

Judge George Baker Lake.

It appeared from the accounts of bystanders that the policemen did not fire into the crowd until forced to do so by the ferocity of the attacks on them, firing first into the air to intimidate the mob, and when this warning failed, directing their shots at the men attacking them.

The mob was composed for the most part of foreigners, chiefly Poles and Lithuanians. They had been making trouble for some time, but assumed a decidedly menacing attitude last night when a boatload of strikebreakers were taken to the plant and set to work. The demeanor of the mob which gathered outside the plant became so threatening this morning that police protection was asked for. When the reserves appeared trouble broke loose.

On the charge of having fired one of the shots that took effect on the mob, H. A. Morgan, cashier of the refinery, was arrested and lodged in jail. Morgan denies the accusation.

### Garment Strike End Is Near.

Early settlement of the garment-makers' strike, which has involved upward of 50,000 workers and demoralized the women's clothing trade for several weeks, appeared possible today with the assembling of representatives of the conflicting interests for a conference.

The conferees comprise ten representatives from the Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Association and a strikers' committee of equal size.

Louis D. Brandeis was asked to come from Boston to preside over the conference and readily consented, as it was largely through his efforts that the negotiations for a conference reached a successful conclusion.

### Obstacle in Workers' Claims.

The negotiations, which lasted over a week, were complicated by the many divergent claims of various grades of workers for recognition of their particular demands, and the conferees today faced an equal difficulty in the task of reconciling divergencies in claims by the strikers and in finding a basis for an agreement between the workers as a body and their employers.

In general the strikers have demanded better working conditions, increased wages and recognition of their union organizations.

In spite of the admitted difficulty in settling the many complications facing them, the conferees were hopeful of early preparing a common ground on which a basis for a final adjustment of the trouble could be arranged.

### Troops on Duty in Columbus.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 28.—National Guardsmen to the number of 2,000, com prising the Second, Third and Sixth regi ments and Troop A are encamped in this city today to prevent rioting in connection with the street car strike.

The ordering out of the soldiers followed an all-night conference in the adjutant general's office, participated in by city officials, Adjutant General Weybrecht, George S. Long, secretary to the governor, and General W. V. McMacken of Toledo.

The headquarters of General McMacken,

### Allotment of the Delegates.

The Labor party candidate is Hugh Frayne of Scranton for secretary of internal affairs. Mr. Frayne is an organizer for the American Federation of Labor.

### Minnesota Democrats Meet.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 28 .- The Minnesota state Democratic convention was called to order today for the nomination of a full ticket of state officers and the adoption of a state platform.

On account of the harvest now in progress over the state the delegates from outside the cities have been slow in arriving, and the great bulk of them only reached the city on morning trains.

The principal interest of the convention centers around the gubernatorial nomination and the fight on the county option plank. Congressman W. S. Hammond is temporary chairman, and his speech in that capacity sounds the keynote of the fight which the Minnesota Democracy will wage this fall.

While there was some uncertainty as to the nominee for governor, the slatemakers felt confident that John Lind, former Governor of Minnesota, would be named to head the ticket.

### Aim Is to Impress Lind.

This, they said, would be done in spite of his many refusals to be considered as a candidate and of his lately expressed intention of declining the nomination if

Mr. Lind's friends in the Hennepin County delegation were using every argument they could think of to head off this action, but it seemed to be the general opinion that Mr. Lind's feelings would be ignored.

County option promises to furnish the chief topic for debate and, as one delegate expressed it, if the county optionists would "take the bit in their teeth" they were strong enough to get a county option plank through, but even the friends of county option believe that if the is sue is not ignored entirely a modified plank will be included in the platform.

Next to Mr. Lind, Mr. Hammond and Mayor J. C. Haynes of Minneapolis are considered as favorites for the nomination for governor.
