 I have seen you the last time that I saw you it was
 at Springfield the time that the Legislature set
 it about 25 or 30 years ago I was in S. C. and
 went to see a bout our situation here I left the state
 of Illinois a bout three years ago and moved to
 Iowa and settled in Harrison County a bout 10
 miles from the county seat Magnolia and a bout 8
 miles from any other person only in my times
 was hard and I dug me a hole in the ground and
 went in to it I could not get my pick and and
 I put me up a saw mill and take me out a town
 one of the first towns location that there is in the state
 of Iowa we havest Commerce building we hav got
 up several houses etc and know we ar putting up a church
 know sir there is a few mormons living a bout
 three miles a town and tha hav made a town in
 a not far from thibest place that there is in Iowa as far
 as I have bin or seen there is hardly an a body that can
 git tril or from it there is a state road running from
 the mississippi river threw this mor main town and
 three mi toon whitch I call it Acenewista and
 these mormons has got a post office a stablished
 and there is bout a few familes settit a bout there
 town there is a bout 50 or 60 a house where I live
 and we carry the mail 2 or 3 times a week from the
 County seat to no place whitch we hav no
 regular office some times we git a half a buck
 full at a time we hav pur tision for a post office
 and the post master general won't grant us one
 and the reason why I do not no if he was hear
 and had see the situation of the country
 I am intire that he cold grant us one.

I immigrated from Ohio in the year of 1818
to Illinois in green or fifty miles from any in hab.
I once wrote in with the Indians and had raised
fourteen children and seven of them is boys and
I have made the most of them on the frontiers and we
have been as much for government as any men in the
western country according to what we are worth.
I have twelve months in the service of the united states
as regular in the year of 1812 and and I had 3 sons
when I went to go to the mexican war - their was
but one that got to go he went with General harden
and he was in the battle at Buena Vista and was with
General hardin and General when they fell and on his
return home he died and was buried in the gulf
of Mexico - I never ask government any thing before
in my life that was refused that a post office
where there is one so much I needed know if a parcel
of ingles mornings can have a post office where
there is hardly any body lives and we would
have our mail to go there know Judge Dodge
Dodge 1888 I want you to try to get soon for me I have
stated by you evidence I need you not harvested
on that side ever since I had a vote and I have
spent \$ reckin five hundred dollars a less in money
for my party now that want grant me as little
as a post office know Sir I speak to you to get money
pleas and can what I write to you is the truth and I am
willing to be sworn to it and if you want any letter
information write to me and I will send it to you
if you wold see the post master General I think that
he wold grant us one it is settle thick on both sides
of the River river and beat one post office with in
5 or 10 miles of us and that belongs to a morins set
full bladed trees which is good for church or state
that ar settle all there ar country in little spots a stealin
and pickin in I an actin as a post of the people and when
they ar fetch up before me they can know any thing

it is a merricand has to be run over by a set of
mon-mans I want to leave the country Judge Dodge 1888
sir there is won more thing that I want you to attend to
that is an a state cum min to me while from the a state
of arison in mister-dave in hollin this this arison died in msterdam
in hollin and he made a will and left this a state to
a son and daughter this daughter married a son and both
of them died in newyork and made a will and died this
a state to the ars of a merrica the a state in the first place
was seven millions of dollars put out at 3 per cent interest
that has bin many years ago but I doo not kno how long
to under the administration of General Dodge it was found
out and the money has bin fetch to a merrica and I see that
sum of the ars has got their part of the state their is one of the
ars a man in mandalia Illinois has got their part and their
is another man in hollin Cane creek that has got
their part and I doo no how many more I doo not kno where

Dear Sir

I trust you will pardon me for intruding upon your valuable time when you learn my motive.

You are an old and familiar acquaintance of mine. At the same time I presume I am a stranger to you.

I was first introduced to you in the town of Winona in Ills in the spring of 1834 - the day that you left W. to make your residence in Jacksonville.

Since that time I have known you as the leper man knows the greater. I have watched with deep interest your history and have noted every turn, not because I was your political adviser, but because I admired your genius and ability. Your Rail Road speech at St Louis I very much approved and admired, believe

it to be the true sentiment of the north west
I lived in Winchester from 1834 where I married
my wife - who has always been a friend
of Yours - until 1841 when I moved to
Iowa. My chief object in writing you
at this time is to extend to you my
congratulations upon your position upon the ad-
mission of Kansas under the Lecompton
constitution. I heartily congratulate
you upon your high minded and noble
bearing upon this question. And you deserve
the more credit for standing for and defend-
ing the right, in opposition to the power
and patronage of the Administration
and the Executive. There are but four
democratic members of the Iowa legislature
but that say you are right.

How Timothy Davis of Iowa Rep is con-
gress has known me since 1844 when Jas
Harlan of the Senate has known me
since 1846, & refer you to them if you
desire to learn who I am.

What will be the result of this ques-
tion. Will Kansas be admitted with the Lecompton
constitution? If so what effect will

it have upon the democratic party?

I would take it as a very great favor
to hear from you

I hope sir that nothing can drive you
from your high position. The Country will
sustain you beyond her adventure
