Dear Sir: - Knowing that you take great interest in all matters concerning St. Clair County, I beg leave to inform you, that I have commenced publishing a german newspaper, under the head of Belleville Journal, at which I have send you a copy to day. One of the german papers published here is sold and is now in the hands of the editor of the "Volksblatt" who has been the editor of the "Zeitung" during the Presidential election in 1856. There is reason to believe that the Zeitung is or will be the organ of Gov. Koerner, who is interested in that paper. Some Republicans here, especially the clique of the Zeitung, at the head of which stands Koerner, are doing all what they can possible do, to break me down and so discontinue the publication of a paper, which is in their way. But I hope they shall not have a result. It is quite necessary that the large German population of St. Clair County and the adjoining counties have an organ to protect their interests and that a paper like that finds any support and considerable means, to defeat all these doings against its existence. 



Sir:

In my despatch of the 11<sup>th</sup> of December last, I called your attention to the serious evils under which we labor from the want of Courts of Justice, for the administration of law, in many parts of the Territory. This subject is alluded to and more fully explained in my message to the Legislative Assembly, a copy of which I transmitted to the Department of State.

Under a construction of a law of Congress passed in 1856, relative to fees of office, we now have Courts of Justice held at only three places in this extensive Territory. This spring in consequence of the absence of two of the judges, we shall have Courts at only two places. This amounts to almost a denial of justice, and its fearful influence on society is becoming too ap-

P parent

parent. When men have no courts to appeal to, they have more excuse for appealing to their own passions, and violence and crime must become the law of the day. To avoid these evils as much as possible, the Legislature were induced to extend the jurisdiction of the Probate Court in each county, and to give them a civil and criminal jurisdiction in all cases below the crime of murder.

This County Court system has not yet gone into operation, and I fear will not work well among a people accustomed to administer law for themselves, and unwilling to tax themselves for any purpose. This unwillingness indeed I may say, this determination, on the part of the Legislature Assembly, not to tax their constituents for any purpose, is an insuperable barrier to all improvement in the Territory. The only tax they will consent to is one upon merchants and upon fandangoes. They rely upon these almost exclusively for County & Territorial purposes. The consequence is that their warrants are

almost

almost worthless, and on that account I have great difficulty in getting suitable persons to accept office under the Territorial Government. I therefore urged the Legislature in every way that I could to impose a small property tax to pay the debts of the Territory, and for other necessary purposes. But the recommendation found no response from either Branch of the Legislature, nor any aid from the only newspaper published in the Territory though edited by an intelligent gentleman, and one in the employment of the Federal Government. All seemed to admit its necessity but were afraid to touch so unpopular a measure. From these considerations, as well as others, I fear the County Courts provided for by the last Legislature, cannot be rendered effective; and that we must continue to be almost without Courts, and without law. Such a state of things, if it continue in a country like this, must soon lead to a partial dissolution of society. I beg, therefore, that you will use

your


your influence to have the law of 1856, so modified as to restore the court to each of the nine counties in the Territory, as heretofore. Unless something be done for the better administration of law in the Territory, we shall soon have a fearful state of society.

Under this state of things, it is not to be wondered at, that Indian depredations and massacres should continue and become more frequent. I have just received a letter from S. B. Watson's dated at Fort Barclay the 4<sup>th</sup>. instant, informing me that a party of Comanches had just destroyed a settlement recently made in Red River, forty or fifty miles east of Fort Union, and had barbarously murdered Mr. Burnham, the American master whom the settlement was made.

A delegation also from the Pueblo of St. Juan waited on me a few days since to complain of the murder of one of their people, the week before, by the Pueblo of Jemez, and asking for satisfaction. All I could do was to advise them to an amicable adjustment of the matter if possible, as I had no power to interfere. Whatever diversity of

of opinion there may exist as to the policy  
of transferring the superintendence  
of the villa Indians, there can be no tie  
as to the Corobals. Undoubtedly they  
should have remained under the care  
and control of the Governor, who could,  
from his position exercise a power over  
them for good which no Indian agent  
can do. They seem unwilling to recognise  
any other Tata or father. Most of them  
speak Spanish and are intelligent, and  
not inferior in agriculture and cravve  
manufactured to the lower classes of the  
Mexican population. I think, therefore,  
it would not be a difficult matter to  
improve their condition and advance  
them in the arts of civilized life.


