





The Integrity of the Democratic Organization in Indiana and Illinois.

The Democratic party has, and always has had, two distinct characteristics: first, a devotion to the rights and equality of the States; and, second, a preservation of the Federal Government in all the powers *clearly* granted, to-wit: by the terms of the Constitution. The latter of these depends on the former; because whatever the Constitution of the United States has not authorized in plain and express words, that, by the force of mere silence in the Constitution, is forbidden.

It results from a principle, thus underlying the entire policy of our Federal Government, that those who administer public affairs at any time should listen with deference, with distrust of themselves, their opinions, their wishes, to the voice of the Democratic party in the several States, as expressed through their conventions of delegates, and representing the people by whose will the Federal Administration came at first into power; otherwise the Federal Government becomes the source of influence, controls the policy and opinions of the States, and will precipitate us finally into the abyss of consolidation and federalism, to the entire destruction of the rights, the independence, and the honor of the States.

We have been led to these reflections (for we are always safe in recurring to first principles) by the actions of the self-styled Democratic State Convention assembled at Springfield, Illinois, during the present month, at which convention, as our readers are already informed, candidates have been nominated in opposition to the candidates heretofore nominated by the regular Democratic Convention of that State, representing a large majority of the Democratic voters, and for no purpose, that we can discern, except to secure the triumph of Black-Republicanism in the election soon to be held.

These shameless pretenders, a mere faction of dissenters from the regular organization, have the impudence to assert that the President and the Administration sympathize with them in their inexcusable proceedings, in their attempt to distract, to betray and altogether defeat the party which elected Mr. BUCHANAN, and upon which he must rely, now and henceforth, for the successful conduct of public affairs.

Such a pretense is in itself a libel on the President, and all the members of his Cabinet, since no man could suppose them thus unfaithful to the Democratic organization and its principles as to imagine that any countenance would be given to mere factionists, "bolters," disorganizers, whose manifest design is to assure the ascendancy of Black-Republicanism in the State of Illinois.

The Democracy of other States will tolerate nothing of the sort; and if any office-holder of this Administration dares to promote such schism, faction and disorganization, we hope and expect to see him discomfited by the Administration.

We have spoken strongly upon this subject, because we feel the deepest anxiety that the harmony and integrity of the Democratic party shall be preserved, and because we are sure—and we believe we have good reason for the assurance—that the Administration has no sympathy with these disorganizers, and that they insult it by the pretense that it has. Nor will we consent to be told that this is a mere local Illinois affair: it reaches the party everywhere. Violation of the usages of the party and breaches of its discipline weaken and injure it everywhere; and already the evil example is being followed elsewhere. Factionists and bolters are rising up to do mischief in Indiana, and soon may break out in Ohio.


