To the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled:



My thanks for documents sent
as well as a parcel of corn from
Patent Office. The species are now
being circulated among our farmers.
They seem to be well pleased to
receive them and seem to read
them with interest. We are now
having one of our very wet seasons,
our farmers are much behind with
their work, many cannot plow for
corn and many who have plowed cannot
plant. The whole country from
Blue Island (South of Chicago) to Ottawa
is mostly covered with water, and
down about Springfield and about
Decatur the country seems to be a
vast sea of water. Here in our military
tract our land is more rolling and
we are better situated, but even here
our farming operations are woefully
behind. Wheat looks well when not
drowned out as well as rye & oats -

I have just returned from Chicago,
I see Mr. Matthew about the Tremont
House as spiccy (among his own class) as
the old boy in a high wind, having spent
a week there I had an opportunity of watching
many of his movements to as he did not
know me from Adam; I think they are
in a poor fix, I was speaking with a
friend of mine from Peoria and the
conversation turned upon Kanesy of the
Union, Oh! said he Kanesy could be bought
any time for five dollars, Capt. Moss
says he is a d—n horse and says he
has need him and could do it again
if he would pay him a little something.
And says he will come out and oppose
the administration if does not soon
get the Peoria post office, Uncle Peter
(as Mr. General Calhoun sweat) is all right
but says he cannot stir only in certain
ways, he does not seem to care so much
about the office as he does about getting
Cook, Kanesy, Bowring, &c.; He cannot think of their having
a glorification over his removal from office
Our friend W. Louks seems as firm as a
Rock and battles them on any occasion
when it is required.
