Dear Sir,

Prof. Geffcken is a distinguished writer  
and a first-rate scholar in questions of  
European and German Politics, international  
law, ecclesiastical affairs, social  
matters, relation between Church and  
State &c. I don't believe that he would  
like to write on general literature,  
in the sense, in which Monod writes on  
French literature. I don't know whether he  
pays sufficient attention to the march  
of historical literature and the development  
of historical researches in Germany, to be  
capable of writing a substantial review



of this important branch of literature  
Perhaps he would.

Mr. Jeffries is a sincere, believing Christian  
of ~~it~~ and a warm friend and member  
of the Lutheran Church, but as far as  
I can judge, without the least narrowness  
of mind or even the shadow of intolerance.  
I may designate him as a liberal-conservative.

Since my last letter to you I have  
endeavoured to procure better information  
respecting the religious and ecclesiastical  
views and opinions of Dr. Pusey, than  
I had; but I have not yet received from  
England some of his works, which are not  
within my reach. I have read a remarkable

article on Pusey in the present number  
of the Quarterly Review; it has convinced me,  
that, not to lay myself open to severe attacks  
and reproaches, I must read much more  
of P's publications and wait for the  
approaching work of his biographer.  
Actually besides the library labours, which  
an agreement interdicts with a publisher  
makes imperative, I am in a state of  
regular siege laid by a Order of Gentlemen,  
who has arrived from England to require my  
assistance to the publication of a theological  
work. I can't help wishing every day,  
that I had less reputation and more  
leisure
