Troy N.Y. March 26. 1858,

Dear Sir.

As a native of Vermont, I have always watched your career, as a public man, with peculiar interest. I have seen what is called a rank freeloader, and have always wondered how any democrat could be any thing else.

I am able, however, to weigh all the difficulties, which beset the subject of Slavery, as a social relation, a financial interest, and a political element in the organization of party. I have hoped for some solution of these difficulties, aside from the disruption of party, but between the North and South.

But when I reflect upon

the virtues that you and your  
friendz have received from the  
present Administration, and from  
certain renegado Whigs, who are  
now leaders of the democracy in  
the Senate and House. I can hardly  
contain my indignation, and am  
ready to co-operate, for once at least,  
with a political combination, even  
if it cannot be called a party, that  
shall unite the whole north.  
The extinction of the now Worthy  
folly forming such a union.

The truth is, that in her last  
incubation, rising eggs were smuggled  
into the nest, and Democracy has  
unconsciously hatched a brood of  
hiving Superists -




