

My Dear Sir

We had an election in our City yesterday for City Officers — The "Buchanan De-mocrats" put forth a whole ticket of Leavenworth men — The "Na-tional Democrats" took the banner, made a full ticket & elected Mayor, Recorder and every Alderman (9) the Mayor by 164 Majority — Without a split in the Democracy, they would have carried the City against all opposition, by 60 or 70 Majority — Every effort has been made to prevent your having a fair hearing before the People by Genl.
