Dear Sir

I had the honor of receiving under your frank, last night, the very able speech, which you delivered in the Senate, March 2^d, on the adoption of the Missouri Compromise.

Let me say to you, in all sincerity, that I have been, for your book, on entomology, an admirer of yours as a statesman & Senator - I looked forward to the time, when the whole South would unite on you, or their candidate for the Presidency - Your noble defense of the Constitution & the rights of the Southern States, under that banner, has done more than justice said this of protection - For your part, you have opposed, with wonderful ability, the Free Soil & Abolitionists, on the subject of Missouri & Kansas.

I was not surprised to see, the deep mortification I well knew, in seeing your acting with them

and against the South on this
some question - little did I suppose
when I read your noble effort
in the Senate, on the topic of
the Nebraska Women's Bill, that you
would, in so short a time, be found
acting in concert, on the same ques-
tion, with those whom you
have stigmatized as being
irreconcile & full of truth & wisdom.
They have not changed one iota
or title of their black creed.

I have been, Sir,
a Union man, amidst Nullifiers &
Secessionists for the last thirty
years, in South Carolina. When
I became satisfied of your recent
course, on the Women's question, I
did first try to勸止 them
as had ex cited my fears & opprobri-
um for the resolution of the
Federal Senate more than any
thing that had happened during
my time - I soon in it, the organiza-
tion of purely sectional parties,
which the disunionists of the South,
had evidently prepared for. They
well knew would be the death

bones of that Union which they
hoped to preserve. The South being
in the minority would have to
take care of herself by the formation
of a separate Confederacy.

Born in South Carolina,
and all my life of a South looking,
and all my love for the South, I
have looked to the Union, or the
great State house, from which
all our happiness & prosperity,
or a people, were derived - I have
contended, before the people, in the
House of Representatives & Senate of the
state, & in their State Convention,
against Nullify the laws of Congress
& secede from the Union. But the
bad friends at the North, that these
friends were fighting our battles,
& contending for our constitutional
rights - When I see the great &
abominable leaders of those friends
going over to the enemy & fighting
in their ranks I begin to fear
that I was mis taken - //

The people of Norway
whom you never heard, whom you
formerly abhorred for their corruption and

and treason now bear in a state to
constitute rebellion against their
+ authority. Federal + Territorial
and have up to now, I believe, for
the express purpose of keeping up
the slaves agitation. You now think
the House's Constitution should be set
back for them to exercise a privilege
which they now have of electing
representatives with slaves & contending
what claims have such a people
on the Federal Government to be ha-
rmed, encouraged & acceded in
their sedition + rebellion?

The last election of the
United States the Constitution of a
majority of the states were never
submitted to a popular vote - And it
is probable, that in no instance would
a majority of the people be found to sup-
port any feature + clause in any one
constitution - The great question of
slavery was submitted to the border states
& was very sufficient






