I have just been over the matter of Salisbury's library for Rogers Park with Mr. Chase. I cannot quite make out whether he has all the books. Mr. Salisbury begins the course at Rogers Park next Saturday evening, and I know that he is extremely anxious that the books should be there, even a little before the course begins, and at all events, at that time. I remember that in his letter, which I believe I sent over to you, he said that some of the books could be obtained from himself; doubtless you noted that point.

I also sent over a list of books wanted by Dr. Kent at Belvidere. His course begins on the 29th, which is Wednesday next. I will say to you in confidence that the University Extension Division has a little money, and in any case where you know there is delay in a very important purchase, due to Mr. Chase's delicacy in taxing the University credit any further, I think perhaps the difficulty can be overcome by drawing on that fund. Of course, I do not wish to do that any further than is necessary because we need the money for other purposes, and these libraries are supposed to be provided for without such measure.
