



Dear Sir.

Allow me to say,^{to}
you are the man of my sentiments. And
that in your success it gives me satisfaction
although nothing but principles have
I to rejoice over in your triumph. The
great doctrine which has carried you
through your Campaign must remain
the fundamental principle of the Republics
of the people. It is my opinion whatever
conventions may lay down as a platform
the doctrine of popular sovereignty will
be the Main Spring and watch word to the
lords of this Republic in future time.

I did not intend to write a political
letter and will only say that if you receive
the nomination at the Charleston Convention
you will hear from me again in a way

that will tell for your election.)

My object in writing was if possible to get you to deliver a literary address in this town on your return home, at the close of the session. We are situated but a short distance from the N.Y. about forty miles south of Rochester, and but a few hours ride from your old mother's in Ontario Co. Our population is about 4000. The inhabitants have within the last year opened a seminary of the highest grade and are in process of erecting a fine building. The school is now kept in a temporary building with an attendance of about 150 pupils. There is connected with this school a society of young men who are using their best endeavors to secure a library. This is one of the means adopted to raise funds. The surplus after paying expenses go for library purposes. If we could secure your services it would very much to

our interest and I hope be an advantage to yourself.

If any public documents or other books of interest at your disposal, the friends of this institution would hold the favor in grateful remembrance & publicly acknowledge it.

I hope to hear from you and should your engagements be such as to comply with the sentiments of this letter you will meet many warm political friends, as well as hospitable citizens.

I had the pleasure of shaking you hand at your house in Washington last May at time of the meeting of the Medical Association in that place.

THIS Institution, located in the village of Dansville, Livingston Co., N. Y., is now incorporated and duly organized, with a competent Board of Instruction who have entered upon the discharge of their duties. The school has opened with nearly one hundred students. The present Faculty are Rev. S. SEAGER, D. D., C. C. WHEELER, A. B., and Miss M. ANGELL. Other teachers will be added as circumstances may require. The Board of Trustees are progressing with the new building, which, when completed, will accommodate three hundred pupils. Students will find Board in good families at from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week. The year is divided into three terms.

First Term commenced April 21, ends July 20.

Tuition in Common English,	\$5 00 per Term.
Tuition in Higher English and El. Math.,	6 50 per Term.
Tuition in Ane. and Mod. Lang. and Belles Lettres,	8 00 per Term.



Information upon all matters respecting the Institution, can be obtained by addressing the Principal or any member of the Faculty.


