





My dear Sir - Although I

am personally almost an utter stranger to you, & may therefore run some risk of misconstruction of motives, or of impertinence, still my feelings impel me to write and address to you however inadequately, the hearty thanks of the Democrat, at least, for the noble & honest stand you have taken in the Senate, on the vexed & vexing question arising out of the Lecompton Kansas Constitution. Your position on this question, indeed, is none other than that which a due regard to your own character for consistency, as well as a proper regard for the honor of the Democratic Party, and the plainest principles of right sternly demanded of you. That you met that demand, manfully & firmly, & will, I doubt not, fully satisfy it, so far as your own acts & influence are concerned, merit, & should receive, in my judgment, the tribute of admiration & approval of


