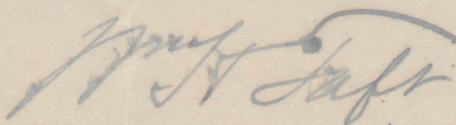

I am returning the M.S., in which I have made some slight alterations, so as to include a paragraph p. 24. on the Day Industrial School System without lengthening the article. In America this System, which applies to towns rather than to country districts, has been worked extensively for over 25 years with convincing success. I have long been satisfied that it is the best and most economical, if not the only largely available mode of

reaching the lowest and most neglected and difficult class of children. It is matter for congratulation that the public conscience and common sense, both in the House and out of it, are awakening to the claims of children as identified with the interests of the State. I hope you may be able to find room for the article early in the Session. The Emigration of this class of children is also of great importance. I have worked at it personally, and am glad that it is under the consideration of the Foot

but I thought it better not to weight the article with it.

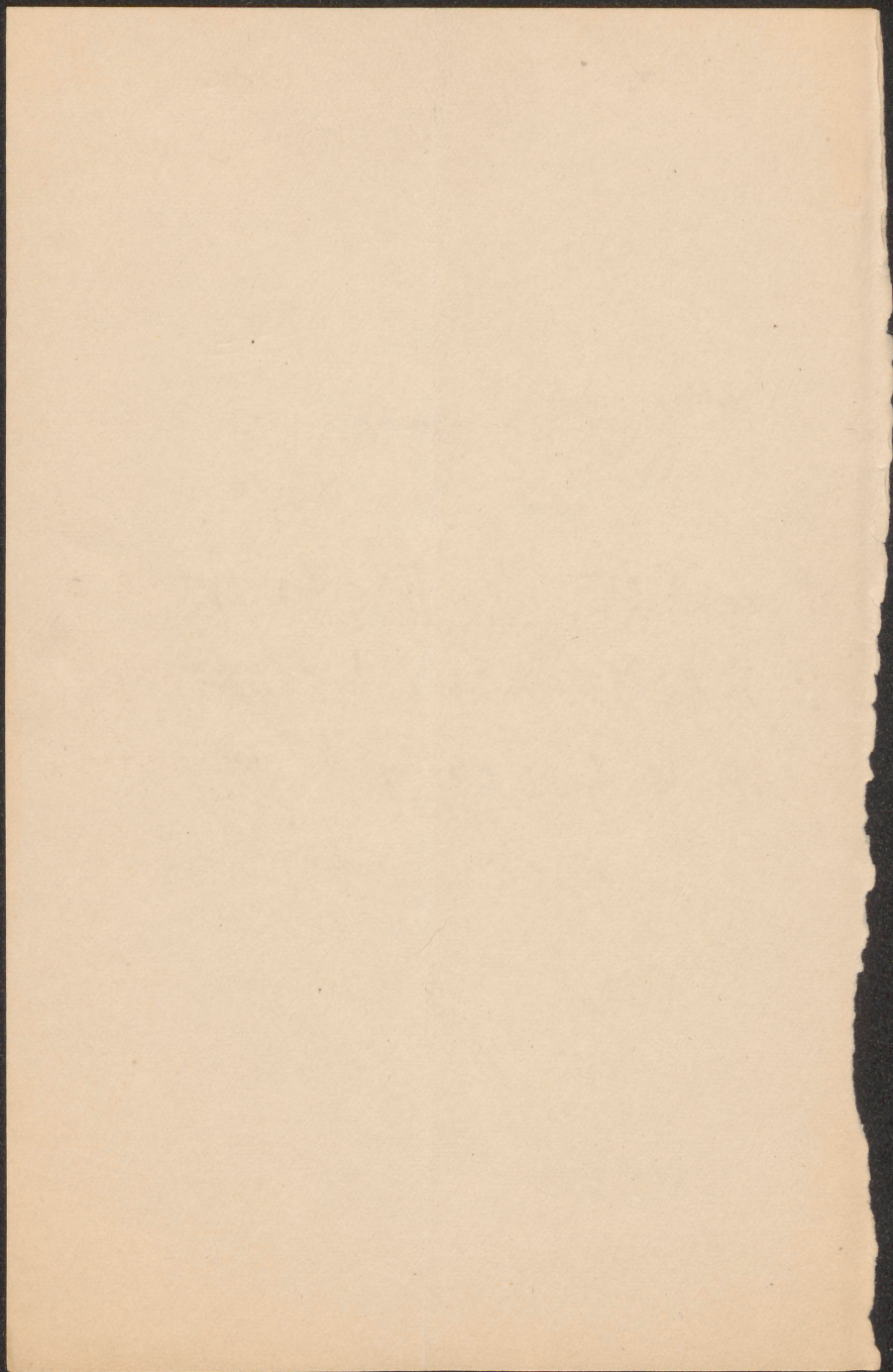
