary of the University's budget has been reduced so as no longer to cover certain categories of development expense. This new policy proposes that in certain instances where permissable in terms of the gift or grant, expense incurred in the acquisition of the gift or grant be met out of the monies received.

#### INCOM

The principal items comprising the estimated increase of \$225,411 in current income compared with the revised 1953-54 budget are as follows:

- 1. Student Fees are \$435,020 higher than the revised 1953-54 estimate. The bulk of this increase, \$350,000, is due to the creation of 500 additional scholarships recently approved by the Trustees; this entry is offset by the same amount under Student Aid. Other increases are in University College (\$48,090), Laboratory Schools (\$21,930) and Divinity School (\$15,000), Otherwise, student fee income is estimated at the same level as the current year.
- 2. Endowment Income is \$135,954 less, on the basis of the Treasurer's review of each item in the present portfolio and the allowance of a safety factor of \$200,000 for C.I.M. (including restricted funds) in anticipation of possible selling of substantial amount of equities under the Investment Diversification Schedule and reinvesting in lower-yielding fixed return securities.
- 3. The increase of \$344,855 in Patient Fees reflects the increases in rates effective January 1954 as well as a first full-year's operation of the two new west wings.

- 4. The net income from <u>Auxiliary Enterprises</u> is estimated to increase \$38,064, due to increases of \$13,800 in student housing operations, \$12,400 in Midway Apartments, and \$11,900 in Press Publications and Bookstore.
- 5. Sundry Income shows a decrease of \$121,000, reflecting mainly a decrease of \$100,000 in Encyclopaedia Britannica royalties, which in turn represents a non-recurring item of income resulting from a change in Encyclopaedia Britannica's fiscal year.
- 6. Current Gifts are expected to decrease \$101,674. Grants for the Research Institutes are placed at \$350,000 which is \$90,000 less than the revised 1953-54 figure and \$250,000 less than the original 1953-54 budget estimate.
- 7. It is estimated that during 1954-55, the University will receive General Overhead Allowances of \$1,745,600 of which \$1,587,700 is expected from government contracts and \$157,900 from other sources. Government allowances are \$233,900 lower than this year's estimates: \$132,400 decrease due to a non-recurring allowance from Atomic Energy Commission for non-academic retirement plan; and most of the remainder due to a smaller formula overhead rate.

#### EXPENDITURES

The proposed expenditures of \$20,487,282 represent an increase of \$649,343 over 1953-54 revised budget estimates.

- 1. General Administration and General Expense shows a decrease of \$21,706, most of which is in the budget of the Secretary of the University. (Reclassification of accounts resulted in significant, but largely offsetting, differences in budgets of Business Manager Special Projects, Legal Counsel, Chancellor and Comptroller.)
- 2. <u>Instruction and Research</u> (\$15,809,000) shows an increase of \$279,034. All of the major components dean of students, examiner, library, divisions and schools have smaller budgets except for the following -
- a. Dean of Students, increase of \$17,227 after special allowance of \$35,000 for promotional work in connection with the new undergraduate programs.

b. Social Sciences, increase of \$5,070 - after special allowances of \$35,000 to strengthen certain areas.

- c. Divinity School, increase of \$27,765 but only \$5,265 more than original 1953-54 budget.
- d. Graduate Library School, increase of \$3,058.
- e, Law School, increase of \$2,084.
- f. Biological Sciences Division, increase of \$324,479 (4 per cent):

It is significant to note that the Biological Sciences Division makes up 42 per cent of the entire Regular Budget (hospitals and clinical departments account for approximately 28 and 10 per cent, respectively). The budget for the hospitals includes their plant operation, retirement plans and Social Security taxes. The proposed budget represents the first under a full-year's operation of the two new west wings.

- 3. Staff Retirement Expense is increased \$9,710, The increase in Social Security tax is offset somewhat by reductions in the list of retirement allowances.
- 4. The decrease of \$50,173 in Plant Operations (excluding hospitals and clinics) is due largely to the fact that the revised 1953-54 budget includes transfers from other areas of the University for alterations and special services. The proposed budget is approximately \$24,000 (2 per cent) higher than the original 1953-54 budget.
- 5. Student Aid is increased \$347,145 (49 per cent) due to the creation of 500 additional scholarships (\$350,000) recently approved by the Trustees.
- 6. Included in next year's budget are credits of \$621,114 representing estimated savings to be secured by additional transferring of salaries and other expenses to government contracts and restricted expendable funds. This compares with

\$564,001 set up in this year's original budget and \$463,009 in last year's original budget.

7. The 1954-55 budget provides for 743 full-time members of the faculty with the rank of Instructor or higher, 13 of whom will be on leave of absence. Research Associates, Visiting Professors, Lecturers, etc. are not included in this total. The make-up of the faculty by rank, compared with the last four budgets, is as follows:

### ACTIONS SUGGESTED

It is recommended that the foregoing Consolidated Budget for the fiscal year 1954-55 be adopted with the following specific actions as to financing and operation:

- 1. Appropriate the sum of \$639,868 from Unrestricted Suspense Funds to underwrite the operating deficit of the Regular Budget for 1954-55.
- 2. Authorize the expenditures of Restricted Expendable Funds and Auxiliary Enterprises Funds to the extent funds are available from balances on June 30, 1954, and additions thereto during 1954-55.
- 3. Authorize the Chancellor to operate the University within the total of the Regular Budget of \$20,487,282 and to make adjustments of appropriations within this limit, it being understood that all reasible economies of expenditures will be made and that such economies will be reflected in the final outcome of the budget and not used for projects not now contemplated in the budget without further reference to the Board.
- 4. Authorize the Chancellor and the Comptroller to increase the total Regular Budget appropriations under the following conditions:
- a, by the estimated additional costs of summer programs, provided that such additional costs are covered by at least a corresponding amount of estimated additional income:
- b. by the amount of proceeds from the sale of University-owned equipment, where the Chancellor has determined that a department of the University is to be credited with such proceeds;
- c. by the amount of additional expense incurred in certain categories of development work, provided the terms of the gift or grant permit the use of monies received for such expenses;
- d. by an amount not to exceed the difference between the budgeted estimate of Patient Fees and the actual amount of

Patient Fees received during the fiscal year, provided that such amount will be used to amortize and pay the interest on those funds functioning as endowment which have been borrowed to finance the construction of Charles Gilman Smith - West Wing Hospitals as well as alterations to other medical areas.

The Chancellor commented upon the proposed Budget for 1954-55. He pointed out that during the last three years the budget had been brought into balance, but that this had been done at considerable cost in terms of the quality of the University. He stated that it had been the intention to take \$500,000 out of this year's budget but that after some \$240,000 was taken out it was found impossible to make any further cuts and still have a first rate institution. He pointed out that the year end savings that should be realized this year and those anticipated for next year, together with the anticipated increase in enrolment should offset substantially the underwriting item of \$639,868 shown in the 1954-55 Budget. He referred to the May meeting of the Board at which a proposal for the raising of additional funds for the University is to be presented, and stated that if it is not possible to raise additional funds or to increase enrolment, then consideration must be given to reducing the field of University activity. He stated that in adopting the new budget the University is gambling on better times in terms of more money and increased enrolment, and is expressing its intention not to weaken the University further.

On the recommendation of the Chancellor, and followsing discussion,

It was voted by the unanimous vote of all Trustees present at the meeting that the proposed University Budget for 1954-55 be approved as presented, and that the actions recommended in the Budget Letter be adopted.

The Chairman pointed out that the By-Laws provide that final action on the annual budget shall be by approval of a majority of the Trustees in office, which may be either (1) by affirmative vote at a regular or special meeting or (2) by approval in writing or (3) by a combination of the two. He stated that at the time of the vote on the annual budget for 1954-55 there were 16 active Trustees present at the meeting, which was one less than the necessary quorum, and instructed the Secretary of the Board to secure the

additional affirmative vote in writing from a member of the Board not present at the meeting, and that when such additional vote had been secured to insert a statement to that effect in the minutes of the meeting.

(Note: Following the meeting, William McCormick Blair, a member of the Board of Trustees who was not present at the meeting, delivered to the Secretary of the Board his approval in writing of the University Budget for 1954-55, as presented at this meeting of the Board, and of the specific actions as to financing and operation suggested in the Budget Letter.)

Pursuant to notice, a special meeting of the Board of Trustees which was called for the purpose of considering the future course of the University, was held in the Library of Ida Noyes Hall, 1212 East 59th Street, Chicago, Illinois, on Thursday, May 13, 1954, at 3 P.M.

There were present: Mr. Ryerson, in the chair, Messrs. Aldis, Arnett, Axelson, Bell, Benton, Blair, Brown, Cone, Gaylord Donnelley, Field, Jr., Goodman, Graham, A. B. Hall, Jarvis, Kimpton, Lloyd, McConnell, H. A. Moore, Murray, Nicely, Nuveen, Paepcke, Prince, Quantrell, Randall, Ranney, Rockefeller, Sherer, Smith, D. B. Stern, G. H. Stern, Stuart, Sulzberger, Swift, Tenney, and Zimmermann, also, Messrs. Filbey, J. P. Hall, Harrell, Harrison, Kirkpatrick, H. H. Moore, and Watkins.

Prayer was offered by Mr. Goodman.

The Chairman stated that the significance and importance of the meeting was indicated by the presence of such a large number of active and honorary Trustees. He stated that the time had come to take a frank look at the University and determine what its future course shall be, and that this special meeting had been called for that purpose.

He pointed out that the result of the Chancellor's new approach to University problems has been gratifying and of tremendous importance. The University's house has been put in order and we are now operating on a balanced budget. He stated that we do not have the resources, however, to move forward with our educational program or even to maintain the University at its present level. The administrative staff and faculty have studied the problem and prepared a report and recommendations which were reviewed at the Lakeside conference and have been given further consideration since that time. This report, which the administrative officers believe represents the best analysis that can be made of the problem, is to be formally presented by the Chancellor at this meeting. A copy of the report is available for each Trustee for his information and further study. He stated that the members of the Board should feel free to make any comment they saw fit concerning the report and its recommendations, and that he hoped there would be full and free discussion of all aspects of the problem. He stated that the first question to be considered is: What is the problem and what is to be done about it, and the next question is how it is to be done. He stated that the Chancellor and Mr. Watkins would discuss these questions at this meeting, and that the discussion would be continued

that evening following the Dinner at the Chancellor's House.

The Chancellor added his words of appreciation to those of Mr. Ryerson for the splendid response of the active and honorary Trustees to the call for the special meeting. He pointed out that the chief job of the head of an academic institution is to make it academically strong. He first discussed the neighborhood problem which he indicated was one of the greatest problems that the University faces today. In this connection he reviewed the early history of the University and paid tribute to William Rainey Harper who was responsible for the founding of the University, and to John D. Rockefeller who carried the financial burden of the University for many years. He pointed out that the site selected for the University was, at that time, the best part of Chicago, and was an ideal location for a considerable period of time. He stated that increasingly a more undesirable group has entered the area. The influx of this group with its attendant problem of illegal conversions has created a most critical situation which we have taken steps to correct. We have spent some \$2,000,000 in acquiring property in the area or in assisting faculty members to do so. We have participated actively in the organization and operation of the South East Chicago Commission. The Commission which has for its objectives the reduction of crime in the area, the prevention and abolition of illegal conversions, and the adoption of a plan for the development of the area, is doing a remarkable job under the direction of Julian Levi. He stated that great progress has been made on all fronts during the last three years, but the infiltration continues and that we have, in fact, been winning the battles but losing the war. He indicated that while we are capable of living in an interracial community there is a recognized limitation to our ability to assimilate. He pointed out that a faculty community near the University is desirable; it promotes the work of the faculty, and contributes to the happiness of the faculty member and his family. It is also true that we cannot retain desirable faculty members if they must live a great distance from the University. Also it is almost impossible to operate hospitals when members of the staff cannot live near the University; and students are not attracted to a University where the community life is unwholesome. He indicated that if we lose the community we have lost the University. He recommended a more aggressive policy of buying up properties in the University neighborhood in order that we may preserve the University community. He estimated that a minimum additional sum of from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 is needed

if we are to control the area, and we do not have the money.

Mr. Kimpton next discussed the enrolment problem. Taking the year 1940 as a normal pre-war year and using 100 per cent to represent enrolment in that year, he pointed out that our peak post-war enrolment was 124 per cent as compared with 170 per cent for Harvard and 159 per cent for Columbia. He stated that our enrolment has steadily declined and is now 66 per cent of pre-war while Harvard and Columbia at this time are in the range of from 130 per cent to 140 per cent. He stated that as shown by the foregoing, we gained less in enrolment through the post-war period, and have lost far more than any other major university. He pointed out that not only has our enrolment seriously declined since 1949, but the necessary balance between graduate and undergraduate enrolment has not been maintained. In 1939 we had substantially more undergraduate students than graduate students, but by 1953 the situation was reversed. He stated that it costs about ten times as much to educate a graduate student as it does an undergraduate student, and it is economically impossible for the University to continue with the kind of ratio it now has. Another aspect of our declining enrolment is that as undergraduate students decrease, the atmosphere of the campus changes and the University becomes less desirable from the standpoint of undergraduates. He blamed our decline in undergraduate enrolment upon (a) the popular belief that we desire only superior students, (b) the location of the A.B. degree that we gave out over a period of years, (c) the undesirable reputation we have gained with the high schools, and (d) the failure of our alumni to send their children to the University. He stated that to maintain our position as a first rate university we need a student body of 10,000, about evenly divided between graduates and undergraduates. He pointed out that we have taken definite steps to increase our undergraduate enrolment. We have changed our undergraduate program. Beginning last fall, a group from the University has visited some 27 cities, has talked to alumni, high school administrators, college counselors, and prospective students, and has told them about the University. We have representatives in the field whose business it is to contact prospective students and try and interest them in the University. He pointed out also that our dormitory facilities are wholly inadequate. We have a present enrolment of some 4,200 students, and are now housing slightly more than 40 per cent of these students. With an enrolment of 10,000 students by 1960, it is estimated that we will require an additional 1,600 units to house them.

Enrolment

Mr. Kimpton stated that the next big problem that confronts the University is the budget. He pointed out that each year since 1938, except for three war years, the University has had an operating deficit. The budget has been brought into balance for the current fiscal year, but at considerable cost in terms of University morale. During the period referred to above we have spent some \$10,500,000 of endowment (of which some \$6,500,000 was for new buildings and \$4,000,000 was for underwriting the budget) and some \$12,100,000 of suspense and reserve funds (\$8,500,000 for buildings and \$3,600,000 for budget underwriting). He stated that since 1938 we therefore have spent in total \$22,600,000 for new construction and for underwriting the budget. He stated that it was not possible to prepare a balanced budget for 1954-55 without further weakening the University, but that the deficit of some \$600,000 shown in that budget should be met largely through year end savings in this and the next fiscal year. He pointed out that we cannot keep up the morale and quality of the faculty, and we cannot hold our place as a great institution if we are continually cutting the budget.

He stated that the University's public relations have improved considerably, and are probably as good as can be expected.

He stated that the University has two alternatives. It can let the neighborhood deteriorate, liquidate areas of University activity, and end up as a second rate institution, or it can go out and raise additional funds in an all-out campaign, and be prepared to attract the kind and numbers of students we want when the big up-swing in the birth rate reaches university age in the next few years. He stated that he and the other administrative officers enthusiastically favor the second of these alternatives. He expressed the opinion that the campaign would generate good public relations, and would be a big morale builder within the University. He recalled the tremendous contribution that the University has made to basic knowledge in this country in the past, and pointed out that it has an equally important role to play in the future. He stated that he desired to present formally to the Trustees at this time the report referred to by Mr. Ryerson, which had been prepared by the administrative staff and faculty during the past year, which sets forth a factual inventory of the needs of the University for the next five years. He stated that the report was carefully prepared, and is thought to represent a correct appraisal of University requirements. He stated that the other administrative officers are willing to participate actively in a

fund raising campaign and that if the Trustees approve he is prepared to devote practically his entire time during the next two years to the furtherance of such a campaign.

In conclusion he stated that it has been an old pattern at the University for one administration to expand and the next to retrench, and it is his hope that in his administration he may both retrench and then go forward to a well-considered strengthening of the whole University.

(Copy of report above referred to presented by the Chancellor entitled, "Report to the Committee on Campus Improvement and Development", is attached to the official copy of the minutes of this meeting.)

In the general discussion that followed the Chancel-Lor's remarks in which various aspects of the proposed fund raising campaign were considered, it was brought out that the University should have at least \$25,000,000 of new money, and that a drive for that amount of money would be considered a major drive of this type. It was also brought out that the University has been raising approximately \$6,000,000 a year through gifts, and that if a drive for funds were undertaken the target amount would be over and above the annual gifts.

The Secretary of the University stated that the report presented by the Chancellor was designed to form the basis for a major financial campaign. He stated that some two years ago he presented to the Board a three point public relations and development program. The first objective was to do something about public relations, with emphasis on the Chicago scene, and it is thought that public relations have improved. The second objective was to establish an integrated system of divisional and professional school programs, and such coordinated fund raising programs have been provided for. The third objective was to institute an all University fund raising campaign such as has been proposed at this meeting.

He stated that if the proposed drive is undertaken, the summer months will be used for the development of a public relations and publicity campaign and the preparation of literature and prospects. Preliminary solicitation for special gifts also will be undertaken during this period. It is anticipated that major publicity will be launched during the fall of 1954 and a full scale special gifts campaign launched at

that time. It is planned that the first public appeal will be made in 1955. If a fund raising campaign is approved by the Board it is proposed that a steering committee of the Board be appointed to determine major objectives, and to report back at the June meeting. It is proposed also that a faculty committee be appointed which will advise and help arrange for solicitation. It is contemplated also that professional counsel will be retained to direct the campaign and advise as to procedure. The campaign will be directed from the campus except in the public solicitation stage when headquarters will be in the loop.

The Chairman stated that in his opinion the University should undertake the campaign. He pointed out that if such a step is taken we cannot afford to fail as that would be worse than doing nothing. He stated that if the Board decides to go ahead it should not regard the details of planning as suggested by Mr. Watkins as controlling, but should make its own decisions as to procedure. Mr. Ryerson indicated that he expects to participate actively in the campaign, and that he knew the Board also would except to participate in every way possible. He stated that Robert F. Duncan, who handled the University's fund raising campaign in 1924 and who is assisting at this time in an advisory capacity, would be present at the evening discussion. He suggested that if the Trustees approved in principle of the proposal that the University undertake an all out drive to raise funds, that it authorize the appointment of a Steering Committee from the Board which would plan the campaign and submit a report and recommendation at the June meeting of the Board.

In answer to an inquiry as to the possible effect of the drive upon current giving, Mr. Watkins stated it was anticipated that Foundation giving, which constitutes roughly one-half of the annual gifts received, would continue at approximately its present level; it is thought that group giving, which constitutes approximately \$200,000 of the annual gift total, would not be affected; and it is expected that both corporation and individual giving, which in approximately a two to one proportion constitutes the remainder of the annual gift total, would drop somewhat. He pointed out that of the approximately \$6,000,000 in gifts and grants last year, slightly more than \$1,000,000 contributed directly to regular budget support.

Following discussion,

It was voted by the unanimous vote of all Trustees present at the meeting that a fund raising campaign be launched and that the Chairman be authorized to appoint a Steering Committee for the purpose of planning a campaign for the raising of such an amount of money as may be subsequently determined by the Board; the Committee to submit a report and recommendation specifying the major objectives to be achieved in such campaign, at the June, 1954, meeting of the Board; it being understood that the Chairman of the Board shall be Chairman of the said Steering Committee, and of the Campaign Committee which will have general charge of the fund raising campaign.

The Chairman thereupon appointed the following Trustees as members of the Steering Committee provided for in the foregoing action:

Edward L. Ryerson, Chairman Fairfax M. Cone Gaylord Donnelley Gardner H. Stern Harold H. Swift Henry F. Tenney

The Chairman pointed out that the June meeting, at which the report of the Steering Committee is to be presented, is also the annual meeting of the Board, and that he hopes there will be large attendance at that meeting.

The Chancellor expressed his appreciation for the consideration that the Trustees had given to the fund raising proposal and for the action taken with respect thereto. He stated that he welcomed the drive and felt confident that it would be successful.

On the recommendation of the Secretary of the University, and following discussion,

It was voted that the sum of \$100,000 be appropriated from Unrestricted Suspense funds to cover initial expense incurred in connection with the fund raising campaign; it being understood that budgets covering campaign expense will be submitted through the Steering Committee to the Budget Committee at approximately six-month intervals, and that an accounting for


