



My dear Mrs. Dixon:-

The University Extension Center at Princeton Indiana, under the auspices of which Professor Troop is to deliver his course on Shakespeare's Heroines, desires very much a library. The lectures yet to be delivered in Princeton are the third, fourth fifth, sixth and seventh listed on page nineteen of our Circular of Information under the head of "Shakespeare's Heroines." Inasmuch as Mr. Troop promised a library to the center and the officers in turn made a similar promise to the members of the center, I think it best that we endeavor to supply it. 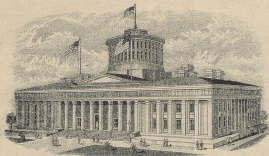

The University expended nearly \$40,000. for the various branches of the work which are carried on outside of the University, and which are known as University Extension. The total income from all departments of this work was \$31,000. showing that the University expended nearly \$9,000. a year more upon the work than it received in return.
