



On yesterday I received your minority report on Territories exposing the frauds of the Leecompton constitution I would not address you but from the fact that our Senators have quite forgotten me though a democrat all my life and a citizen of Indiana for the last 29 years Bright I have always supported in every effort he has made in public life and have always felt proud of him as one of Indiana's best and purest men in this I fear I have been somewhat deceived in July 1854 I was appointed Route agent on the Indiana Central Rail Road from Indianapolis to Cincinnati Ohio I ran on this road some 2 years barely time to become thoroughly qualified to be of use to the public as an officer the road refused to carry the mails any longer I was notified to hold myself in readiness at any day to perform my duties as such agent!

On the first days of last January the Department and Rail Road Co contracted for carrying the mails Bright fitted and some of his tools had me removed for no reason but supposed I was anti-Leecompton this was only guessed at but they hit it

I was the only agent that has been removed in the State of Indiana or in the west as far as I can ascertain to make way for a drunken loafer living in Indianapolis this brought me to the conclusion that Mr Bright would do less to very small business for a great Statesman and one that has filled so many important trusts merely to punish a man that has always been his friend for our differences of opinion I have been trying to carry out our platform adopted at Cincinnati in 1856 in good faith

All I have to say at this note for the Leecompton
Constitution and when his time is out he will not
soon betray an other Democratic constituency we of
Indiana that is the Democrats intent to send men
that will do our business in our own way that
vote will be Brights and Fitchies winning sheet if
they dig their own graves we will bury them

I stand your ground the bone and sinew of the Indi-
ana Democracy are with you as far as my knowledge ex-
-tends anti Leecompton has at least $\frac{1}{3}$ of the party

Dear Sir

While you were in

the full tide of success and seemed to be a very general favorite, I had no flattery to present and no favors to ask at your hands. You know I have been during my whole life, a firm reliable & undeviating democrat, of at least a fair standing & sufficient ability to command the respect of my fellow citizens and to exercise ~~a decided~~ influence upon the stump. I have not been particularly desirous of putting myself in your way because I thought & felt that you had chosen in elections in this region, who held your ear, & yet had no home power or influence. I desired to live independent and to be in a position to act without reference to any ~~position~~ ^{advice} you might assume.

You are no longer on the pinnacle of fame
and have no offices to bestow - many
of your friends, indeed most of those
trusted & promoted by you, have deserted
you, because power has left your
standard. It is not to be denied
that thousands even in Illinois have
deserted you. and at the end of the
number comes that magnificent
humbug wormed into life & sustained
in position by your influence "Genl
Shields of Minnesota. This shows you
the stuff gaping politicians are made
of. But now that the tide is running
strong against you, let me, who have
never yet flattered, tell you that the
great mass of the people are with you,
that the sound thinking, reliable firm
influential men, of standing of strength
& ability are with you upon the Kansas
controversy. Many who would not
have sustained you if this question
had not arisen, are now with you
in this City I do not think truly

voters can be induced from who would
hesitate to go with you heart & soul.
There is your old implacable enemy Judge
Purple who rejoices in your apparent
difficulties, and the others who are
against you are such as are influenced
by the hope of immediate reward
The "Union" newspaper never had any
reliable principle - my personal influence
has kept it on the straight path for the
last three years, but \$417. offered by
the Post Office Department was stronger
than I was. It is now your bitter foe
But the mass, the men who do the voting
& thinking are with you, & whatever
may be the result in Congress, it will be
difficult to drive them from you
It is especially hard to make war upon
the administration ^{of} our choice, but what
are we to do when that administration
enters the field sword in hand, & slaps
off the head of every man who refuses
to march up to the rack & kick the
hand of power? Does Mr Buchanan

imagine that he is endowed with absolute royal power and that the people are his slaves, subject to his royal commands.⁵ He may perhaps destroy the Democratic party, but can he do more, can he play out his game twice? Truly it seems impossible to me. - It also seems to me there is but one alternative and that is to strike strong and hard for freedom & the right, to strike for the great principle of self government, the right of the people to accept or reject any organic law offered them. Has it come to this, that a Constitution is to be forced upon a people after they have rejected it by an overwhelming majority? That they are to be swindled cheated & deluded in the name of justice? Well & wisely did Madame Roland say "Oh justice what crimes have been committed in thy name!"

I write this letter from no personal motive - It is to simply to add strength to your zeal, to assure you of support, and to add my earnest hope, that you will

gather
all the facts in one great reservoir, and
purl them with power & force at the foe,
What though they should out vote you?
Do not all conquerors respect a gallant
foe? - Do they not stand in awe of
him who fights manfully, fearlessly -
courageously to the end? If you must
die, die game, Don't let any intimidation
or any demonstration against your
friends diminish your zeal. If this
letter should give you even a momentary
addition to your invincible spirit I
shall be fully rewarded


