Dear Sir your note of 14th inst
is received, where I have been for
the last three weeks taking treat-
ment per Lumbago. I return
to Chicago tomorrow, a next day.
Replying to your question, my
recollection is that Norman B. Todd
presented Lincoln's name for
President. I do not think
Brienning spoke during the Convention
nor that he objected to hear himself
orate; but that the opportunity
did not offer on the occasion.
But he was an eloquent orator and
possessed a grand eloquent delivery.

If I were home I would examine
the files of the Tribune. but I feel
sure that Budd as chairman of
the Illinois delegation, was selected
to present Mr Lincoln's name.
Walstead reported the proceedings
of that Convention in pamphlet
form, and it should be found
in your Public Library.

I do not know where you can
find a copy of Scribbs Life of Lin-
coln. All the copies we had in the
Tribune office were burned in the
Chicago great fire of 1871. One of
Scribbs children was searching for a
copy two or three years ago. and I
failed them to find a copy of it.

Mr Scribbs spent two weeks in
Springfield trying and searching for
material. He told me that Lincoln
gave him but little information and
seemed disposed to suppress early facts
