

From representations of Capt
McClellan & Mr Wilson I am induced to enclose
to you the accompanying application for an extension
of Furlough, in the hope that you will do me
the favor of having it granted -

The Presd^t & Directors of the Road seem to
think that my services are required at this
juncture - The magnitude of the enterprise
makes its success of National importance, there
cannot, therefore, be any professional objection
to my connection with it - Joining the Road
in its prosperity, I dislike to leave it now,
when under a temporary depression - This,
together with my recent marriage, makes
my very desirous of remaining for a while
longer in the West - The indulgence asked,
is not unreasonable, since I have been
sixteen & a half years on duty, thirteen
years & four months of which have been aflock -
Nor is it by any means unusual, as furloughs
are always granted for much longer periods

than Leaves of Absence -

I do not wish to trespass unduly upon your time, & must beg therefore, that if at all inconvenient you will not trouble yourself with this matter, but merely have the letter for Mr Tonney dropped in the Post.

Many thanks for the copy of your Speech on the Stans as LeCompton Question - It has struck the right chord in the West; the outcry of the Opposition to the contrary notwithstanding - We hardly know which to admire the man, the doctrine it lays down, or the intrepidity with which it was enunciated at such an important crisis -



Andardon me for the late
but wishing to state my position and
the cause I am about to pursue and
if correct will aid the cause in which
we are engaged

If I held a place in the N Y Custom
House under the administration of
your piece as soon as the Decemter
question presented itself and you took
the noble stand in favor of the personal
principle I openly asserted that it was
right I was told that the administration
had named you to me I prepared
myself in place and left determined
to make at tell at the next election

I wired upon our friends at Syria
and I told them to make a clean breast of
it and take grounds against Decemter



Dear Sir,

I have read with great pleasure, in the newspaper, your speech at the commencement of the present session, on the LeCompton Constitution, for Kansas, and am desirous to have it in pamphlet form for preservation. If you have a spare copy of it, will you have the kindness to send me one? If I had a dozen of them, under frank, I could distribute them to great advantage. Nothing has yet been written, spoken, or published, that has thrown so much confusion and distraction into the ranks of the Black Republicans; and in that way, besides making proselites from that faction, is doing much good politically, to the Democratic party. I speak from personal observation, and from information of the popular sentiment of Ohio.

I see by their letters to Philadelphia, you have the entire Cabinet arrayed against you, armed with official influence and patronage; but this ostentatious display of high public functionaries, in combination, powerful as it is, can avail nothing in conflict with the fundamental principle of all our government, - the sovereignty of the people. - It is no difficult matter to reason correctly from false premises, or from a part only of a true proposition; - in either case, the conclusion will be false; - but neither the sophistry, nor the attempted syllogism, of those holding elevated stations, however pompously put forth, will carry conviction to the mind, when placed in contrast with the simple deductions of common sense. Men in their position, should have followed the instructions of Shakespeare: -
