Dear Sir.

I have done little else, since the publication of our call, except write letters in aid of the 23rd Feb^r enterprise. I have seen, heard, and absorbed enough to know that the results will be painful, and uneventful those engaged in it, and very profitless to the general cause - as follows:

1st. We are denounced by the Clergy, and village politicians as disorganizers & bone heads. Strong party men abhor that idea of us, from the outside appearance of the matter, & without information as to intrinsic merits. Mr. and our call are denounced, & ridiculed by some, received doubtfully by some; and our warmest sympathizers stand aloof. We shall get a bad name.

2^d But the effect for the cause will be good. It lets many to thinking - will publish the whole practices of P.B. & W. by which they controlled the action of the 8. Jan^r Convention, ^{publicly} to some extent, and will agitate the main matters in 1858. It will produce a Mass meeting, of considerable numbers, from detached portions of the State - but not generally from a majority of the counties. A good platform will be adopted, and it will be reiterated, at many county meet-

ings in substance, avoiding our phraseology, and
order, so as not to appear to follow us. This will
be carefully looked to by officials, expectants &c.
It will substantially be induced by District, and
County Candidates, avoiding our phraseology &c.
I doubt if even the papers which are really
with us, & would, if they could throw off hoofs,
and hands (all imaginary) raise a shout for us &
our doing, will do otherwise than to publish
our proceedings, without remark, perhaps throw
cold water on us, or admit the absence of any no-
tice for our enterprise. While therefore we shall
effect much good, we will not only be denied any
credit, but be much spoken against. In this
view of the case I almost regret my own par-
ticipation in the matter.

If we had a paper here to take the lead it would
be altogether otherwise. Reading its healthy
and free editorials, other papers, and candid-
ates for office would strike out hotly.

I shall attend one or two County meetings, and
suppose I will be on hand on the 23^d, and there,
I suppose my duty will end - not for the want of
a will to do more, but because I shall have

no opportunities offered me.

I am perhaps too sombre. It is impossible to be
cheerful. I suppose that the subjects of all tyran-
ical governments are gloomy. The government of
the Democratic party in Ind. is, and for near or
quite a year, has a show Tyranny. Democrats
know it, but lack the courage to struggle for
freedom. The tyrants are like vultures. Touch
them softly, & you are strong. Grab them tight
and they are crushed. Our people fail
to see much of the tyranny, & that they ^{see} are prone
to touch softly, when finding themselves strong
(as I now do, in the want of the strength which I
ought to have) they drop the project of crush-
ing the tyrants, to test their fingers!!
