

mind in Connecticut.


Not only the great American & Repub-

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Chicago March 1. 1858.

Hans J. A. Douglass.

Dr. Sir.

I greatly sympathize with you in this struggle of yours against the Tyranny of the President of these United States - a man who - His Tyrant and Scoundrel do not live, than he - His conduct towards you is conclusive evidence of the fact. I have often wished lately that I was Senator for three hours just to give him a piece of my mind, in defense of the rights of Senators.

Sir, allow me to say, you have the People with you - fear not the old Tyrant - he has wanted by such and such means, made war on you, by punishing those who express opinions in your favour, or who are known to be your friends in office. He is using his tyrannical power to force you into submission to his will.
