I am here as a member of the House of Reps. and I take the liberty to write to you a few words respecting the political condition of things. Your cause respecting Kansas and the Lecompton constitution has been watched here with intense interest, and I speak knowingly when I say that six sevenths of the democracy are with you in conviction of the right and in feeling. In addition to resolutions counter to the republican resolutions offered in the early part of the session, the lone side dem-

vering brought in a protest
against the Republican resolutions
in which they clearly set forth:-
that the Kansas & Nebraska act
contains the free doctrine, and
that by it the Lecompton constitu-
tion was required to be submitted
to the people:- that the people did
not and could not vote upon that
constitution:- that for Congress
to reject a constitution thus pre-
sented was not intervention &c:-
that Congress might go behind
the constitution to ascertain the
will of the people:- that no new
state ought to be admitted with-
out its institution being submit-
ted to the people. There were 30
Democrats in this House, 22 of
whom signed this protest:- My
friend Patchong of Dubuque
brought in a Lecompton protest
which was signed by 5 persons.

which left 3 who did not make
this mark:- it is understood that
they are with the Majority, but
one timid. In the Senate it is not
known at least to me, that there
are more than 2 Lecompton
Democrats. The rank & file of the
Democrats, and even the leaders
who sit without reward or the
hope thereof, except in a few in-
stances are on the true platform
as it is found in real, practical,
honest common sense, and not
in the overdone fictions of law.

The overwhelming sense, and
heart of the tens of thousands is
sound, patriotic, & right.

My dear Sir //

I had not time to write you from Columbus. We had a good Convention - not so large as it might have been, but all sections of the State were represented. The best reliable Democrats were present and participated in the proceedings. Multitudes in the party who are anti-Compromises hesitate to unite in public demonstrations, but it is very true to assert, divide the party. The Seecessives are more desperate, but their numbers would be sadly thinnish if the offices were once filled.

Your telegraphs arrived during the session of the Convention. The one concerning no action in reference to a Chicago Convention surprised us much. A few weeks ago, regarding the same was in the hands of the Com. They suppose

it the electorally and appointed a general
Com. of correspondence with power to appre-
priate telecommunicat. &c.

The Resolutions passed will I think fairly
carry out the suggestions of your telegraph.
The proceedings give me peace in the
States now.

Mr Stanton came up with the telegram
and last evening spoke to an immense
crowd in the City. He has done excellent
service with us. His candid and truthful
narrative of events convinced & crushed
us all. I do not know whether many more
& commentaries will be seen in the State. There
is no doubt that 4/5th of the Democracy are
opposed to Secession. Miller, Meigs,
Sawyer &c are making spasmodic efforts to
counteract this tide. And to some extent
they may succeed. Then they "Stand by our
President" and with many they w^t a potence
oppose. Still we have it in our hearts
that you will succeed & come out
of the battle with flying colors.

And I trust the result will show that
we can honorably continue to act with
a mind of the party. //

I dislike to encroach on your time which
is so severely taxed, but let me hear from
you as frequently as possible. All eyes are


