

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

I.

We regard the perpetuity of our National Constitution and the continued Union of all the States as absolutely indispensable to the prosperity, present well being and future good of all the parts composing this mighty Confederation of States—the one unalterably adhered to and the other never dissolved.

II.

We unqualifiedly oppose, ignore and repudiate all legislative action or individual interference on the part of one State with the domestic institutions of a sister State, and especially that of slavery.

III.

We pledge ourselves to use our best efforts, influence and means for the elevation to offices of honor, profit and trust such men only as, by their records, stand square upon, and faithfully adhere to, the Constitution and Union—men who take enlarged and comprehensive views of the duties of public officers, and have proved themselves worthy of our confidence and trust.

IV.

We believe that the enlightened views entertained by the mechanics of this country should command for them a higher destiny in the practical administration of our State, National and Municipal governments, and regard it as an imperative duty, which we owe to ourselves and posterity, to take the initiatory steps in securing a proper recognition of our merits and capabilities in the faithful, prompt and efficient discharge of public duty.

V.

Believing as we do, that on the virtue and intelligence of the people of a truly Democratic form of Government depends its stability and prosperity, we propose the continual elevation of the moral, educational and pecuniary standard of that class of our population represented in this association.

Bill a great admirer & friend of yours - I therefore consider we have gained enough to carry Missouri beyond doubt, all we want is to elect Fred. Bennett Governor, & I think his chances are better than any in the field - he was here a few days ago we had many conversations about you

Not having had the pleasure of corresponding with you before I feel some

hesitation in now addressing you but out former pleasant acquaintance & my present official position causes me to think that you will accept the disinterested friendship & services of one who offered them when he had nothing better to give,

You have many good friends here more true than Mr Thawell of the Herald trusts that Mrs Douglas has quite recovered from her long & severe illness & frequently look back with pleasure to our trip to "Belleville Ills" & its results for you, please tender my respects to her

the coming great national struggle.



Dear Sir

We have just organized a "Douglas Club" in this city, which is composed of young men, admirers of your cause in the United States Senate and favorable to your elevation to the Presidential Chair, our club hopes to be a portion of that great party which is striving, and surely destined to make Popular Sovereignty the recognized policy of the country and thus banish forever from our national consideration the whole subject of slavery. This in our opinion can only be done by your elevation to the Presidency on the Cincinnati Platform. We are not sure it can be done by the elevation of any other living man even on the same Platform, our present Executive originated this doubt and we hope the people will make a sine thing of it the next time by readopting the Cincinnati programme and by elevating the author of the Popular Sovereignty policy to be its

inaugurator and interpreter.


