

Chicago. March 27th: 1858.

My dear Sir;

I found during my stay in the City of Baltimore, that the majority of the gentlemen who were in favor of LeComptons & who had been instrumental in putting up the Buchanan meeting in that City, deprecated without measure the course of the administration in attempting to make the question a test of party fidelity: many of them were poor ardent friends & declared themselves in favor of you as the candidate of the party, in sincerity. The only thing they particularly desired should be done was that you should now in the Senate, that notwithstanding all that had taken place you were still a faithful adherent of the party, and that the administration was alike unable to prevent you from maintaining it when it was struggling to carry out the principles of the party, or to coerce you into its support when it was endeavoring to supersede those principles.
I return the feeling & sentiment I have above mentioned

as the feelings & sentiments of a large portion
of the people of Baltimore, so far as I can hear,
prevade the Country generally.

This City is of course an exception - The principal
element of the LeCompton sentiment here is hostility
to you, & the LeCompton men are determined to
break up the party if it is deemed necessary to
do so in order to secure your defeat. I believe Hayne
& Moultrie have the more merit with local
Lib. Constitutional men than they shall be accorded under
these circumstances until we see the result of the
control of the local organization - There is some
doubt as to this of the County. But I am
informed that it is the purpose of the LeCompton
men to form a separate organization if
defeated in the party organization as it now
exists - Their first attempt in such a direction
will be made when we come to name delegates
to the Springfield Convention - These delegates will
of course be anti-LeCompton men - & if we
can manage to secure their nomination on a
regular basis & claim the other side to an
open secession from the party organization

we will have secured a very large measure
of strength throughout the state, tho' it will
make our defeat in this County next fall.
As to the Springfield Convention, I am exceedingly
anxious it has been called to meet at this
time - It can do no possible good & may
be productive of serious injury. Its action
can only affect the mind & aim of any man
who has hitherto stood it in view as favorable
to you; men there are few. Should then however
be any difference of opinion in the convention,
and should any portion of it decide
inconclusively the course of the
party, will it not present an unpleasant
spectacle to your friends? Such a condition
of things I consider by no means unlikely:
of course your friends will be largely in the majority;
a portion of the convention will be over, who tho'
friends of yours do not desire to occupy a hostile
position to the administration; & a portion
will be men who are then for the purpose
of creating a difficulty, & finding or making
a split in the party. The convention must adopt

a series of resolutions opposing the course,
and declaring that it does not recognize any
authority, except in National Conventions, to
declare articles of political faith. However
plain & orderly may be the language of such
resolutions, they must nevertheless include the
fact, that in the opinion of the convention
the course of the administration should be
condemned. While over the men who come to
find or make a difficulty, cease, & however
in all this manner, will it not be heralded
throughout the country that there is a disrup-
tion of the party in Illinois which renders
your election & the Senate impossible, or at least
highly improbable?

If however the convention should pass off well,
and give an expression of such sentiments
as we desire it should express without in-
counteracting the difficulties above suggested
what practical good will it do? I can

see none that will not be just as readily
accomplished in a different way, or in
the same way at a softer & more con-
ciliatory time.

The fate of the Lecompton bill is now in
doubt.

If adopted we won't one platform
for next fall - which should be made
by a state convention.

If rejected we won't another platform
for next fall - which should be made by
a state convention.

It is therefore important that a state con-
vention should meet after Congress has
acted upon the bill. I would therefore
suggest to you, to see the Representatives
from this State & all of you write at
once to your friends in different parts
of the State to have the convention adjourn
it must say about the last of August.
It is now too late to prevent its meeting
but on assembling it can very readily

and without discussion by a concerted
plan adjourn & meet again.

I had a long conversation with Mr. Tern-
oung a few days since & urge him, if
possible, to postpone the meeting - He fully
agrees in the view I impressed to him, &
which I have here before stated, but
thought it was too late to prevent the
Meeting & that the only plan now left
is to adjourn over.

I have been intending to write upon this
subject for three or four days. But here
are so pressing business matters that
I have not had time. & I will now
abstain as much honored as you were
when preparing your report.
