



Mr. Whitney asked 30 miles in width to build the Pacific Railroads with & I think afterwards 60 miles wide for the same work. But this winter Alternative Sections \$25 Millions of Dollars is now asked. At least 10 Millions of Dollars Alternative Section. When Land has passed to Companies at the value of 200 per acre others can have this Land for \$6.14 per acre & if upon interest 12 years \$12 per acre interest & all will no Congressman pleads as Attorney for the settlers. Suppose that \$2.50 at 12 years and \$8.250 before that time in annual installments as first lesson in Railroading for the Masters of Settlers in the Land Office District Common Schools of Railroads unlike & better than any R.R.C. Scarp the round Globe, is better than the giving over \$10 for \$6 worth of Land in order to have the unspeakable privilege of paying in the prices of all their crops away & merchandise back as long as winds blow & water runs. for transportation over & over again in Eternal circles of 10 years for dead unfed unagent meeting down ant gradings of west realities. And must the inanimate corpse the skeleton of scouping & banking of the lively Pacific Railroads be paid over every 5 years by the citizens of our whole Country for intrizing to feel for the warm heart strings of Settlers I have put my fingers upon the pure strings of the Universal Yankee Nation of U.S. States & continental Territories.

If Two Millions of acres Land were Devoted to the building of the Pacific Railroad of the Choicest Situations to be sold for what in due time it will fetch from \$2.50 per acre to \$800 or more per acre It's to be brought forward to the best advantage to help build the Pacific Railroads. This would be well to get some \$12 or 20 Millions of Dollars to start on the greatest work. But with this exception

Every acre of Land should be 4 folded in price half to be in 12 years to settling pre-emptees & half price to be in yearly installments for the Pacific Main & Lateral Railroads & the necessary branchers leading there to be taken up as needed & other Lands & Land Office taken out of market. But when this Pacific Railroad is located the branches will fast be set back in tall work at the Domain States. But before Spring feed comes at all the entire Frontier from Lake Superior & to Red River of Tex as far should be fitted out with a miniature timbered track & a route carried if possible to the Forks of the Nebraska River & by Spring feed to San Francisco & thence back to the Californian Gulf & up to El Paso. When the summer feed fails the Government should open Land districts from the Mouths of the Ohio River & from New Orleans to Red River of Texas & by the last of February 1859 open from St. Charles 15 miles above St. Louis to Central Bluffs the called Mississippi Northern Railroad & the coming year the Memphis & Vicksburg route as far east of Vicksburg as possible to join the Florida route. Value of Northern Lake Michigan & Government should make an outfitting of \$1,000,000 at the start in this winter & if profitable next Spring & Summer \$1000,000 more & should pay part prices for transportation until a Grading & Super structure is fitted with the Iron & the Steam Locomotives. The outfitting to consist of Grain for feed for 60 men & teams & to \$1,000 wagons & mowers & tractors for a tie timbered length wise B.P.C. carts & equipment very light as for moving the tracks at some 8 miles per hour to turn up timber & luggage of necessary freight.
