I hastily write you these few lines in relation to our Post-office. I have just now learned that Mr. Bagg has left here en route for Washington, and on his way thither intends remaining a few days in your city, no doubt for the purpose of seeing Judge Douglas. I have also been informed that Col. Mitchell intends leaving here, (as he says) for Springfield, but I have pretty strong evidence to satisfy myself that this is merely a subterfuge, and that his real intention is to go to Washington. They will make a bold effort to have our friend Bramley removed - and as I know that you are in a position to render him good service I thought proper to inform you of the above facts.

I do not intend saying

any thing here to satisfy you that Bagg is
utterly unfit for the office to which he aspires -
you know the man and that is sufficient.
But I must add that he is entirely unworthy,
and has pursued a very dishonorable course
in this matter, not only towards Bramley,
but towards many of our best Democrats







I may succeed - although I confess the emolument
of the salary to meet life! and support me -
Now my dear Sir, I am involving all the aid
in my power to accomplish my appointments

matter & promises to confer with you about
it - he has written strongly to the President,
and also had an interview - our (unappointed)
delegation - all the public officers - & the most
prominent members of the party in the City & State
are addressing letters in my behalf -

Pray you not my dear friend unite in
this holy cause - I Mr. Graham & self are
in the greatest affliction at the conduct of
our liege (which I surrender every iota
of comfort, treasure &c. to fly an eye, to save
our beloved - We would ask you to send

us strong letters to the President &
Party of State & show your addresses
them in a tone which will indicate
your friendly solicitude for our
family, whom you have so long loved
Genl. J. P. Graham writes in affec-
tionate regards to your good wife.
