My dear Sir:

You are Chairman of the Committee on Reform Legislation of the National Prison Association, and as such, I wish to call your attention to our great need of a more uniform and efficient system of prison administration, particularly in directing the interests of the Indeterminate Sentence throughout the United States, and especially a more thorough administration of the Bertillon and Finger Print systems of identification The Indeterminate Sentence has for the apprehension of parole breakers. come to stay uninterrupted, if wisely and conservatively administered. We all believe, and have confidence in it as a movement in the right direction, but if not more wisely administered than so far shown throughout the country, as a whole, it is likely to have a set-back, and in some places brought into such ill repute as to cause a possible repeal of the law. This would be a serious set-back, that would take a long time to over-come. it seems to me, may be lessened by a timely and comprehensive treatment of the whole subject by your Committee.

I do not think that I ought to offer any suggestions to your

Honorable Committee as to the scope and character of the treatment necessary

for the future of the Indeterminate Sentence as a prison reform measure.

My dear Sir:-

Your communication of May 30th came at a time when I was exceedingly busy, was misplaced and did not turn up until today.

You are aware of course that the State Commissions on uniformity of legislation throughout the United States meet in annual session at the same place that the American Bar Association meets, and, usually, some three days prior. The meeting this year will be at Seattle and the sessions of the conference will commence on August 21st. The conference has a special committee on "Vital and Penal Statistics", of which Mr. F.L. Siddons. Bond Building, Washington, D. C. is the Chairman. He has given considerable time and attention to the subject matter and will, no doubt, this year make a comprehensive report. I would, therefore. prefer, so far as I am personally concerned, to postpone consideration of the matter until after the meeting at Seattle. I have some radical views with reference to the administration of criminal law, as well as civil, one of which is that we should have one code for every State in the Union, for there is no reason under the sun why there should be a different criminal and civil code in Maine from that of California, or in Minnesota from that of South carolina. We are one people, under one government and, especially at the present time, State lines have no value as a matter of fact. So far as the administration is concerned, in order to prevent too great a power in the hands of those who administer

the national government, there would be no difficulty in having the people within the States choose, either by election or appointment, those who should administer such a code. I believe the time will come when this will be done, though there is a crying demand for that now, for everywhere we hear the cry of a want of uniformity in the laws of the different States of the Union, as in the administration of these laws.

The Illinois Commission on Uniform State Laws was recently appointed by Governor Deneen. I drew the Bill and it was passed about a year ago. The gentlemen whom the Governor appointed are: Prof. John H. Wigmore, Northwestern Law School, Judge Oliver A. Harker of the University of Illinois, Prof. Ernst Freund, University of Chicago, Col. Nathan William MacChesney of Chicago and myself.
