

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

On the 27th inst I wrote you that W H Bristol our Dem editor had sold himself to Cook Lie & Co & was as to leave the P O. 

But I presume in the excitement incident to the unexpected and unfortunate Kansas constitution, his time has been so constantly occupied as to drive all minor matters from his mind. I have therefore taken the liberty of addressing you personally. I want to procure vols 1 and 3 of the Pacific route Rep, and vol 1 of the Japan Expedition. I have vol 2. I believe there were but 2 vols published. Have there been more than 4 vols of Commercial Relations published? I would like to

procure a copy of a report upon
our colonial trade, - I think by Thomas,
and a copy of the last census - the
great edition. If you can send
me these books, you will confer
a great favor, and one which I
shall be happy to reciprocate, if
in my power.

In regard to political matters
in this state - the effort making by
the office holder, and office seeking,
to make headway against our
distinguished Senator, I presume
you are fully advised. In this
county, the number of demagogues
opposed to Mr Douglas are nearly
as scarce as "hen's teeth." Charles Buzz
is profiting, of course, to pay for the
P. O. which the President awarded


