Dear Sir To day I have had another interview with Schell. I have also had some talk with Alderman Bass, and have had a full talk with Edwin Rosewell. The latter is a prudent discreet man and your friend.

I think that the object which I am pursuing can be accomplished but it will be with difficulties. I find that it is well now to

begin now Breckinrise.

You know his obstinacy & his
hatred of the softs but in my
judgement he can be won over
and I have progressed far
enough here in the City to be
