Dear Sir, — You will confer a great favor on one who earnestly wishes you success in your unflinching, but somewhat hazardous, defence of popular sovereignty, by sending me your great speech made at the opening of the present session on the Kansas question, your minority report on the same subject and the speech which you may make on the Lecompton Constitution. I have read your first speech, but would like to have it in pamphlet form, (as well as the other doc,) in order to preserve them.

Our County paper, the "Democrat ic Citizen" and the "Cincinnati Enquirer", the only Democratic papers that circulate in this vicinity, both support the President on the Lecompton Constitution issue; but do not as yet decidedly condemn you.






