SIR—

Your attention is called to the provisions of section 76, Revised Statutes, vol. 1, page 631. The Supervisors have in very few instances complied with these provisions; and the Secretary of State has found it necessary, in his annual reports for the last three years, to assign an excuse to the Legislature for not giving notice to the district Attornies of the counties in which they respectively reside, with a view to their prosecution under section 78, page 632, same volume. It is manifest that a non-compliance with the law in this particular cannot be passed by with propriety any longer. I, therefore, call your attention to the subject at this early day, that the returns due may be made, and that I may be spared the unpleasant duty of reporting any delinquencies for prosecution.

Your attention is also directed to the instructions of the Secretary of State in relation to tavern, store and grocery licenses, and excise moneys, at the bottom of page 122 of the pamphlet edition of the Poor Laws, published by the Secretary of State in 1832.

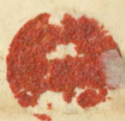
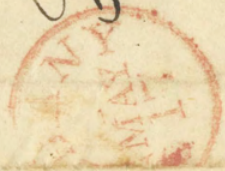
