Sir having a little business at Washington and having no other acquaintance there in whom I can confide I take the liberty to address you a few lines with the request that you will ^{make} some enquiry into for me and inform me of the result if your time is not too much engrossed by other more important business — Something more than one year ago I forwarded to the ~~post~~ office at Washington an application for a land warrant my claims were as follows
in the year (1812) I volunteered under a law of Congress authorising the president to raise a certain number of volunteers for the service for twelve months you are doubtless acquainted with the law, the company which I belonged was raised in Smith County State of Tennessee the company was commanded by Captain Brie Martin I belonged to the first Regiment commanded by W^m Hall Edward Bradley was the Lieutenant Colonel & Samuel Lauderdale was our Major we rendezvoused at Nashville Tennessee on the 10th December 1812 went down the river as far as Hatchey in the Spring of 1813 we returned again to Nashville and was there discharged until further orders in September following we were again called out marched to the Creek nation of Indians after the two battles of Tallakay & Talledego we returned home I think we were discharged the 30th December during both Tours we were commanded by General Jackson as Commander in Chief — Sometime in October or November last I rec'd a letter from the post office informing me that the first tour of duty could not be found there for the last tour the I was entitled to a warrant but they suspended the first for further proof & ^{not} issued a warrant for ~~the~~ last tour I did not receive a discharge

the reason why we did not was because we were discharged
in a new Country and a great distance from a printing office
and that supposing it of much use we did not demand it
for the first tour of duty I received a Discharge signed
by Andrew Jackson Major General — on receiving
Notice from the pension office I again made further search
for my discharge and fortunately found it I immediately
after taking a copy of it and having it witness'd for
fear of miscarriage enclosed it to the proper office since
which I have not heard from it

now Sir will you be so kind as to make some enquiry
at the pension office about my claim and please request
them to forward to me whatever I am entitled to receive
I am desirous to get it before all the land in the State
is disposed of in complying with the above request you will
much oblige an old friend I am with great respect



My dear Sir,

I am one of the Board of Trustees of Miami University, a college near Cincinnati of which I have ^{been for} a quarter of a century a graduate. Of course I feel great interest in its growth and welfare. I have been requested to write to any member of Congress I know, and other Trustees have done the same thing I propose to do. The institution is well situated well officered, & may well; but it is thought could do better with a little public aid. added now to its former endowment. It receives only about \$6000. per annum from one of the richest townships of land in Ohio, which was let out in parcels long ago on perpetual lease. The rent remains very low, & there is no revocation. The college would stand like a tree if it had its annuity doubled; but it totters.

Now, it is understood that Congress will soon cede to the old Western States about public lands yet remain in the Fed Govt. and there is no good reason why something should not meantime be given to the cause of learning. Perhaps no better appropriation of the public property can be found. The care of the rising generation is all important, and their moral and intellectual interests are paramount.


