



I write you on a subject which we as a community (a part and parcel of this great republic) are deeply interested to wit the regulation and adaptation of the mail service to our wants, our mail arrangements are such that we get mail but once a week when we ought to have tri-weekly we have no P.O. nearer than Georgetown on the East seven miles distant, Ridge four six miles South East Salina eleven miles north none ~~west~~ to Upper Embarras about twenty five miles West we ought to have a route established from Georgetown to Pesotum on the Illinois C.R.R. distance about forty five miles so as to give them a P.O. at Hickory Grove ten miles West of this place we think we have been badly treated in this respect the citizens that

that get their mail matter at this office  
December about Five Hundred Dollars

a large majority, (anti Secession Democrats)

are anti) If we cannot get the kind of an  
arrangement asked for we would like to have  
route No 11888 from Paducah from by Suddiawola  
and New Home to Sydney discontinued  
and the Old Side cut or special route from

does no office any good but our own Paducah  
has a tri weekly mail New Home & Sydney  
a daily mail the route we ask to have discon-  
tinued costs the department more than a tri weekly  
mail from Georgetown to our place would  
we can get it carried for one Dollar per trip  
it being only seven miles (or fourteen to ~~there~~  
and back) it now costs the Department more  
than the Income of this office about one  
Hundred and fifty Dollars as much nearly

as a tri weekly would from Georgetown I have  
no doubt that before two years the route  
would pay its own expenses whilst present  
we will lack the amt before stated hoping that  
our much respected Senator will not think  
it beneath his dignity to attend to this matter  
which will greatly oblige his numerous constituents  
and fellow citizens hoping to hear from  
you in relation to this matter and if  
necessary to get up Petition how to proceed  
shall wait patiently for an answer
