2 Is land patented as this no subject to taxation & sale per terms of the laws of Congress or the State of Illinois -

Sir,

I am in receipt of your letter of the 1<sup>st</sup> instant, with affidavit enclosed, and in reply have to inform you that it appears from our "Militia Titles & Records" that War of 1812 Veteran # 5965 for 160 acres, issued for the services of Daniel Bennett a Private in Company "11<sup>th</sup> Regt. U. States Infantry," was located and carried into Patent Oct 16. 1817. on the NW  $\frac{1}{4}$  St. 51 N. R 7 E. Illinois.

These premises are situated in "Peoria County" of which Peoria is the County seat.

Among the papers filed in this case, is a Power of Attorney from Daniel Bennett to Joseph Watson, of date Oct 23. 1816, acknowledged before George Robinson, a Justice of the Peace of Chittenden County, Vermont. This fact identifies the party represented by you.

Enclose you herewith, a Certified copy from the Record, of the above mentioned Patent.

On my arrival at my home a few days ago, I found a package of your very excellent and able Speeches and one copy of Post Office Report of 1856 for which please accept my warm thanks. I have also expected the letter with the nice call for, but I have not received it - the reason I know not. Our opponents are very hard at work, Bagg our newly appointed Post Master has called an extra convention of his County to send delegates to meet at the State convention at Springfield tomorrow, but there were but a few in attendance, and I think if we manage our parts properly we need have no fears. I have been out among the Germans and Irish all last week, have had several good meetings and I shall keep at work until after Election, I can assure you that our cause is passing very fast, after explaining to the people your acts and motives on the popular sovereignty cause they give you their hearty approbation. The administration party have several foreign agents at work from the east but that is no help to them. F. J. Grund is to come on as I leave. In my last I have requested aid to bear expenses &c &c of which I have not heard any thing. I am in hopes you will not hesitate in sending it for as I said before my own means are not able to defray all matters necessary. I hope you will send me about 100 to 150 dollars and some more Specie for thou that you have sent me I distributed

among the people and are all ready with  
great considerations and feeling tending to do  
much good.

I hope I have not intruded on your valuable  
time I therefore subscribe myself your  
most humble servant. I have wrote to you  
in my last that I am one of our first leading  
men in the Town of Rock River I am Justice of  
the peace, Do not frank your letter I am afraid  
the letter might be opened by Buchanan P.M.  
to pry into secrets. I have had thoughts sometimes  
that you had sent me a letter and that they  
never handed me the same, therefor I think  
it best not to frank it, and address it to  
me at Freeport


If I am persuade that the wisdom
