



My dear Mrs. Dixon:-

In Professor Troop's course of lectures on the Great Essayists of the 19th Century, he has added lectures on Lowell and Holmes, and these authors are being selected in certain of the centres. The assigned readings on Lowell are: The Biglow Papers and the essays on Emerson as a Lecturer, and On A Certain Condescension in Foreigners. The additional recommended readings ~~and~~ include the Table for Critics, the Vision of Sir Launfal, Under the Willows and certain Essays. The assigned readings on Holmes are: The Autocrat of the Breakfast Table, and Elsie Venner. The additional recommended readings are the Professor at the Breakfast Table and his Poems.

The libraries, as in other instances, should be made up of several copies of each of the assigned readings and one or two copies of the addition recommended readings. Courses in which these lectures are included will begin early in October. Will you therefore kindly order at your earliest convenience the books needed for the traveling libraries. I also enclose herewith a list of the books which Professor Zueblin desires included in the traveling libraries for his courses on American Municipal Progress and Work and Wealth. Each of these courses will be given but once during the Autumn Quarter. During the Winter Quarter we shall probably need three or four libraries on American Municipal Progress.
