Ida B. Wells Fiftieth Anniversary

FIFTY YEARS A CLUB

HE IDA B: WELLS WOMAN'S CLUB was organized in 1893 by Ida B. Wells and a number of progressive minded women who had been the Ladies' Day guests of the Tourgee Club.

From its beginning the club pledged itself to a program "For the Elevation of Woman, Home, Community." It supported Ida B. Wells in her fight against lynching in this country and in her travels abroad.

It has been a patron of music through the years. The first Negro orchestra in Chicago was organized with the aid and encouragement of the Ida B. Well's Woman's Club.

Many years before the public schools of Chicago started the kindergarten system, this club opened a kindergarten in Bethel A. M. E. Church and conducted it with paid instructors.

Ida B. Wells, president of the club in 1895, was a representative at the Boston meeting called by the leading Negro women of the Country. The club was again represented in 1896 at the meeting in Washington, D. C., when the National Association of Colored Women became a permanent organization.

The Ida B. Wells Woman's Club was a part of the "Woman's Conference" in 1899 cal'ed in Chicago to organize the Illinois Association of Colored Women.

This club worked over a period of years for better racial understanding among women's club's. It was a charter member of the Cook County League of Womens' Clubs organized in 1898.

This club has been ever alert to prevent racial discrimination and segregation where possible. It received a promise from the President of the South Park Board (Mr. Elward J. Kelly) to end race trouble at the beaches. It aroused public sentiment against the movement to establish segregated schools in Chicago and through its founder, Ida. B. Wells, and her influence stopped the movement.

Many thousands of dollars have been raised and contributed by the club for scholarship, charity and for cooperation and affiliation with civic groups.

In 1931 when Ida B. Wells Barnett was president of the club for the second time, she planned the library for the Wabash Avenue Y. M. C. A. Although she did not live to complete the task, the club installed the library that same year. The collection of books included many books from the presi-

When the National Association met in Boston July 29, 1939, the Ida B. Wells Woman's Club was again represented. Its president, Mrs. Ida K. Brown, gave the biography of the founder and history of the club.

The club lead the campaign to name a housing project in memory of Ida B. Wells, the first to be named for a Negro woman.

The laying of the corner stone ceremonies Sunday, June 8th, 1941, at the administration building of the Ida B. Wells project 454 East Pershing Road, was arranged by the club. Bishop William J.
