



Dear Sir:

Accept my thanks for the copy of your speech on the President's Message, in reference to the Kansas Constitution. I think your position impregnable, although I have no sympathy with the factionists in and out of Kansas; and would be glad, if it could be done without departing from any just principle, to see them punished for their folly, not to say wickedness. The question is wisely left to Congress, whether Kansas shall be admitted under the Leecompton Constitution or not; and my hope is, that wise counsels will prevail—that heated debate, between Democrats, will be avoided—and that the spirit of courtesy and kindness towards all, will be maintained, throughout the discussion.

I have been long a politician—being actively engaged as an editor in the hard fought campaign, in Lycoming co. Pa. in 1828, side by side with the present Governor elect of Pennsylvania, while John Bigler was doing similar service in Centre county, and I have never known any good to result from heated discussion among Democrats. I would have been proud to have been in a position to ^{aid in} give a tone and spirit to our great party during the fearful conflicts of the few years which have just passed, through the press; but pecuniary misfortunes have interposed and deprived me of the power, to do more than to address my fellow-citizens, as occasion offered, in our local meetings. We have gained much by the spirit which has actuated the members of the party, and a firm adherence to the fundamental principles upon which we have won our recent glorious victories, will render us invincible

in the future,不管 all the claptrap issues of all the factions in the land.

But from what I have seen in various papers, which have fallen into my hands, and especially from what appears to be the idea of Mr. Bigler, to force the Lecompton Kansas Constitution through Congress, as an Administration measure, I fear there is danger of division ahead. I have a high respect for Mr. Bigler, but am nevertheless glad that you got him to say that he did not speak by authority of the President, in the position he took in opposition to your speech. That will leave the business where it should rest, in the hands of Congress—every man free to exercise his individual judgment without the imputation of seceding from a party measure. Indeed, I believe, if it can be disposed of in that way, without being made a party question, that it will do us, as a party good, rather than harm, to dispose of

the need question, as soon as possible,
without regard to the question of submis-
sion to the people of Kansas, of their pro-
posed constitution.

"Having no one in Congress from
whom I have a right, as a constituent, to
look for favors, in the shape of Documents,
being a personal stranger to all the Ohio
Delegation, except the member from this
district, whose election I opposed with all my
might, you will confer a great favor on
me, if you will, send me a document, or
a speech, from time to time, as you may
have them to spare.




