Dear Sir

Your note of the 21st recall

the rest. I wish I could do

cess but I do not feel war
wanted in doing so, for our
State has already a full
portion of these stations and
it is made an argument a-
gainst us constantly. The
President it is true is from
our State but he is bound to
consider the rights of all
sections of the country &
hence our chances are limit-
