I quite see the danger  
involved in it - to the  
Clerical Schools &c

Religious Educator -  
if it is followed

S. W. Chamberlain

On the other hand  
I do not see in principle  
any objection to it  
that many others do -  
and I trust that  
Compulsory Education  
involves as it does  
at least Compulsory

payment of the Parent (which  
is former analogous to  
(compulsory feeding &  
clothing of children -)  
but (compulsory withdrawal  
ment also of the child  
or children from the  
wage earner in the  
family - gives a fair  
or at any rate a plau-  
sible plea - for free  
Education.

of the child - if perhaps

I have telegraphed up
