I received your favor by Mr Mc Hatton and when I go south next week will ascertain the value of his land & will try and adjust a fair arrangement between you. I advised him to buy 800 acres adjoining his tract, 600 of which has been in cultivation. This will furnish enough of cleared land the first season for all your field hands.

As your son will be without land at the close of the partnership I

work it right, he should have
the privilege of buying one half
or all the land of he chooses to
do so, and I shall therefore
reserve that right for him;
leaving it optional with himself
whether he takes the land or not.
Wm Hutton writes me today he
has bought the 800 acres and
the buildings will be commenced
forthwith - There will be land
enough to work two hundred
hands. I will go over to Pearl
River & after placing a fair value
on the negroes & also on W Hutton's
land will make what I conceive
to be a just arrangement.

Will you & Mr Douglas be over
to the Fair? It will be a brilliant

affair. are you satisfied
with the result in Ky. Tenn
etc. Carolina & Alab. -
Keep Illinois right & the other
states of the Union will respond
as you wish in 1860.


To the Post Master General of the United States
Sir.

Your attention is respectfully solicited to the following statement and petition of the Post Masters and the inhabitants living on and near the Mail route No. 1349 in the State of Illinois, from Peru to Pontiac. Said route crosses the Illinois River at Peru by Ferry, and during the last winter, on account of high water and ice, the people along said route were without a Mail for the space of five weeks, during all of which time the Cars were daily crossing the Rail Road bridge near said place, - the only bridge there, while the ferry was impassable. The remainder of the route to Pontiac is not difficult, and we therefore petition, that the said Mail route be so altered that it commence at Touica on the Ill. Central R. Road, 10 miles south of Peru, and thence to Pontiac, as at present, thus avoiding all of the above mentioned delay.

And moreover we respectfully set forth - that as this route is through a very populous Country, and daily becoming more thickly settled, we petition for a Mail twice a week, from Touica via Galloway, Eagle point, Reading, Arcona, Long-point and Rooks Creek P.O's to Pontiac (the present route,) and as the present Carrier, Mr. Scott is a very infirm man about 70 years of age, and incapable of enduring the inclemency of the weather at all times, and has also expressed to A. Hallam Esq. P.M. at Long Point, his wish and intention to quit the business, on account of age and ill Health - We therefore request you to appoint in his stead Mr. George Brown, at present of Peru, Contractor and Carrier, on said twice a week route.

Mr. Brown is a reliable man in every respect
being industrious, honest, energetic and prompt,
and formerly ran the present weekly route to the
entire satisfaction of those interested therein —
He proposes to carry the mail twice a week, from
Tonica to Pontiac and back, for the sum of Six
Hundred Dollars, yearly — And as we the undersigned
are familiar with the route, we, in case it is granted,
suggest to the Department, the following as a suitable
Schedule — Leave Tonica at noon on Monday, arrive
at Pontiac at noon on Tuesday — Leave Pontiac at
2 o'clock on Tuesday and lay over at Reading, so as
to arrive at Tonica on Friday at 11 o'clock — Leave
Tonica again at noon, and arrive at Pontiac on
Saturday at noon — Leave same day at noon and
laying over Sunday at Reading, arrive at Tonica
on Monday at 11 o'clock — All of which is respect-
fully submitted to your decision — And we may
further state, that we are not aware of any
opposition to what is here petitioned for —




