I have rec'd various documents &c from congress during its present session from members of my acquaintance, and among the number speeches delivered by the Hon Messrs Green of Mo & Wigler of Penna in favor of the admission of Kansas under the Lecompton const<sup>t</sup>, but have failed in obtaining a single one delivered by your self or anyone else in opposition to that measure, now sir being an admirer of the position you have taken in regard to Kansas and being unable to obtain one abstract from newspapers setting forth the principles which you advocate, has prompted me to the liberty I have assumed in introducing myself to your notice, and to ask of you Sir, through the multiplying of business which must necessarily engage your attention you could find time

Although personally a stranger I have long been acquainted with your politics. As a politician of Missouri, some 15 years ago, and an Elector on the Free ticket, I confess I have not always approved of your course, probably from a natural misunderstanding of your principles. But I never gave other than a Democratic vote, and I so heartily approve of your present position that I can not refrain from troubling you with a line, being a hint given you as to the best course to organize the Party in this territory.

If you may have noticed that we ~~had~~ started the movement at Omaha on the 8<sup>th</sup> ult, when as Chairman on Ratcliff, I introduced ad. ends of what is known as Douglas Resolutions. They were so violently assailed by Black, Tuck, and office-seekers, because they seemed to reflect on the co-operation—which they did not do—of which you can judge for yourself a city—that for the sake of harmony Ruthven

organization on the grand principle of

But we apprehend some opposition. How will

To organize the Party on any other Rafter  
would be to ruin it. If the people are to be  
denied the constitutional right to vote on the  
organic law to govern themselves the very Party

will have an opportunity of showing in '80.
