Dear P. A. Douglas Sir

I take the  
liberty of writing to again. I am still  
your friend, and ever shall be found  
supporting you while you hold to first  
principles. But Sir, we are a little  
afraid that Col. Forney is going  
to carry the war into African soil  
and to see it -

That which induces  
me to write to you at this time, is that  
in looking over my old papers for  
facts to support your position, as true  
to the Democratic Doctrine. I find in the  
Pennsylvanian of July the 9th 1857 -  
an article taken from the Washington  
Union of July the 8th 1857 - in support  
of the President, Gov. Walker and the  
very principle you have contended for.  
It was if you recollect against the  
action of the two Southern Conventions  
(Democratic Conventions) one in Georgia  
and the other Mississippi in which

They opposed the doctrine set forth  
in Gov. Walker's Inaugural that the  
Constitution of Kansas when made  
should be submitted to the people for  
their approval or rejection. I think it

and where ever I have used it, it backs  
down all argument they cannot deny  
the facts it contains;

original, I will send the one I have to  
you, if it is your wish; I should do so.

We are to have a County mu-  
ting on the 29th of this month, and I suppose  
the Ins. will control the Out. as it is gen-  
erally the case - but they will have some  
trouble if they attempt to oppose the doc-  
trine of Popular Sovereignty or the Rule  
of the Majority. Honesty and truth must, and  
will, sooner or later prevail.

Dear Sir:

Some two years ago, the leading physicians of Saint Anthony and Minneapolis, organized a "Medical Society" with a view to the cultivation of the Sciences generally, and the consequent diffusion of such knowledge and information as would be valuable to the members of the Society and, through them, to the people of the then, Territory of Minnesota. The Society has labored under many disadvantages and its influence much circumscribed, from the fact, that it has been without the means of procuring a select Library and other Journals and publications essential to its success and is, consequently, left to depend upon prominent national men, like yourself, to furnish such works on scientific subjects, (for instance, Reports on Surveys, Topography, Geology, Astronomy

Memorials, Etc, Etc., as may promote  
the object of the Society.

Dear Sir:

The St. Anthony and Minneapolis Union Medical Society have in course of preparation a report upon the Topography, Geology, Climate and Diseases of Minnesota, and respectfully request your co-operation, by contributing information in your possession on the following topics:

1st. The Topography and Geology of your neighborhood; embracing a description of its streams, diversities of superficial character, the amount and quality of timber, and geological characteristics.

2nd. The Climate, as indicated by thermometrical and barometrical records, the quantity of rain, and prevailing winds, etc., etc.

3rd. The Diseases most prevalent, their mortality and the treatment usually adopted. Have you ever known "Fever and Ague" to originate in your vicinity?

As this work is designed not more as a contribution to medical science than the setting forth to the world of the peculiar advantages of our territory, and as it will involve, besides much time and labor, considerable pecuniary outlay, it is hoped that every citizen of Minnesota, interested in its permanent growth and prosperity, will aid the Society in obtaining for the work such a circulation as shall defray the expense for its publication. It will be published in the spring, in octavo form, and will contain about 200 pages of closely printed matter, neatly bound in paper.




The objects of the Franklin Institute are two-fold—The establishment of a Library and Reading Room, and series of Public Lectures.

I doubt not that ere this you have

sustained in the death of my husband very painful and  
agonying have been my affliction and now my soul is weighted  
down to the earth in anxious solitude for my children it is  
in their behalf dear Sir I make bold to address you  
entreating that you will pleas to help us some if it be  
ever so little as I am not able to worke but very little  
owing to a severe pain in my side which is caused by  
sewing so constant I exceedingly regret being compelled to  
address you on so delicate a subject as my own misfortune  
but there is no alternative if I would avoid deception  
I have devoted the very best years of my life in an  
honest endeavor to make a living I have made my support  
by sewing for the last 5 years but now in my declining  
years I have been reduced to absolute want still I am  
anxious to act properly honorable to all or at least so far as  
it is in my power so to do anxious for there welfare I  
have ventured to make this application knowing your willingness  
at all times to befriend the unprotected and forfotens

the reson why I ask it of you I have <sup>heare</sup> of you as being one of the most feling men that we have in this world and I thought if you would read this letter in congress and use your influence perhaps some of the congressmen would have pity on me and help me a little they could all through in a very little and not miss it am is would perhaps be the means of me keeping my children together and giving them some education and if i am not able never to reward you for it god will reward you for it.

I will now give you a small history of my self I was a daughter of John Atkinson who died in Abacomb about 20 years ago I married when I was <sup>only</sup> about 14 years old my husband was a brother to David & <sup>the</sup> Head of Carthage his name was Benjamin Head a strong friend yours I think if I mistake not you was acquainted with them both I remember of hearing you making a speech in carthage in the court house yards my father was very much oppose to me marriing so young but I would not hear to taking his advise which I see now was very wrong but we was married without his consent he was so put out about it that he would not help us any and so we worked alone and done the best we could and when he die he did not will me a ~~share~~ share with the balance of the children he left a small amount to my

children which is a small house with only 2 small rooms and that is all we own in this troublous world my husband die about 6 years ago leaving me with 5 small children nothing left for their support but we got along very well as long as I had my health I learnt the drags making and works day and night many knights I worked all night I finely tooked the pluring so bad I could only see about 2 hours in the day and then I could hardly get a breath that was a pure sloe for a living too proud to beg not able to worke I concluded I would marry again but that only made the thing worse it only brought trouble and sorrow on me I was married on year ago the 14 of this month when to my sorrow my husband come home to dinner about 3 weeks ago and said it was impossil for him to support the children and educate them as they ought to be so he packt his trunk and left I know not where he said he would go ~~where~~ he never would be heard of again so we are left alone to trudge this lonely world alone and unless we can get some help ~~we~~ we are bound to suffer his name was Alexander Hall my friends if i have any has not offerd to help me any and I always said if I had to ask any person for help I would ask strangers then if I got help it would com free I think if I could only get some help for one year my children then could get some education enough by that time to make a living for them and myself or if I could get help enough to put a small

adication to my house I could take boderers and that  
would rest me from sewing untill my side would get  
better I do not wish to beg if I only can yet my health  
for all we want in this world is very little my  
relations all rather think themselves above me but that matter  
not I hope and intend to try to live to praise god and when  
I am done with the troubles of this world I hope to have a  
place in heaven where parting will be no more now this is  
my situation if you can help me a little or get any one else  
that will it it will be the means of me easing my family  
from suffering and if i am never able to reward you  
there is a god in heaven that never forgoits blessings  
please answer my letter
